

OHIO VOTER SAYS MANY OF MARION REPORTS ARE BUNK

"General Apathy" has been routed out of political command in Ohio and the East, according to the tenor of a letter recently received by a young Portland business man from his father, a prominent public official of Marion, Ohio. The father is so earnestly interested in the defeat of Senator Harding that he has sent his son, who has been in Portland but a short time, the necessary affidavits by which he may be enabled to vote in Ohio by mail, should he not have acquired the right to vote in Oregon.

G. O. P. CLAIMS DENIED

"Politics are getting pretty warm here," the letter says. "You people out there could not believe the misrepresentations and untruths that go out through the press from Harding headquarters with reference to delegations that visit Harding, and all kinds of stuff."

"The colored people are scattering all kinds of stuff like the little leaflet which I inclose. The colored men simply say that if Harding is elected they will then come into their own. There was a bunch of them who walked into a hotel at Delaware the other day, sat down at the dining table and demanded that they serve them, and they had to do it. If they keep this up the North will soon be as solidly Democratic as the South is now. You know Harding made a speech to a delegation of them here and advocated social equality."

The leaflet to which reference is made reads as follows:

"AMERICANIZE AMERICA"

"Let us all stand together and make victory sure by electing Harding and Coolidge."

"German-Americans, you have before you a great issue. By joining your forces to those already in line for Harding and Coolidge you will be assured of victory and a separate peace with your fatherland."

"Franchising of the women of the states you and your families, with the Greeks, Italians and the colored votes (the last named have the balance of power in all the Northern states considered doubtful), and with the aid of the colored ladies will assure for the colored race social and political equality."

"James Watson Johnson of New York, secretary of the National Association for the Advancement of the Colored People, states Senator Harding had reiterated his statement as set forth in his speech of acceptance, in an interview of August 19."

MARY HARRIS ARMOR PLEADS

FOR DR. LOVEJOY'S ELECTION
Declaring that the dry forces of the nation never faced such a crisis and that they stand to lose all they have won should the Volstead act be repealed, Mary Harris Armor, known as "the Georgia cyclone," in an address at the White Temple Wednesday night urged the voters to send Dr. George Pohl Lovejoy to congress from this district.

Dr. Lovejoy has been endorsed by the Oregon State Federation of Labor, the Portland Labor Council, the Portland General Ministerial association and the Oregon Popular Government League.

Mrs. Armor declared her firm belief that the brewers and distillers of Oregon land and Scotland "are pouring their money into this country and are entering the congressional fights for the purpose of electing wet candidates and of defeating dry ones. I haven't seen the money pass, but I think it has been and is being passed out to defeat our prohibition."

"Our prohibition forces never have faced such a crisis," she said. "One wet vote in the lower and upper house of the nation will throw the Volstead act and make our country wet."

MRS. A. E. RICHARDS LEADS

HARDING PICTURE CAMPAIGN

State Chairman Tongue of the Republican state central committee has appointed Mrs. A. E. Richards to direct a "picture" campaign. Under her direction a house-to-house canvass is being made of the residence districts and the Harding-Coolidge supporters will be given lithographs of the candidates to display in their front windows, buttons and literature. Among the captains, each of whom have five or six workers in their teams, are the following: Albert, Mrs. George West; Mount Tabor, Mrs. Charles Fleck; Montavilla, Mrs. Burdette Thayer and Mrs. J. T. Menefee; Rose City Park, Mrs. Helen Wise; Albina, Mrs. Lizzie Beattie; St. Johns, Mrs. A. A. Muck; Irvington, Mrs. C. M. Scherer; Hawthorne, Mrs. A. M. Dibble; Sellwood, Mrs. Charles Turley and Mrs. Frances Campbell; Sunnyside, Mrs. Fred Warren; North Portland, Mrs. Anna Grove; Grand Avenue, Mrs. E. A. Medill; Lovejoy, Mrs. Julius L. The eight Sox players who took money to throw the games, threw them, according to their confessions, which makes it doubtful whether or not they obtained money by a confidence game. They actually carried out their part of the bargain."

