

MCADOO NOT TO DELIVER ADDRESS AT THE ROUND-UP

William Gibbs McAdoo will not speak at the Pendleton Round-Up. That was the announcement made at Cox headquarters Tuesday following receipt of a wire from the national speakers' bureau stating that the McAdoo itinerary had not yet been made up. He could not, Cox leaders point out, leave the East at this late date, tour the Middle West, and arrive in time for the frontier show at the Eastern Oregon city.

Although the man who supervised establishment of the federal reserve and farm loan systems will not talk at the Round-Up, Cox leaders say that he will unquestionably speak at Pendleton when he does arrive in the West. It is also planned to send McAdoo to Astoria, Medford and to either Eugene or Marshfield. It may be possible to arrange for speaking dates in other Oregon cities, but present plans do not call for an address by McAdoo in Portland.

Cox leaders are disappointed at the failure of McAdoo to arrive in time for the Round-Up. There he would reach thousands of Oregonians with his message. And as the man who is so closely identified with the federal reserve system, McAdoo is hailed as one speaker who would have tremendous effect on those in Oregon who do not want to see the capitalists of the East in control of the federal reserve board and through it the credit and currency of the country. Many have fear that harm is to come to it in the event of the election of Senator Harding.

State Land Board Lacks Authority To Cut Royalties

Salem, Sept. 22.—The state land board has no authority to make any exemptions from payments of royalty on sand and gravel taken from navigable streams within the state, except such as might be used for highway purposes, according to an opinion prepared by Attorney General Brown.

Representatives of Portland sand and gravel companies recently appeared before the board asking that an exemption from royalty payments be made in the case of sand and gravel excavated since the effective date of the law on contracts made prior to the enactment of the law. Two Portland companies, in remitting their royalty, had held out payments aggregating \$2874.75 pending action by the board on their request for exemptions.

Portland Union Man Arrested for Sharing In Railroad Strike

Paul S. Sheridan, 1133 Canyon Road, former secretary of the Portland local of the United Association of Railroad employees, was arrested here Tuesday afternoon by Deputy United States Marshal Willis on a secret indictment returned by a federal grand jury in Chicago charging him with a conspiracy to violate the Lever food control act. Sheridan was secretary of the Portland local at the time of the "rebel" strike of switchmen and other railroad workers, April 9, and for the part he is alleged to have played in that strike he was arrested. The charge is "inter-

ference with the transportation of food-stuffs." Bond has been fixed, the local marshal's office is advised, at \$5000. Sheridan is reported to have said he will waive a fight against removal to Chicago and will be taken there to face the charge, in connection with a number of other men arrested on like indictments.

Since the strike Sheridan has not held the union office, but has been doing shipyard work and was for a time employed as a longshoreman. He has been a resident in Portland for about three years.

Erring Girl's Wish Granted; Save Body From Potter's Field

San Francisco, Sept. 22.—(U. P.)—Margaret Shields of Philadelphia, driven to drugs by a blasted romance and to the grave by drugs, had her last wish answered.

She was not buried in the potter's field. Instead, her body was carried to the cemetery in a flower-straw basket and lowered carefully into the grave while a score of local stage folk stood with bared heads. Yet none of those who made the pilgrimage to the cemetery had known the girl in life.

The funeral was made possible by the actors' fund of New York, when it was found that Miss Shields once sang and danced in the Canary Cottage company. "When so much kindness is to be found among those whose occupations makes all their relations transient and temporary, there is faith and hope in human kind," said the Rev. Father McQuaid, as he pronounced the last rites over the silent figure that once had been gay.

Plane Wrecked at Medford, but Both Men Are Uninjured

Medford, Sept. 22.—The first accident on the Medford aviation field took place Tuesday noon when four planes from the Eugene base arrived at the field to depart later in the day with the planes of the Medford base for Mather field, Sacramento, this being the last day of the forest patrol service in Oregon.

The third of the planes to arrive from Eugene was a big De Havilland with Pilot Degorma and Mechanic Luddy. In making the landing, Degorma flew too low and struck trees at the end of the field. The plane nose dived and completely overturned. The men were not hurt beyond a few minor bruises, but the plane was wrecked.

