## Disposition Shown Toward Approval Of Death Claims

Salem, Sept. 7.—A disposition to approve claims for \$10,000 each presented to the war department by Adjutant General White in behalf of relatives of Edward G. Scott and Clyde B. Dindinger of Marshfield and Ralph Praley of Ashland is indicated in information received by the adjutant general. All three were members of the coast artillery unit of the Oregon National Guard and lost their lives when a big gun with which they were working at Camp Lewis during the recent encampment exploded.

Adjutant General White based his claim on the precedent set by the government in its war-risk insurance. In the communication received from the war department it is stated that an opinion has been requested of the judge advocate general as to whether the claims can be paid out of war-risk insurance funds. If not, it is stated, it will be necessary to ask congress for a special act permitting the payment of the claims.

In that event, Adjutant General White said, the Oregon delegation will be asked to use its influence in furthering the claims. Scott and Dindinger were married. Praley leaves his father and mother.
