

DR. SMITH ASKS ADDITIONAL BOOTHS FOR REGISTRATION

Requests that extra registration booths be opened in various sections of the city for the benefit of the working men and women of the city has been made by Dr. C. J. Smith, chairman of the Democratic state central committee, in a letter today sent to the Multnomah county commissioners.

Dr. Smith wrote County Clerk J. W. Beveridge on last Friday asking him to take the action now requested of the county commissioners. Beveridge said that the county commissioners only had the authority to open for registration at any place outside the courthouse, He stated that the registration books are now open and that the registration office was kept open from 8 in the morning until 5 in the afternoon while, commencing September 27, the office would be open until 9 at night.

Dr. Smith, in his letter to the county commissioners, asks that places be provided at Sunnyside, Brooklyn, St. Johns, South Portland, North Portland, Montavilla, Mt. Scott, Burnside and Grand avenue, Sellwood, Albion, Kenmore, Kenilworth, Mt. Tabor, Woodstock and at East Morrison and Grand avenue.

It is pointed out by Chairman Smith that large numbers of working men and women of the city have no opportunity, due to their hours of labor, to reach the distance from the courthouse to register within the office maintained there, while the short time the office will be kept open at night will not give them full opportunity to register at night.

PROGRESSIVE REPUBLICANS JOIN COX-ROOSEVELT CLUB

There is a widespread defection in Oregon of Republicans to the Cox camp. Here are a few typical cases: Last week 10 Republican Progressives joined a Cox-Roosevelt club in Portland. Three of the first contributors to a Cox campaign fund in Umatilla county were Republicans. After the Cox meeting in Salem several Republicans announced their intention of voting for the Ohio Progressive.

People here are attempting to discover the reasons for these defections. They differ in their findings. Many observers declare the changes mark the reaction of the people of Oregon against war, expressed in their advocacy of the League of Nations. Others insist that those turning to the Cox cause are Progressives who cannot support the reactionary Harding. Others say it is the outstanding personality and purposes of Governor Cox that are drawing the Republican vote.

One Republican family in which there are six votes went to Cox on the League of Nations issue. Two of the sons fought in France. The memories of the days of their absence linger with the members of that household, and they say they intend to vote for the candidate who has faith that something can be done to prevent a recurrence of world calamities.

Among others who have quietly gone over to the Ohio governor and are saying nothing except to intimate friends are Progressives who were followers of Roosevelt in 1912. They say that the man who referred to the Progressives as "a concentration of all the forces of failure and discontent" referred to Roosevelt as "a modern Aaron Burr" and to William Johnson as "a faker and blackguard" have no claim now on their support. They say they cannot vote for Harding without sacrificing their ideals.

An open forum will be held and all persons interested in the election of Cox and Roosevelt will be invited to take part in discussions relative to the present campaign.

Congressman C. N. McArthur has gone to Grants Pass, where he will be the speaker at a Republican rally to be held there tonight. He plans to go to Crater lake from Grants Pass, and will speak at Klamath Falls Thursday evening, returning to Portland Saturday.

Methodist preachers of Portland were urged by Bishop L. J. Birney this morning at the First Methodist church to do more of the vital work of the church and to get down to fundamentals. It was Tuesday night at the First Methodist church, Bishop Birney addressed the congregation, and he declared that the world no longer responds to the old fashioned revival methods.

Preachers were urged to be more loyal to their work and to remember that "there never was a time when the world is listening with such a heart of yearning to hear the voice of God." Bishop Birney said from Vancouver, B. C., on Thursday to take charge of Methodism in China. He will address a city wide meeting of Methodism at 7:45 o'clock tonight at the First Methodist church. Bishop Birney also addressed the Methodist Social Union today at its noon luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce.

Enroute East From Shipyard Inquiry

Charles B. Brewer, naval assistant to the department of justice, Washington, D. C., paid a social call this morning on United States Attorney Lester W. Humphreys. Brewer is returning east from Seattle, where he was investigating shipyard cases. His presence in Portland is not likely to produce any connection with local shipyard investigations, Humphreys said.

