

# BORAH, JOHNSON DISPLEASED WITH HARDING'S STAND

Washington, Oct. 1.—It is reliably learned that the "irreconcilable" group of Republicans, senators, those who have opposed the entry of the United States into the League of Nations under any terms, are displeased with the attitude of Senator Harding toward the league. Chief among them are Senators Borah and Johnson, who led the fight for complete rejection of the treaty of Versailles.

While it is not expected the two Western senators will openly act in a manner to cause a rift in the party with the presidential campaign nearing its end, their views have caused concern among the party leaders.

**ALL OR NOTHING**  
Harding, in their opinion, has not come out strong enough in opposition to the League of Nations. Added to this are doubts raised by his declaration that he favors a world court, when this fact is coupled with the return of Elihu Root from Europe, where he helped draw plans for a court under commission from the league.

So the irreconcilables are said to be sulking, in an effort to force the hand of the candidate. The declaration that he is opposed to the Wilson league does not satisfy them. They want no league or association of nations of any kind. Nor do they want a world court, particularly if it is to be an offshoot of a league of nations, as the court proposed by Root and his colleagues would be.

Senator Borah, now in Washington, declined to discuss the attitude of the group he led.

**BORAH IS SILENT**  
"I have nothing to say," he replied, when asked for an opinion about Senator Harding's views as set forth in his Iron-thon speech. In this speech Harding said he did not favor entering the league as negotiated at Versailles but "he wanted an association of nations" and "an international court." Harding did not go into details.

Borah likewise declined to say whether or not he had written to Harding, explaining his objections, as he is reported to have done. Nor would Borah approve or condemn the world court, stating that

he had lacked opportunity to learn what it is.

**LEAGUE BEHIND COURT**  
Republican leaders do not underestimate the possible effect of a break with the Borah-Johnson wing. Their support was enlisted after the Chicago convention only with difficulty and the race arranged was a pitched affair, made only after Harding had granted concessions. The irreconcilables constitute a powerful force in the senate, and have a considerable following. For the present, it would seem, their opposition is tacit, for the purpose of "smoking out" the candidate.

Democrats are awaiting an opportunity to turn to their advantage any advocacy of the world court scheme Root

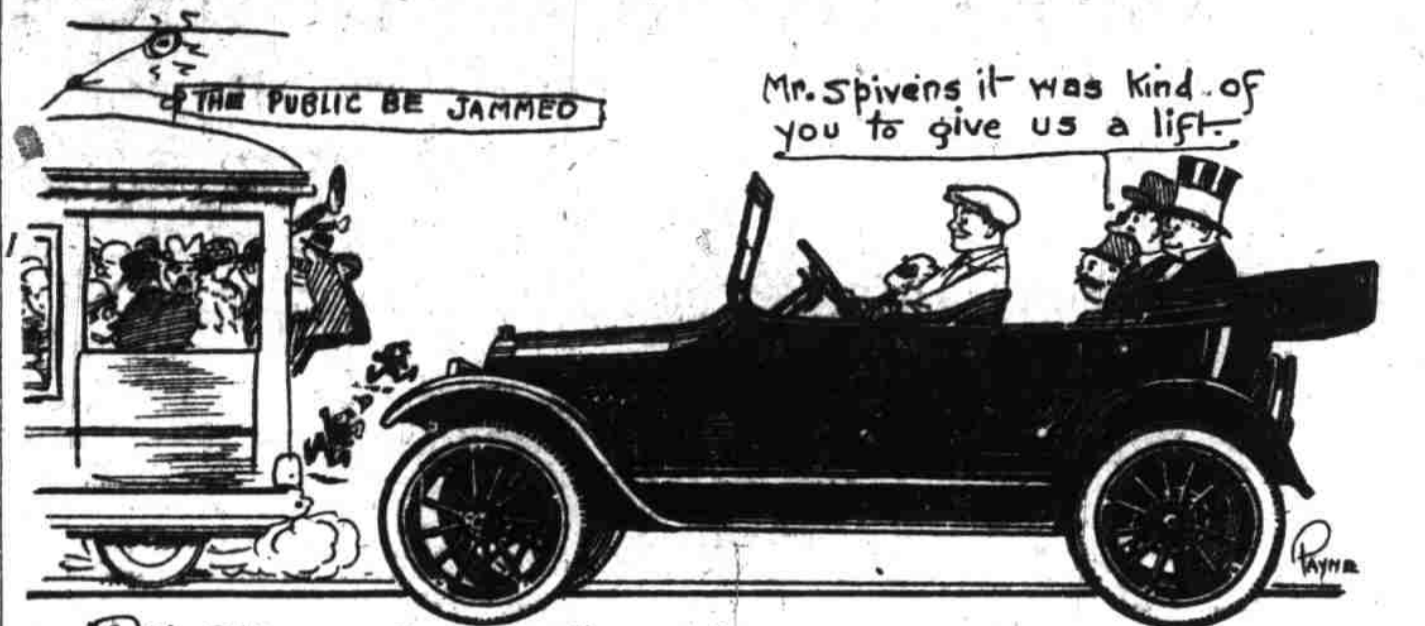
assisted in evolving. Root acted on invitation of the league. It was explained, and the court would function under the league. The Democrats argue the court would be a success, where its proposals failed, because the machinery of the league provides a means of carrying the decisions into effect through coercion.

Root's world court will not furnish a plank on which Senator Harding can reach solid ground on the league, a cabinet member declared.

**Clocks Turned Back**  
Denver, Colo., Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Denver clocks were turned back one hour today, the city resuming mountain standard time for all business and social purposes following five months of "daylight saving."

**Officials Check Up Charge of Housing Trust in New York**  
New York, Oct. 1.—(I. N. S.)—Federal and state authorities today launched a vigorous investigation into circumstances that indicate the existence of a "housing trust" in New York state. On orders from Attorney-General Palmer, United States Attorney Francis G. Caffey started to check up important information supplied by Representative Isaac Siegel of New York tending to show that there is a monopoly controlling building materials of all kinds.
