

SOLDIERS DISPERSE BELFAST RIOTERS; SCORES ARE HURT

Belfast, Sept. 28.—(I. N. S.)—More than a score of persons were injured in a great outbreak of rioting here today. Following a series of clashes early in the day, during which seven persons were hurt, the soldiers cleared the streets at the point of the bayonet.

Later violence was resumed, the rioting extending into Earl street.

Reinforcements of soldiers were rushed to the scene and the streets were patrolled by troops in armored cars with automatic service pistols in their hands. Tanks were concentrated and held in readiness for any emergency.

POLICE THREATEN TO BURN TOWNS IN COUNTY CLARE

Dublin, Sept. 28.—(U. P.)—Police placards threatening to burn County Clare towns were plastered over the city of Ennis today.

The placards bore the ultimatum that the cities will be destroyed if Captain Lenbrum, who disappeared while in Kilkee, is not returned unharmed within 24 hours. The placards threatened to burn Kilkee, Kilmahon, Carrigrohilly, Donbeg, Kilmahon and other West Clare villages.

In one of the Dublin riots last night, seven soldiers and civilians were sent to hospitals with revolver wounds. The soldiers charged a mob, the threat of bayonets dispersing it. Members of the mob retaliated by firing into the troops.

Citizens of Athenry, County Galway, closed in their night clothes, on foot, to kneel in the roadway last night until they promised to lift their boycott against the police.

Belfast, scene of much rioting, was quiet last night except for small outbreaks in which stones flew.

The riots of the last week resulted in such a storm that Dublin Castle hastened to start investigations.

diplomatic charges continued today before Mayor Baker. Federal agents who accompanied the officers, on foot, testified that they had warned the local police that "Hedderly will try and run over you with his car; he has done that in the past, so watch out."

As the hearing was resumed, all mention of the "legitimate ring" alleged to be back of the prosecution of the officers, was dropped. Injection of the issue clouded the purpose of the hearing, attorneys for both sides agreed.

Hedderly attempted to escape the officers at Union avenue and Stark street when he was shot. Death resulted a day later.

Police officers and detectives were called at the hearing during the early sessions today, their main testimony being that they would have acted as Jackson and Morris did under like circumstances.

It was contended that Hedderly attempted to run down Morris with his automobile and that the consequent shooting was justified.

T. M. Word, former sheriff of Multnomah county, said he would have done as Jackson and Morris, and when Goldstein criticized his attitude, the reply was: "When you defended me in federal court, Mr. Goldstein, for taking a shot at this same man, you said I was the best officer in Oregon."

"But you didn't kill him, did you?"

"No, because I missed fire. I was out of practice."

London, Sept. 28.—(I. N. S.)—Terence MacSwiney, hunger striking lord mayor of Cork, was still conscious in the Brixton jail infirmary this morning, but was described as "extremely exhausted."

This was the forty-seventh day of his hunger strike.

New York, Sept. 28.—(U. P.)—Grey shadows falling down from the high windows softened the hues of the great banks of flowers and dimmed the lustre of the gowns of richly dressed women.

A silence pervaded the great church, broken only by the solemn voice of a priest intoning the Episcopal funeral ritual. From the street came the muffled hum of traffic.

The entire service gave the illusion of a silent drama.

This was the last "fade out" of Olive Thomas.

The funeral of the noted motion picture actress, who died in Paris as a result of accidentally taking poison, drew thousands of persons from all walks of life to St. Thomas church on Fifth avenue. There were millionaires and paupers, stars and members of the chorus, friends and the merely curious.

WHEELING GIVES HARDING WELCOME

Wheeling, W. Va., Sept. 28.—(U. P.)—A cheering crowd of thousands which had come from all the surrounding country greeted Warren G. Harding on his arrival shortly after noon here today. The reception at the railroad station was one of the most enthusiastic of the present trip. Shouts of the crowd were almost drowned in a din of factory whistles as the train pulled in.

On his arrival Harding announced that he will speak at Buffalo, N. Y., the night of October 21.

More than 500 railroad workers and residents of Grafton cheered Warren G. Harding as he defended the Cummins-Each railroad act in a speech from the station steps there today. It was his first speech in West Virginia during the campaign.