Galice Litigation Ends
Motion of the Galice Consolidated Mines company to dismiss the bill in intervention filed by Emma G. Robinson was allowed this morning by Federal Judge R. S. Bean. This ends present federal court litigation in this case. The suit was brought by Mrs. Robinson over the sale and upkeep of certain mining properties.

Wreck Delays Trains
North Powder, Sept. 20.—Due to a freight wreck near here O-W-R. & N. trains are delayed about 12 hours.

UNPAID TAXES TO BE DELINQUENT ON OCTOBER 5, NEXT

The second installment of county taxes is due and payable and unpaid taxes will become delinquent on October 5. A penalty of 5 per cent will attach to such delinquencies. A penalty of 1 per cent a month attaches to the first half of tax payments, those having become delinquent in April.

Monday morning there remained uncollected taxes to the total amount of \$114,831.47 out of the total tax roll of \$1,907,732.40. It is because of this heavy delinquency that the county treasury is short and warrants for salaries have to be marked unpaid for lack of funds.

It is expected the payment of taxes will reach such a volume that resumption of warrant payments may be made soon after October 1.

WOMEN RECAPITULATED WHEN HUSBANDS BECOME CITIZENS
Applications for final citizenship papers were heard before Presiding Judge Tazewell today, with Inspector Smith as examiner and J. B. Easter representing the natives. There were the first two hearings resulted in the repatriation of two women who had been born American citizens but who lost their citizenship by marrying foreigners.

Charley Gustav Holmes, a native of Denmark, was the first applicant given a hearing and to whom the final papers were granted. John Des France was the second. In each case their wives were present to take the oaths that again made them Americans.

DAMAGE SUIT OF SCHOOL GIRL FOR \$100,000 BEGINS
The suit of Florence Rostad, by Celia Rostad, her guardian, against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company was begun this morning before Circuit Judge Tucker. Most of the day was consumed in securing a jury. Florence Rostad, who was a 17-year-old high school girl, is suing for \$100,000 for the loss of her left arm and left leg. As she was attempting to board a streetcar at Twenty-ninth avenue and East Fifth street, March 30, she was thrown under the car.

NEW INCORPORATION GIVES Y. M. C. A. WIDER POWER
The Young Men's Christian Association of Portland filed amended articles of incorporation today with the Multnomah county clerk, in which the association is given greater power to establish and maintain schools and educational institutions and adopt new regulations for organizing the board of trustees. The articles were filed by W. M. Ladd, president; S. A. Brown, treasurer, and L. Veasey, recording secretary and ex-officio members of the board of trustees.

Trousers Used To Signal Coast Guard to Rescue

Marshfield, Or., Sept. 20.—Using his trousers as a distress signal, a fisherman from the Umpqua river in the boat "Patches" attracted the attention of the Coast Bay guard. The gasoline supply gave out and the boat drifted to a point five miles north of Coos bay. The coast guard took out the life boat and reached the boat as it was being driven into the breakers and towed it safely into port.

MANY NEWSPAPERS GAGGED, SAYS COX

San Diego, Cal., Sept. 20.—(U. P.)—Governor James M. Cox charged in a speech here today that "the senatorial oligarchy has planned liberally to gain control of the great newspapers of the country."

"Nine tenths of the newspapers of California dare not print the news," the governor said.

"I have found that a great many reactionary papers are not printing the news. They decline to have the case tried before the jury of public opinion. They refuse to publish my speeches and deny to their readers the right to have the case presented against the senatorial oligarchy."

WOULD ENFORCE DRY LAW
The governor today made one of his most emphatic pronouncements on the prohibition question.

"The eighteenth amendment is going to be enforced," he said. "You have people come to you and say 'Cox is all right on the league but he's a little damp'." The governor declared. "When I take my oath to enforce the law next March, I'm not going to violate it."

Cox declared also that he favors a tariff to protect the Southern California growers against Italian competition. "While in congress in 1909 I favored a tariff high enough to make up the difference between labor costs in California and Italy and the transportation charges between California and New York and Italy and New York," Cox said. "That was my creed then and it is now."