Yakima Police Seize Whiskey and Beer

Yakima, Wash., Sept. 22.—Two seizures of liquor were made on the opening day of the State fair, one comprising 400 pints of home brew. Jimmy Bagley was arrested. The police seized an automobile parked in the streets, securing 58 quarts of Canadian bonded whiskey. Harry Adams, driver, and C. Bodin, companion, were arrested but forfeited \$150 cash bail each.

Drivers to Pay More For Violating Laws

Salem, Sept. 22.—The high cost of violating traffic laws continues to mount in Salem. According to a new schedule of fines announced by Police Judge Earl Race, before whose tribunal most of the offenders heretofore are haled, \$25 will be about the smallest amount in the shape of a bond to insure appearance in court hereafter, whether the offense be cutting a corner, running with bright lights on or lights out, or spitting the atmosphere in excess of the speed limits.

STORES IN EUGENE CLOSED FOR FAIR

Eugene, Sept. 22.—The Lane county fair opened Tuesday with a fair attendance in spite of the customary rain. The exhibits in every department are unusually varied and complete. The county granges making particularly fine exhibits of fruits and vegetables.

The entries of livestock have been so numerous that new buildings have been provided. The collection of dairy cattle is the largest and finest ever shown in this county. The racing card includes some of the fastest horses in the Northwest circuit and is supplemented by automobile races, motorcycle races and auto polo. The Elks' band of this city is on the grounds for afternoon and evening concerts.

Wednesday is "Eugene day"—the red letter day of the week. Schools, stores and offices are closed. The Radiators of this city will act as hosts for delegations of Portland Rosarians, Salem Cher-

jians and representatives from the Albany Chamber of Commerce. The visitors will be guests at luncheon on the grounds and otherwise entertained.

Thursday is "Farmers' day" and granges of the county will occupy the center of the stage. An invitation has been extended to Governor Olcott and Master C. E. Spence of the State grange to speak. Friday is marked by a big sale of pure bred livestock, which is attracting wide attention. Saturday is given over to sports and races.

Spectators thronged the streets of Eugene Monday night when the annual "Style Show" was thrown open with a glare of incandescents and the blare of brass bands. All the principal stores of the city staged window displays that were the last word in the decorator's art.

Grocery stores vied with dry goods emporiums and jewelry shops in the ingenuity of arrangement and beauty of decorations. Sporting goods stores presented sylvan scenes with mounted birds and live quail and fawns from the game farm. In the latter part of the evening a section of smooth paving was roped off for dancing.

space for them in a barnyard at Richmond and Syracuse streets. The cows were reported to the Humane society this morning and investigation showed them no worse for the trying hours of the "round-up."

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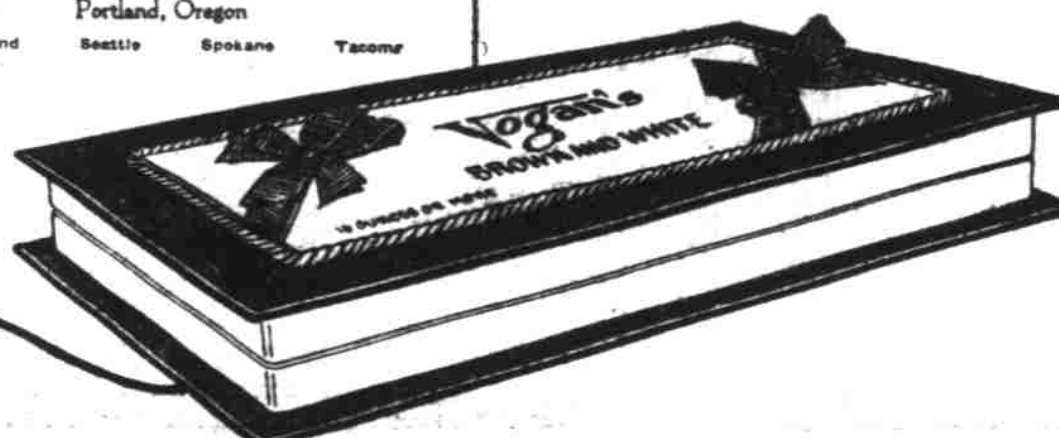
