

# Seven Points Separate First Five Clubs as Clubs Enter Home Stretch in Coast Race

## Coast Clubs Begin Final Month's Play

PACIFIC Coast league clubs begin the final month's play Tuesday afternoon. With only seven points separating the league leading Tigers from the fifth place Seattle club, the race for the championship promises to be one of the hottest in the history of the circuit.

Tuesday the Tigers will tackle the Oakland club in the opener of a seven-game series, while the Angels will enter the San Francisco club on the Los Angeles grounds. Salt Lake is scheduled for seven games at Portland, but unless Jupe Pluvius is good and kind the two teams may only get in a part of their schedule. The Seattle club will enter the Sacramento club.

**TIGERS LEAD SMALL**  
The Oakland club may give the Tigers all they are looking for in their series. Del Howard's club seems to have taken a new lease on life since his pitchers are showing high class form. Los Angeles is expected to cop the series from San Francisco, which will brighten its chances for the pennant.

Vernon is leading the Los Angeles club by a margin of two games, while the lead the Angels hold over Salt Lake is a half a game wider. Salt Lake tops San Francisco by a one-game margin and the gap between Seattle and the first division is one half game.

**DOPE ON A. L. PENNANT RACE**  
After 12 more days, not including Tuesday's schedule, the major league clubs will wind up their pennant races. The Brooklyn club has practically secured a strangle hold on the National league championship title, while Cleveland is favored to win the American league title.

Wednesday marks the opening of what will likely be the deciding series of the American race, Chicago being billed to play three games with the Cleveland club at Cleveland. After the Sox series the Indians tackle the St. Louis club in four games and then meet the Detroit club in the same number of contests, while Chicago has yet to play three games with St. Louis and one with Detroit.

The New York club is billed to tangle with Washington and Philadelphia in three-game series and has also one postponed contest to play.

Boston, Sept. 21.—(U. S. S.)—The Massachusetts boxing commission today refused to grant a permit for a ten-round boxing bout between Jack Dempsey and Bill Brennan of Chicago here.

The application was made by Larry Conley, Carl Barrett, one of the commissioners, said that no permit for a Dempsey-Brennan bout in Massachusetts would be granted unless the champion met a logical contender for the title. The commission had previously refused a permit for a Dempsey-Nolan bout.

## AUTO RACES TO FEATURE STATE FAIR AT SALEM

SALEM, Or., Sept. 21.—Half a score of famous speed kings are en route to Salem to participate in the Oregon state fair competition on September 27 and 28, according to announcement made by exhibition officials.

Prominent among the speed kings will be Fred Horey of St. Paul, for three years a national track champion. Horey is bringing a powerful special built racing creation here and expects to tack up a new speed mark for distances varying from one to five miles.

Bill Eastick, who has won the Pacific Coast, now holds 11 world records for various distances and will be looked upon as the most likely to record break in the events. Eastick is a Canadian champion and holder of track records at Saskatoon, Regina, Calgary, Winnipeg and other Canadian racing centers, also is listed among the starters.

Paul Henderson of Omaha may also line up against the more famed speed boys for a match race. Sanction board officials from the International Motor Contest association are in charge of the program and are now listing the events. Entries will close for the competition on September 24, when a representative of the control body will be in the city to inspect all cars and divide the events in accordance with car classification.

Irving Putty Huffman, claimant of the championship of the state of Wisconsin, is coming West to compete in the Coast races and will be one of the starters in the competitive events scheduled for the Oregon state fair.

## JOHNNY MURPHY AND B. HAYWARD ARE BACK AGAIN

Both Have Few Words to Add About the Happenings at the Olympic Games.

JOHNNY MURPHY, national high jump champion, returned to Portland Tuesday after having represented the United States at the Olympic games in Belgium last month. The Multnomah Amateur Athletic club star, who is a student at Notre Dame university, will remain with his parents for a few days before returning to his studies.

He won first place in the final tryouts at Boston, but in the games he was handicapped, although he won points for the Yankees in his particular event. Considerable has been said about the treatment of the American athletes both on their way over and while in Belgium, and although Johnny is a quiet, unassuming sort, he has a few words to say regarding the matter.

In his particular case he was given much better treatment inasmuch as the first place athletes in the Boston tryouts were quartered in the hospital of the ship, and as a result of this those particular men were able to have a rest a little better than some of the rest.

As for the "raps" that have been taken by some of the athletes toward the trainers, Bill Hayward, who also was a Portland visitor, having attended the games, says that they are unwarranted. The trainers did the best they could under the circumstances. The fact that six athletes were taken over for each event when only four were allowed to compete in the game, made the fifth and sixth men feel that they had just as much right to enter the Olympic competition as any of the others.

