DISASTROUS RAIN DURING PANIC OF 1893 IS RECALLED

September 6 is a date indelibly impressed in the minds of that great number of farmers who raised prolific grain crops in the vast territory between the Cascades and Blue mountains of Oregon and Washington 27 years ago.

Monday is the twenty-seventh anniversary of the rain that aggravated the effects of the disastrous panic of 1893 for the Oregon country and brought to many extreme suffering.

It was recalled vividly Monday morning by Theo T. Davis, 775 Glisan street, who was cashier of the Farmers bank at Weston during the panic of 1893.

The unusual rains that started on September 6, 1893, and continued for six to eight weeks, utterly ruined, it is estimated, 70 per cent of the grain of the Oregon country.

GRAIN BOTS ON PLATFORM
It was customary in that day for Eastern Oregon and Washington farmers to pile their harvested grain on platforms preparatory to shipment. When on September 6 a gentle rain started, they made no effort to shelter their harvest, Davis reports, but satisfied themselves with the belief that the rain would be short-lived.

The steadfastness of the downpour continued, however, and while the water came down 70 per cent of the entire grain production actually rotted in the sacks.

Heavy losses were suffered not alone in Eastern Oregon, but throughout Washington and as far north as British Columbia.