RESERVATIONS ALL RIGHT
Cox declared that he would accept reservations to the peace treaty as proposed by Senator Hitchcock. Democratic leader, and asserted that these would involve all possibility of unequal voting power between the United States and Great Britain.

He was given a big hand when, in referring to the dramatic settlement of the Polish-Lithuanian dispute, he said that the league is already preventing war.

Three Inmates of State Asylum Soon Will Be Deported
Three inmates of the state insane asylum at Salem recently considered, will be deported, says R. P. Bonham, head of the United States immigration service. One is a Mexican, Adolph Weiss, who has been in the country only a few months; another is a native of Chile, Sergio, alias Diaz, who forged a check on his father for \$8000 in Valparaiso, started for England, landed in the United States and lost his mind. The third is a Canadian.

The state officials work closely with the immigration office and as soon as new commitments of foreigners arrive, notify Bonham. The state is thus saved the expense of caring for foreign insane.

McSwiney Enters on 39th Day of His Fast
London, Sept. 20.—(U. P.)—Lord Mayor Patrick McSwiney, doing well, began his thirty-ninth day of hunger striking today. The last bulletin from Sinn Fein headquarters said he was perceptibly weaker but still conscious.

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CALIFORNIAN PAYS PORTLAND TRIBUTE AS COMPETITOR

"To See Ourselves as Others See Us" was today's subject at the members' forum luncheon at the Chamber of Commerce. L. W. Hartman, vice president of the J. T. Steeb company, declared he heard less of Portland in Seattle than he did in New York. "A year and a half ago Seattle laughed at the idea that Portland could possibly become a gateway."

Marshall Diggs, president of the Sacramento Development company, said: "California doesn't wake up, Oregon and Washington will soon pass her in development work."

"Throughout the East, Portland has a reputation for being about everything she is not, according to Walter A. Frost, formerly of Chicago, who recently came to Portland as president of A. Rupert & Co. Inc.

"I carried a chip on my shoulder," declared Frost, "because I had been told this was one of the hardest cities to do business in. I was told by bankers were of the small town kind; that your people, instead of welcoming the stranger, discouraged him. The charges are untrue. They should be combated."

Drunkenness Charge Brings Fine of \$25 After Auto Accident
Archie L. Wright, 5254 East Sixty-ninth street, who was arrested on a charge of drunkenness after an automobile accident at Seventeenth and Lovejoy streets Saturday night was fined \$25 in municipal court today.

Wright was riding in the machine which overturned and injured Harry Olinger, 618 Thurman street, who is now in a serious plight at St. Vincent's hospital. Efforts are being made by the police to find a third man who was riding in the machine but escaped before the police arrived.

Olinger, who was conscious Monday, told the police through hospital authorities that he was driving the machine and was responsible for the accident, and no further charges will be preferred against Wright who, it was first believed, was driving at the time of the accident.

Fowler Appointed Second Lieutenant; Refuses Commission
Washington, Sept. 20.—(WASHINGTON BUREAU OF THE JOURNAL)—Ernest A. M. Fowler of the Nortonia hotel, Portland, has been appointed a second lieutenant in the quartermaster corps of the regular army.

Ernest A. M. Fowler has been superintendent of the Portland army retail store since it started. At first he directed the work as a member of the quartermaster's corps, but he now directs it as a civilian. Fowler announced that he had decided not to accept the commission offered, but to remain in civilian life. Fowler rose high in the ranks during the war and saw service overseas. He also took a course in an officers' training school.

Arraigned on Charge Of Breaking Dry Law
Arthur Snodgrass and Charles Collins, arrested at 308 Trenton street by federal agents on charges of violating the prohibition law, were arraigned before United States Commissioner Drake this morning. Snodgrass waived his right to a hearing and was held to the grand jury until \$500 bail. In default of bond he is held in the county jail. Collins asked to have his hearing set Tuesday. His bail was set at \$250. Both men are charged with manufacturing and possessing liquor.
