Chicago Wheat Is Advanced 10 to 11 Cents Bushel

Chicago, Sept. 27.—(U. S. P.)—Bear sentiment gave way in the face of heavy spot covering, and prices of grain futures averaged higher in an excited market on the board of trade today.

Wheat covered a range of 10¢ to 11¢ and finished 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ higher. September corn advanced 5¢ from its early low under top-loss buying.

Chicago, Sept. 27.—(U. S. P.)—With an active mixed trade, but with scattered selling and buying by shorts and near-board buyers held out higher throughout and the close was 1/2¢ to 3/4¢ higher.

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EARLY RISE IN STOCK TO ADING

New York, Sept. 27.—(U. P.)—The New York Evening Sun financial review of this afternoon said:

Bearish sentiment exerted a marked influence in the securities market at the beginning of the new week, and selling by shorts proceeded at a relatively rapid pace after the first 15 minutes or so.

Prices are down to bedrock in some lines, as for instance the cattle and sheep trade. Retailers have not passed the loss prices in full to the consumer.
