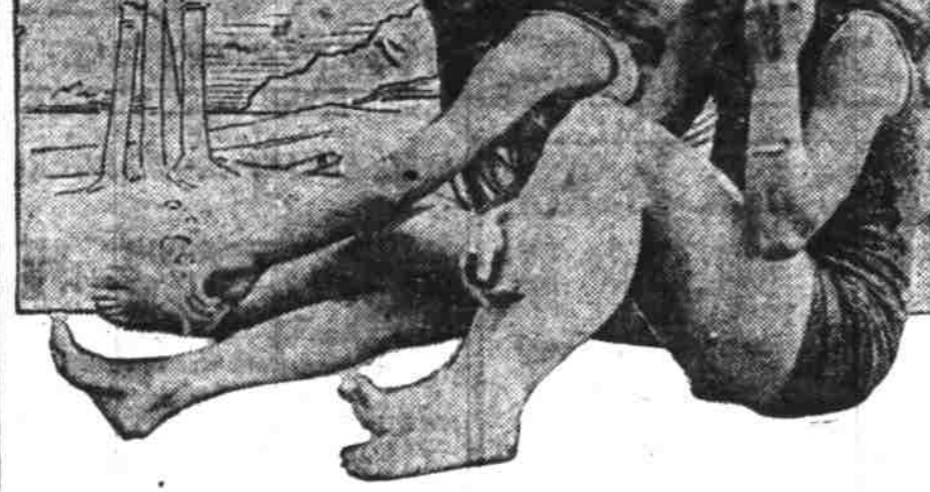


Labor Day Draws Crowd To Seaside

Uncle Sam to Sell Steamer Caught in Booze

Washington, Sept. 4.—For sale: one first class steamship detected in the act of smuggling liquor and confiscated by the United States government. This advertisement will appear shortly in Norfolk, Va. Prohibition agents discovered the vessel in the act of smuggling and wines were being unloaded from the vessel in Norfolk. They refuse to divulge the identity or nationality of the ship, but say they will auction off the ship. Under the confiscation clause of the Volstead act, revenue agents are seizing every type of conveyance, from Rolls-Royce cars to home made cocktels used by moonshiners in the South. Sale of these conveyances and boats are netting hundreds of thousands of dollars. Approximately 150,000 gallons of liquor seized by the revenue agents is estimated to be worth \$2,700,000.