"Railroad workers are coming to understand that they can get their troubles adjusted by a recognized authority under this law," Harding said. "If the administration were now carrying out the provisions of the act requiring pro-rata distribution of coal cars to mines, the situation would be infinitely better."

Harding declared: "I am sorry that that provision is not being carried out by the present administration."

At Fairmont, Harding walked around the station platform shaking hands. His train arrived one hour ahead of the announced time and only a comparatively small crowd was on hand. In a short speech Harding declared a return to a "common sense government."

Season for Bagging Ducks and Pheasants Will Begin on Friday

The open season for China pheasants and wild ducks begins next Friday. Ducks have already appeared on the Columbia river and along the coast.

Bag limits on ducks are not to exceed 25 in any one day nor 30 in any seven consecutive days. On China pheasants, only five may be killed in any one day, and not to exceed 10 in any seven consecutive days, with not more than three female pheasants in any bag of 10.

The season will remain open for pheasants until October 31, and for ducks until December 31.

Huge Crowd Goes To Hear Address Of Dr. Lovejoy

Scores of men and women were turned away from the hall in which Dr. Esther Pohl Lovejoy, Democratic-Prohibition candidate for congress, spoke in the Central library Monday night. The meeting was the first of the campaign under the auspices of the Oregon Popular Government league.

Dr. Lovejoy was introduced by Dr. W. K. Howard, chaplain of Good Samaritan hospital and president of the league. He declared his standards for "humanity first, property rights next, and in constructive and conservative enough to preserve all that is good in government and to fight for necessary reforms that will make the people of the country happier."

Dr. Lovejoy will speak tonight in the Arieta Baptist church.

FRENCHMAN WINS THE BENNETT CUP; U. S. IS ELIMINATED

Etampes, France, Sept. 28.—(I. N. S.)—Sadi Lecointe, flying in a Nieuport airplane, won the James Gordon Bennett cup race for France this afternoon. Lecointe had a comparatively easy victory, as all of the contestants, save Frederick P. Raynham of Great Britain, flying in a Martinsyde airplane, were compelled to drop out. Lecointe's time was one hour six minutes 17 1/2 seconds.

YANKEES ELIMINATED

The two American contestants—Major Rudolph Schroeder, flying in a United States army airplane, and Howard M. Rinehardt, flying in a Dayton-Wright monoplane, were compelled to abandon the race in its early stages. Schroeder had too much gas for the exhaust pipes of his plane and he feared it would set on fire. He landed at 2:55 o'clock and was officially disqualified for failing to pass the first turning point. Rinehardt could not see clearly and was unable to control the direction of his plane.

The dropping out of Schroeder and Rinehardt put the United States out of the contest. Captain Le Romanet of France, after dropping out of the race, reentered merely for the purpose of finishing the course. His reumption could not affect the result of the race.

LEAGUE HOLDS IRISH HOPES, SAYS WILSON

I think satisfactorily answer your inquiries.

The questions and answers are as follows:

"Q. Under the covenant, does the nation obligate itself to assist any member of the league in putting down a rebellion of its subjects or conquered peoples?"

"A. It does not.

"Q. Under the covenant, does this nation independently recognize a government whose people seek to achieve or have achieved their independence from a member of the league?"

"A. The independent action of the government of the United States in a matter of this kind is in no way limited or affected by the covenant of the League of Nations.

"Q. Under the covenant, are those subject nations or peoples only that are mentioned in the peace treaty entitled to the right of self-determination or does the league possess the right to accord a similar privilege to other subject nations or peoples?"

"A.—It was not possible for the peace conference to act with regard to the self-determination of any territories except those which had belonged to the defeated empires, but in the covenant of the league it has set up in Article XI a forum to which all claims of self-determination which are likely to disturb the peace of the world or the good understanding between nations upon which the peace of the world depends, can be brought.

"Q.—Why was the case of Ireland not heard at the peace conference? And what is your position on the subject of self-determination of Ireland?"

"A.—The case of Ireland was not heard at the peace conference because the conference has no jurisdiction over any questions of that sort which did not affect territory which belonged to the defeated empires. My position on the subject of self-determination for Ireland is expressed in Article XI of the covenant in which I may say I was particularly interested, because it seemed to me necessary for the peace and freedom of the world that a forum should be created to which all peoples could bring any matter which was likely to affect the peace and freedom of the world.

