The curtain rises on Sarah Francis Cooper, 19 year old daughter of Mrs. Charles M. Cooper, Indianapolis society matron, languidly pursuing her studies at the exclusive Ogonts finishing school in New Jersey.

On a bright and sunny afternoon in the late spring of 1919, Miss Cooper drove her little roadster to Lake Hopatcong for tea.

The plot thickens considerably at this time. There she met Harry R. Daniels, a middle-aged and divorced New York business man.

It was the first of many meetings, and, learning of the budding affair, Mrs. Cooper hurried east an. brought a tearful daughter back home.

General Barnett Given Command Of Coast Marines

Washington, Sept. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Brigadier General George B. Barnett Tuesday was assigned to have charge of all marine corps activities on the Pacific coast, with headquarters at San Francisco. It was announced by Secretary of the Navy Daniels.

General Barnett for six years served as major general and commander of the marine corps. He was demoted to brigadier general some months ago and Major General John L. Lejeune was made commandant of the corps.

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NEGRO SWORN IN AS PRESIDENT OF AFRICAN REPUBLIC

New York, Sept. 1.—(U. P.)—Surrounded by a corporal's guard of the African army in their new, blue uniforms, His Excellency Marcus Garvey, provisional president of the republic of Africa, a big negro, resplendent in a robe of old rose, was shown into his office here Tuesday afternoon, taking the oath from the gorgeous chaplain general, Rev. Alexander J. McGuire.

His Excellency is by no means first officer of the new, theoretical sovereignty. Before him ranks His Highness Gabriel Johnson, mayor of Monrovia, Africa, grand supreme potentate of the empire, and next before Garvey comes His Highness George Osborne Mark, of Sierra Leone, West Africa, grand supreme deputy potentate.

LOOKS LIKE KING

But His Excellency, President Marcus Garvey, with his crimson-bordered mortar board hat slanting over his haughty perspiration beaded visage and his old robe falling away in classic folds from the figure on the throne—Garvey looked the part of King.

Before him stood the chaplain general, whose snowy and belaced linen vestments were brightened by crimson strokes, reading the oath and everywhere about them in liberty hall, a mass of very damp lack humanity stirred, murmured and broke into applause. Not only the 2000 negroes in the hall but those listening outside the windows and far down the block took part in the short demonstration which was silenced by an imperious gesture of the provisional president's large hand.

GESTURES OBEYED

It was too solemn an occasion to Garvey for him to permit any fustian by his subjects and they, obeying his gestures, fell silent. The corporals' guard of the African army, stalwart soldiers selected from among the faithful of Harlem, stirred slightly as though anxious to charge the throng and prove their allegiance to the bulky red-robed figure. But Garvey held them in the spell of his magnificence.

The grand supreme potentate, a dignified, light-skinned negro with side whiskers, wore a high "chocker" collar, pearl-gray trousers and spats to match. A simple black business suit, matching his complexion, was good enough for the grand supreme deputy. But the cabinet members lent great personal magnificence to the spectacle in the hall for a dozen or more of them wore decorations and costumes with a meaning all their own.

MUSIC SOLEMN

The music was solemn, if jazzy, as played by the band of the black star steamship company, which operates the good ship Yarmouth between New York and the black countries.

"Awake, awake, oh, Zion," chanted the chaplain general in the invocation. "Put on thy beautiful apparel, oh Jerusalem," and his booming voice was answered by a rumbling "Amen" from thousands of throats.

Then came the Rev. J. W. H. Eason, leader of the American negroes, and retiring chaplain general of the Universal Negro Improvement association, with the sermon.

"LIGHT IS COME"

"The light is come upon us," he read and then launched into his oratory. "It is the intellectual light," he said, "which will make us sit with Shakespeare, Milton and Dante and feel at home; the physical light which will make us clean from the heart out; the financial light which shall make us stand our ground with the captains and the kings of the world's commerce; which will give our leaders the inspiration to run through troops and break down walls to gain our hearts."

I. C. C. Suspends Rule Specifying Payment

Washington, Aug. 31.—(I. N. S.)—The Interstate Commerce commission suspended, until December 29, the operation of rules governing the payment of freight charges in United States currency, except insofar as the rules affect traffic originating at, or destined to points in the United States. Southwestern shippers had sought to make the rules effective on shipments to Canada, but the commission held this unreasonable because of present difference in exchange.

Accused Gun Toter Declares He Shot To Avenge Insult

Chicago, Sept. 1.—(U. P.)—"Every man in Wyoming carries a gun," Gerald A. Stack told a coroner's jury in explaining his part in a fatal roadhouse row here early Tuesday. He was held by the police after admitting shooting Paul Williamson after, it was alleged, Williamson insulted a girl in Stack's party.

Stack said his party had had several highballs and that he was confused as to how the fight started. He claimed he had been struck from behind, that he had his gun as a club. Finally, he said, his arms were pinioned behind him and that while he was so held the gun was discharged four times. He exhibited holes in the back of his coat to substantiate the story.

Stack, a real estate broker of Lander, Wyo., stopped in Chicago with his wife and two children, leaving them Monday evening for a "business conference."

Airmen Are Burned To Death in Crash

Washington, Sept. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Max Miller, pilot of Washington, and Gustave Rierson, mechanic, of Troy, Idaho, were burned to death today when a postal air mail airplane in which they were flying crashed to earth at Morris-town, N. J., the postoffice department announced. The machine was bound westward on the New York-Chicago airmail route.

SOLDIERS ATTEMPT TO KIDNAP EDITOR

Houston, Texas, Sept. 1.—(I. N. S.)—The war department will be asked today to investigate the attempt of military police to kidnap C. V. Sanders, editor of the Houston Press, Wednesday at the Houston country club.

The soldiers, dressed in civilian clothes, raided the club, grabbed Sanders and dragged him to a waiting automobile where he effected an escape from his would-be captors only after club members waged a free-for-all fight with the military men.

The "kidnapers" were headed by Lieutenant J. A. Dempsey, chief of the military police detectives at Galveston. He told reporters he had a military warrant for Sanders' arrest because of "unfavorable articles appearing in his newspaper." The warrant, military officials admitted, was not legal outside the limits of the military zone at Galveston.

Man Dies as Result Of Still Explosion

Wage Raises Given Carmen in Spokane

Spokane, Wash., Sept. 1.—Wage increases amounting to \$100,000 a year, affecting more than 500 employees of the Spokane & Eastern Light & Power company and the city traction lines, were announced by F. E. Connors, vice president of the company, formerly the Inland Empire system. The increase, effective Wednesday, adds from \$12.50 per month to \$17.50 per month to the pay of every employee of the company, with the exception of the car platform men.
