

## SPEECH BY COX AT SAN FRANCISCO LOUDLY CHEERED

References to Methods of Republicans in Angling for Alien Vote Vociferously Approved.

San Francisco, Sept. 18.—Two hours is almost the senatorial length for a political speech, but Governor Cox kept 10,000 people attentive as he covered in his main speech here practically every subject from the Barnes bible, or Republican text book, to the troubles of Ireland.

The crowd liked the speech and on two occasions rose to applaud. Governor Cox is in some respects like Hiram Johnson in his method of carrying audiences into high pitches of enthusiasm by a series of climaxes. The Democratic nominee got most of his applause in the first hour of his address and closed with an emotional appeal for the League of Nations that brought tears to the eyes of men and women touched by references to the soldier dead.

Judging by the effectiveness of the governor's address here, one or two of the Democratic leaders said afterwards that if he could stay in California from now until election time and carry his message into every community of the state, he would easily carry it.

**ARGUMENT SPLENDID**  
That, however, is only another way of saying two things: first, that the Democratic leaders were convinced that Governor Cox had a splendid array of arguments and handles the issues skillfully, and second, that because of a local bias, they fear the Cox doctrine will not be widely distributed in California.

The Democratic presidential nominee covered plenty of ground in his speech. He pledged himself to present the cause of Ireland to the League of Nations if he should be elected. He said money now being spent for battleships would be spent for reclamation and irrigation projects.

He contrasted his own nomination after 40 years at San Francisco with the selection of Senator Harding at Chicago "in a smoke-filled hotel room in the early hours of the morning." He praised Hiram Johnson as a progressive and said he believed Hiram's voice was for Harding, but not his heart.

**WILSON'S NAME CHEERED**  
There was a demonstration of enthusiasm when Governor Cox mentioned the name of President Wilson, who spoke in the same hall just a year ago this week. Later on, when Governor Cox denounced the "senatorial oligarchy," which he said had engaged in a conspiracy against a sick man, the audience applauded vehemently again.

The candidate fired the usual denunciation at the San Francisco editorial press which, it will be recalled, was the occasion of a somewhat similar demonstration of approval in the same hall two months ago when Senator Pat Harrison of Mississippi said the editorial things about the San Francisco newspapers, as he made the speech endorsing the nomination of Cox.

**CALIFORNIA GETS FLEDGE**  
References to the manner in which the Republicans were alleged to be angling for the German vote, the Irish, the Italian vote and the ballots of the foreign born of central and southern Europe were loudly cheered, and when Governor Cox pledged himself to look out for California's interests in the Japanese problem, the few Japanese in the audience leaped shrieking and embraced him. Now that Governor Cox has taken a position somewhat similar to that of Senator Harding in promising to protect California, there is no place for the Japanese vote, though doubtless that is not worrying either the Republican or Democratic parties, for the number of Japanese born in the United States and eligible to vote isn't considerable enough to bother about as yet.

**ELOQUENT APPEAL FOR FACT**  
Governor Cox repeated that he was willing to make any reasonable concession to get the treaty ratified and the covenant perfected to suit the state. Any reservations offered in good faith would be accepted, he said. This made a deep impression, as did his emphatic statement that the League of Nations didn't mean sending troops overseas and that the critics knew it didn't. His appeal to take the league out of partisan politics was as eloquent as it was emotional.

As the crowd filed out, complimentary expressions about the skillfulness of Governor Cox as a campaigner were mingled with remarks about his forcefulness by joyous Democrats who had never heard him speak before. Several Republicans who heard the Ohio governor said it was a "good speech," but didn't say whether they would vote for him.

## Jonnert and Peret Leading in Race for French Presidency

Paris, Sept. 18.—(U. P.)—Senators Jonnert and Raoul Peret were regarded today as leading possibilities for the French presidency to succeed Paul Deschanel. Premier Millerand was general favorite for the office, and it was conceded he would be the choice if he will consent to accept. Thus far he has declined vigorously to be nominated.

Senator Jonnert today announced his candidacy for the presidency in event Premier Millerand will not accept the nomination.

Senators and deputies arriving here today for the national assembly session said they will make a concerted movement Monday to induce Millerand to accept the presidency.

## G. O. P. TICKET IN ILLINOIS DIVIDED

Result of Fight Between Two  
Factions for Governorship  
Is Still in Doubt.

Chicago, Sept. 18.—(U. P.)—Returns from Illinois primary, still incomplete, showed the Republican ticket would be divided between the Lowden and Thompson slates.

William B. McKinley, Lowden candidate for United States senator, was nominated over Frank L. Smith, on the Thompson slate, on the basis of unofficial returns. With 182 precincts missing, McKinley's vote was 382,653 and Smith's 344,704. Although 110 of a missing precincts are in Chicago, where the Thompson candidates polled their heaviest vote, it will be practically impossible for Smith to overtake McKinley's lead unless mistakes are found in the unofficial count.

With 181 precincts missing, John G. Oglesby, Lowden candidate for the nomination for governor, was leading Len Small of the Thompson slate by 187 votes. As 110 of the precincts are in Chicago indications are that Small will win, although Oglesby is claiming victory by 500.

