

DOCK COMMISSION ASKS \$634,091.80 BUDGET FOR 1921

Eliminating the item of \$2100 for a fire marshal at terminal No. 4 and a matter of \$1400 for dock expenses for the several terminals, the dock commission passed a bill Friday morning asking for \$634,091.80 as a budget on the tax levy for 1921.

The original budget called for \$637,481.80. The advance over 1920 was based on the increased business, interest on bond issue and incidental overhead.

Time of the dock commission was taken up with a lengthy discussion on the item of the employment of a fire marshal. The item involved an expenditure of \$2100 per year.

Commissioner Sigel refused to place a fire marshal at the terminal at the expense of the city. On motion of Averill it was decreed to remove the item from the budget.
