

INTEREST IN BRITISH LABOR KEEN

COAL STRIKE HAS TRADERS GUESSING

New York, Sept. 27.—Next to the price cutting wave that is sweeping over the United States, the most important development of the past few weeks from a stock market point of view is the postponement of the British coal miners' strike.

If the strike really is made effective its consequences may be terrible. The whole financial world is watching the British coal situation. Every investor and little trader in Wall street is as much interested in the British labor situation as he is in price cutting in this country.

While the price cutting wave inaugurated by Henry Ford alarmed a good many patriots it is considered by bankers to be one of the most constructive consequences since the war ended. Everybody knew that prices must come down. Little people cannot cut them because that would simply mean personal ruin and no public benefit. It had to be done by some person of nationwide influence who could afford to stand a great loss. Henry Ford will lose it, it is estimated, about \$20,000,000 through this cut in the price of his cars. He is off to patriotism and advertising and he can well afford to do so. He has forced other big men to follow his lead.