**TRAINERS NOT AT FAULT**  
The trainers decided that a tryout between the third, fourth, fifth and sixth place men in each event should be held but in holding two or three events the time was so short that nothing further could be done. One of the events in which trials between the four athletes was the hammer throw in which Mercurio, the University of California athlete, competed. In the final tryouts at Boston, Merchant was placed sixth, and in the tryouts "over there" he failed to make up a notch. The coaches later decided to stand by the Boston results as far as possible.

While on the trip over on the transport the University of Oregon track and field team coach took motion pictures of all the doings of the Yankees in training, but when he arrived at the games he was prevented from taking very much because of the exclusive rights purchased by a leading "weekly news" motion picture concern. At that he secured a few.

Hayward left for Eugene Saturday morning, and Monday will find him getting ready to look after the University of Oregon football players.

**Coleman Is Winner In Auto Road Race**  
Denver, Colo., Sept. 21.—(U. P.)—A Chevrolet car, driven by A. M. Coleman, won the annual Denver-Pueblo road race here today. The time for the 110 miles was 2:09:40. An Essex car was second, finishing 10 minutes later. The winner received \$500 as first money, and \$100 went to the second place driver.

Leo Banks, pilot of a Revere, was slightly injured when his car was wrecked. This was the only accident of the race.

Lexington, Ky., will distribute \$75,000 in stakes and purses in its grand circuit races. There are 40 classes included in the activities.

## Gambling in Baseball Is Before Jury

CHICAGO, Sept. 21.—(U. S. S.)—The grand jury probe of alleged dishonesty in organized baseball will get under way in earnest here tomorrow when more than a dozen witnesses, including the highest officials in baseball, will appear in answer to subpoenas to testify before the equatorial body.

Indictments are promised by Assistant States Attorney Hartley Henkle, who is conducting the investigation, if evidence to warrant such action is forthcoming.

Subpoenas for 12 baseball men and sports writers have been issued. They are: John Heydler, president of the National league; Ban J. Johnson, president of the American league; Charles A. Comiskey, owner of the Chicago White Sox; William "Kid" Gleason, the Sox manager; William L. Veck, president of the Chicago Cubs; J. C. "Rube" Benton, pitcher of the New York Giants; Sam F. Hall, sports editor of the Chicago Herald and Examiner; Harvey Woodruff, sports editor of the Chicago Tribune; I. E. Sanborn, baseball writer for the Tribune; Oscar Reichow, baseball writer of the Chicago Daily News; and Bert E. Collier and Frank Kline, who edit a sporting journal.

The grand jury is expected to probe thoroughly charges made that certain players of the Chicago White Sox were "informed" by gamblers during the world's series with the Cincinnati Reds last fall. The most recent charges of gambling "crookedness" in the game between the Chicago Cubs and the Philadelphia Nationals on August 31 also will be probed.

Asked why Pitcher Benton of the Giants had been subpoenaed, Attorney Replegle said it was "because he knows a h—l of a lot." Replegle said Benton would be asked to tell "what a certain player on the Cubs team asked him to do."

"It is known," Replegle said, "that Benton was offered \$750 to lose a ball game that he pitched. The man who made the offer was an associate of gamblers but is no longer a member of the Cubs."

President Veck of the Cubs and officials of the White Sox said the probe will be welcomed and every possible co-operation given the grand jury.

President Ban Johnson of the American league has announced that he will ask congress to pass laws making betting on baseball games a penitentiary offense.

I won first place by 20.01 points over Clarence Pinkerton of San Francisco and 25 points over Louis Balbach, who used to compete for Multnomah club, but now is wearing the colors of the New York Athletic club.

"Gee, Mr. Watkins, but it is great to be a champion. All I have done since I won the title of world's spring board diving champion is to pose for photographs and also autograph everything conceivable. I always put the "Winged-Ai" after my signature. While I'm over here, I'm going to take in all the sights, especially now that the strain of competing is over. Will leave here in time to get in New York around September 20."

## Officials Cannot Make Open Dates

Salem, Sept. 21.—No official or commission possesses the authority or the power to make an open hunting or fishing season contrary to the statute, however desirable it might be, according to an opinion prepared by Attorney General Brown for A. J. Moore, district attorney for Deschutes county.

All officers of the state, from the highest to the lowest, are creators of the law and bound to obey it. An opinion holds that "if the state law is to change the open season in Eastern Oregon it is the duty of the legislature to do so."
