

YOUNG CLANSMEN ANSWER CALL OF WILD AND DECAMP

Jack L. Flinn, aged 13, son of Mr. and Mrs. I. S. Flinn, 718 East Richmond street, and Kenneth Knapp, aged 14, Fessenden and Charlton streets, St. Johns, have taken the mysterious oath of the "Red Six," answered the call of the wild and departed to regions unknown.

They are to be joined en route by the other four lads of the "Red Six," somewhere between Portland and Salem, according to information they imparted to lads of the neighborhood where they live. Jack and Kenneth hiked with their outfit between 4 and 5 o'clock Wednesday afternoon. They had a bicycle and trailing along after a compact load in a boy's express wagon. It included their clothing, blankets, some groceries and a .38 calibre revolver.

Sheriff Hurlburt was notified by the worried parents Thursday afternoon and asked to have his deputies watch for the lads. The father of Kenneth Knapp went to Oregon City during the day and made diligent inquiry along the route, but no one had seen the runaway lads. The father of young Flinn went to Salem last night to make further search. The mothers are almost prostrated with worry.

Jack Flinn weighs but 100 pounds, is not strong, and has never had any experience away from home alone. He wore a green cap and khaki trousers. The Knapp boy had khaki trousers and a black and white plaid cap.

Threatening Letter Is Part of Red Plot, Says Congressman

Tacoma, Wash., Oct. 1.—Commenting on anonymous letters threatening to blow up financial institutions in Tacoma, the Seattle postoffice and the L. C. Smith building in Seattle, Congressman Albert Johnson of the Third district said tonight:

"In connection with threatening letters, the public should know that this is part of a well-defined plan to inaugurate a period of terrorism. The I. W. W. membership is casting a referendum vote as to whether that organization shall hereafter provide legal defense for those of its members arrested for sabotage, murder, arson and other crimes. The agitators are telling the rank and file to vote against further legal defense, arguing that justice cannot be expected.

"The votes are to be finally counted at Seattle October 15. After that date reprisals, threats and other acts of terrorism are likely to be authorized secretly. It is expected the I. W. W. will by vote decide that instead of resorting to the courts they will practice direct action."

E. H. Gary Agrees to Furnish Steel Ore to Plants in France

London, Oct. 1.—American financiers are now in a fair way of setting France on her industrial feet, according to information obtained today in American business circles.

The United States Steel corporation, I am informed, through Judge E. H. Gary, has agreed to finance the rehabilitation of the French steel industry, and it is said that Judge Gary, when he was in Europe, perfected a scheme whereby Spanish iron ore will be furnished France to replace that formerly obtained from the mines in Alsace-Lorraine, which were destroyed during the war, and are unproductive at the present time.

The scheme as outlined is gigantic. Judge Gary agreeing in behalf of the United States Steel corporation, to furnish any additional ore necessary to carry on the industry until the French mines regain their pre-war productivity.

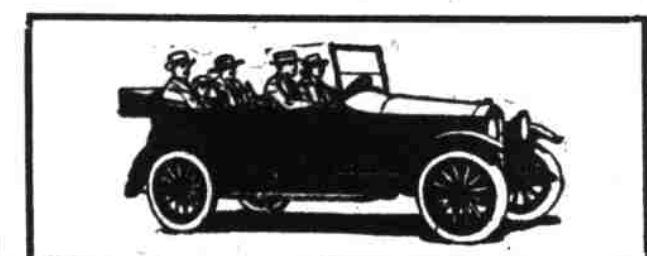

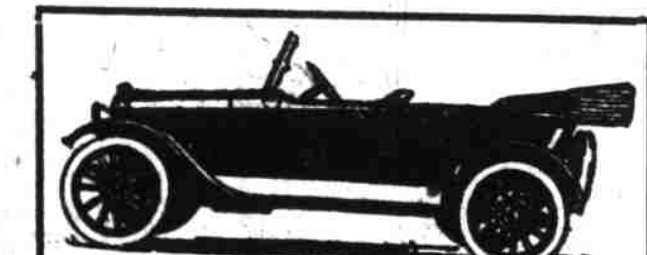