ONLY A MISDEMEANOR
Hoynes declared that, from what he had learned of the evidence, he is inclined to the opinion that the only crime for which the Sox players can be prosecuted is that of gambling or conspiracy to gamble which is a misdemeanor in Illinois. Hoynes is reported also to be displeased with the manner in which his assistants here have conducted the inquiry.

The grand jurors today expressed doubt of the authority of Hoynes to stop their inquiry or the return of the indictment and prepared to proceed with the inquiry. They pointed out that the jury has the right to exclude the state's attorney from its deliberations.

WEAVER WANTS TO TALK
"Buck" Weaver, suspended third baseman of the White Sox team, is expected to tell the story of the throwing of the series to the grand jury today. Fred McMullin, it is reported, may follow Weaver. Both have opened negotiations for the giving of their testimony.

"Swede" Rieberg, shortstop, is said to have declared he was not going to confess because he has nothing to confess. "And if anybody squeals on me," he is reported to have said, "I'll put them out of business."

Chick Gandil, former first baseman, who was indicted with the seven players of the team, is in a hospital at Lufkin, Texas. It was learned today, where he recently was operated on for appendicitis. He is quoted in dispatches received here as saying that the charges that he was the paymaster and ringleader in the plot to "throw" the series are "all bunk."

KAUFF, TONEY CALLED
The grand jury is believed to be chiefly interested now in the status of

charges of corruption in the National

league. After hearing the testimony of President John A. Heydler and Manager McGraw of the New York Giants, the jury asked McGraw to bring with him before the inquisitors, Benny Kauff, former Giant center fielder, and Fred Toney, pitcher. Each of these players is said to have been offered money to "throw" games by Helme Zimmerman.

The whereabouts of Eddie Cicotte, the first of the indicted players to confess, are something of a mystery today. He checked out of his rooms at the Warner hotel night before last and was reported to have gone to Detroit. Reports from Detroit declare, however, that he has not appeared at his home there.

BOSTON GAMES QUESTIONED

Reports are current here that the White Sox players threw themselves out of the pennant race this year. "Brick" Owens, an American League umpire, charges that Cicotte "laid down" in the series with Boston a month ago.

"Cicotte would put lots of stuff on the ball up to the third strike," Owens said, "then he would send over a grooved fast ball without a thing on it. His work could scarcely be detected from the stands, but there was a lot of comment among the players."

An umpire who refused to permit his name to be used charged that the White Sox "threw" one of the games in Cleveland last week.

"Mails pitched for Cleveland," this umpire said, "and he didn't have a thing. Before the Sox players didn't hit him and the Indians won the game."

The remnants of the White Sox ball club will leave today for St. Louis where they will open their final series of the season tomorrow.

Manager Gleason and the players expressed confidence that they would make a good showing and all refused to admit that they are as yet definitely out of the pennant race.

INQUIRY INTO BROOKLYN

DODGERS IS TO PROCEED

New York, Sept. 30.—(U. P.)—Investigation of rumors that gamblers would make an attempt to "fix" the Brooklyn National league club, so the world series would be won by the Cleveland American League team, continued here today under the direction of District Attorney Harry E. Lewis of Kings county.

The entire Brooklyn club was scheduled to appear before Lewis tomorrow morning for questioning. Lewis plans today to interrogate persons who might have knowledge of the alleged plot. Lewis, when asked as to the reported opposition of Manager Wilbert Robinson to having his players questioned before the world series, because of the effect it might have on their morale, said "I believe it is a public duty to clean up the investigation of these rumors before the series starts, in order to remove any suspicion of crookedness."

Robinson told the United Press he had no fear of an investigation and as far as he knew the players had not been ordered to appear before the district attorney.

Helme Zimmerman, former Giant third baseman, flew into a rage today when asked regarding the testimony of Manager John McGraw of the New York club before the grand jury in Chicago. McGraw told the grand jury that he had dropped Zimmerman from the team because the player had offered Benny Kauff \$500 to throw a ball game.

"McGraw is a liar and I'll tell him so to his face," he shouted. Zimmerman said this young man crooked out in Chicago and they're trying to make Hal Chase and I the goats here."