The Lowden candidates for nomination for other state offices were victorious, with the exception of George Keys of the governor's slate, candidate for state treasurer. He was apparently defeated by about 20,000. Two congressmen at large named by the Republicans—Yates and Mason—are Thompson men.

The Democratic ticket will be headed by J. Hamilton Lewis as candidate for governor. Peter Waller held a slight lead over Robert Burke for the Democratic nomination for United States senator with about 500 precincts yet to be heard from.

## Mexico Promises to Cooperate With U.S. In Oil Field Work

Mexico City, Sept. 18.—(U. P.)—Renewed assurances that the new Mexican regime will cooperate with Americans in the oil fields have been given James A. Phelps of the United States shipping board in a conference with President de la Huerta.

Huerta was quoted as saying that while Mexico would insist on her sovereign rights, she was ready to make concessions to foreigners. Most important of these was the statement that while adjacent landholders will be given preference in leases, punishment will be provided when it was shown the grants were held illegally. This was regarded virtually as an answer to the American note regarding rights of American oil producers.

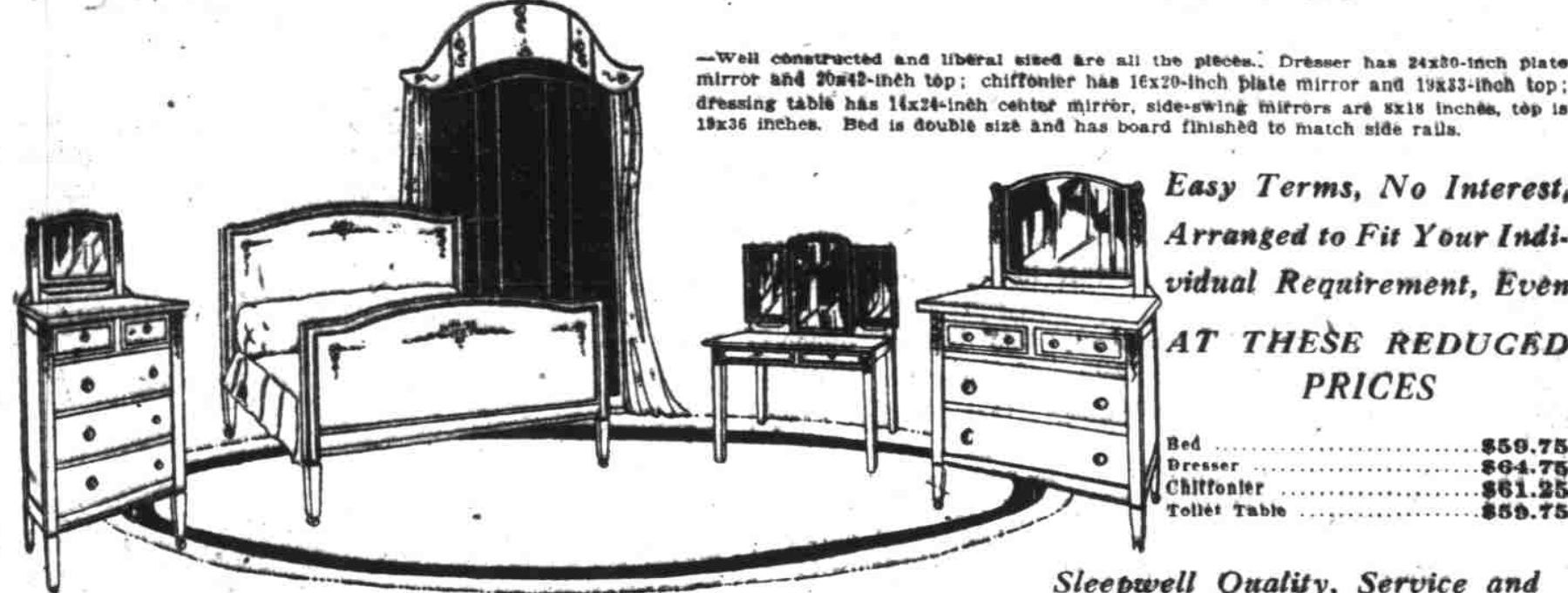

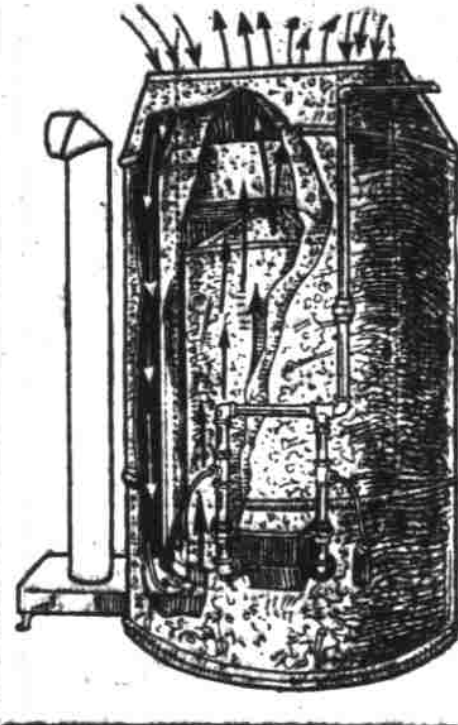