COX PRAISES BRYAN IN COMMONER'S HOME STATE

Omaha, Sept. 28.—With the aid of Senator Gilbert Hitchcock, Governor Cox gave Nebraska his League of Nations message Monday.

It was declared by Senator Hitchcock that the lack of enthusiasm over this issue in Nebraska was due to "the large percentage of German born in the state, which is solid for Harding."

The Democratic candidate found hostility at several stops on the league quest, but he made a determined effort in the face of it. It was one of the most strenuous days of his western campaign.

BOTH HIGH MINDED

At Omaha he was asked by newspapermen if he endorsed the administration of Attorney General Palmer and Postmaster General Albert S. Burleson.

"I know Attorney General Palmer and Postmaster General Burleson to be high minded, conscientious men and believe that their administrations were wholeheartedly performed," he replied. "Yet, there are matters in both of their administrations which I do not endorse. Neither did I endorse the policy of Frank Hitchcock as postmaster general. He is the gentleman who ran the road roller over Roosevelt in the 1912 convention and in 1920 organized the northern delegates for General Wood."

He asserted throughout his Monday speeches to farmers that further declines in food prices may be determined unless the markets and credits of the world are reestablished through the League of Nations.

Governor Cox spent two hours in Lincoln and spoke earlier at North Platte, Lexington, Kearney, Grand Island, Aurora, York and Seward. He will spend Tuesday in South Dakota.

PAROLE GRANTED TO MRS. STEIGER

Salem, Sept. 28.—Mrs. Lena Steiger, 53, was sentenced Tuesday to serve a term of seven years in the state penitentiary for complicity in an assault with intent to kill her husband, Theodore W. Steiger, last March and was then paroled from the bench by Judge Percy R. Kelly, on condition that she never visit Steiger's farm nor communicate with him.

Mrs. Steiger was found "guilty last week. Jesse Mullinix, who made the assault, shooting at Steiger five times, is serving an eight year sentence in the penitentiary.

District Attorney Heltzel stated that he would not oppose her parole inasmuch as Steiger had informed him that he was agreeable to such action if she would consent to stay away from the farm and not communicate with him.

Declaring that if absolute justice without mercy should prevail Mrs. Steiger should be required to serve her full seven years in prison, Judge Kelly granted the parole.

CHARGES FLY THICK AND FAST IN BALL SCANDAL

Chicago, Sept. 28.—(I. N. S.)—With high officials in organized baseball here ready to present affidavits, letters and other documentary evidence, and world famous ball players waiting the summons to the witness stand, the Cook county grand jury was prepared today to take further evidence of the amazing elimination of crooked baseball players and naturally I feel in sympathy with any movement to keep the sport clean."

John McGraw, manager of the New York Giants, arrived in Chicago today to testify before the grand jury. He was accompanied by Judge P. X. McQuaid, vice president of the club.

"I'm going to tell everything I know," said McGraw, "have been a pioneer in the elimination of crooked baseball players and naturally I feel in sympathy with any movement to keep the sport clean."

One of the witnesses likely to be subpoenaed today is William Maharg, former prizefighter, whose confession at Philadelphia that he and Bill Burns, former White Sox pitcher, were involved in the "fixing" of the 1919 world series, constitutes the latest sensation of the inquiry. Mrs. Henrietta B. Kelly, owner of an apartment building in which several White Sox players lived: "Kid" Gleason, manager of the White Sox, and Roy Schalk, star catcher, are witnesses likely to be called on to testify today.

CICOTTE INVOLVED

Maharg's confession that the White Sox were bribed to throw the series for \$100,000, but that they received only \$10,000, and his charge that Eddie Cicotte, the pitcher, was the Sox player who made the offer to "throw" the series, has aroused a storm of interest.

According to Maharg's story he met Bill Burns, an old friend in New York, and Cicotte approached Burns in a room in the Ansonia hotel with an offer to "throw" the series if Burns could find someone to put up \$100,000. Burns talked it over with Maharg and then went to Arnold Rothstein, New York gambler, with the proposition.

Rothstein, Maharg said, turned the scheme down, but later Burns telegraphed him that Rothstein had "gone through." Burns afterward told Maharg, he says, that he had encountered Abe Attell, who had "fixed" things with Rothstein.