ABE ATTELL FOUND HIDING

IN NEW YORK APARTMENT

New York, Sept. 30.—Abe Attehl has been found hiding in the apartment of a physician, not far from that sector of Broadway along which he has operated as a man about town. Quite a number of Abe's former friends would like to meet him, but Abe is not receiving company unless the callers manage to get into his way past a pair of suspicious negro hall boys. In fact, a young Broadwayite who "fronks" for Abe just now, declared that the one time featherweight champion has already lost one tooth since the Billy Maharg story came out of Philadelphia, naming Attehl as the alleged fixer of the 1919 world's series.

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MRS. MALLET IS ELECTED HEAD OF OREGON W. C. T. U.

Mrs. Mary Mallett was elected president of the Oregon State W. C. T. U. at its annual convention this morning at the White temple. Mrs. Mallett has long been prominently identified with the work of the organization, latterly being state chairman of child welfare work. Following her election the convention adjourned for 20 minutes for lunch, and other officers are being elected this afternoon.

The Wednesday evening session was characterized by an enthusiastic campaign address by Mrs. Mary Harris Armor, national W. C. T. U. worker, who, following the introduction of Dr. Lovejoy to the audience, made a plea for her election on the ground that she had given her word to stand by the enforcement of the Volstead act.

Mrs. Armor declared that the liquor question is not a dead issue and that only people who are in full sympathy with the strengthening and enforcement of this law should receive the support of the people of this country. She said that the great economy of the dry law was already in evidence, citing the fact that there were no soup kitchens or bread lines in New York last winter and that at Thanksgiving time one of the institutions which reported 400 pounds of turkey for the poor, had to go out and beg people to come in and eat it; the people who had hitherto eaten at public institutions, had their own Thanksgiving for the first time in their lives, because the head of the house had no saloon at which to leave his week's earnings.

Mrs. Armor declared that neither Cox nor Harding had placed themselves on record in regard to this prohibition matter in a manner that satisfied her and that she would not vote for either of them.

Luncheon was served in the First Methodist church at noon. A feature of the convention Wednesday was presentation of a large box of Clarke county prunes by Mrs. L. N. Jorgensen of Orchard. During the afternoon the convention delegates were taken on an automobile trip through the prune belt, and many saw prune driers in operation for the first time.

Reports of the work done by the association during the past two years were read and county presidents spoke.

The convention Wednesday is taken up with unfinished business and action on reports from the committees on resolutions. National and state candidates will be given opportunity to speak at 2 o'clock.

Speakers to Expose

Harding's Fidelity

To Big Corporations

Senator Harding's fidelity to the great corporations of the country and to those of large incomes will be exposed to the people of Oregon, among other things, by scores of speakers who are soon to go into every corner of the state, Cox headquarters announced. The speakers will show that the votes of the great corporations were invariably cast against the exorbitant profits tax, against increasing the tax on war profits, and against increasing the taxes on those with incomes above \$100,000 a year.

"Senator Harding's record of loyalty to the big corporations is one of the most striking in the history of American political life," is the statement of Dr. E. T. Hedlund, Multnomah county chairman, in telling of the plan to expose the Harding record. "It leaves no question as to whom Harding thinks should bear the cost of government in the United States. Our speakers will tell the story of the Harding votes to the people of Oregon before November."

Norman S Richards

Announces Himself

Mayoralty Candidate

Norman S. Richards is due to file his petition today for mayor of Portland. He is a brother of Oren R. Richards, member of the legislature and candidate for reelection from Multnomah county.

Richards is, to use his own phrase, "a bachelor in his 40s with my face ever turned towards the sun." He is a progressive Republican. He was a delegate to the Chicago convention in 1912, voting for Roosevelt and later for Wilson in 1916.

The rights of man are superior to the rights of wealth, he believes, and points out that he never was an accumulator of the latter. "Every man should have his daily bread by the sweat of his brow," he said. Richards is a lawyer. He believes in municipal ownership of all public utilities and would stop "the orgy of profiteering."

He was only recently divorced by Pauline Fredericks, noted film actress. Previous to his marriage with her he had been married to Maude Leone and Marjorie Rameau, actresses who divorced him. Miss Barbara Cazleton, 18, it is said, will be Mack's fourth bride.

Mack was taken to Bellevue two nights ago by a taxi driver who said the actor had "keeled over" in his cab.
