

AUDITORIUM CLAIM HANGS FIRE; COURT MAY BE SOUGHT

Court action was indicated today as the only manner in which the claims of Hans Pederson, contractor who built The Auditorium, could be settled. Despite the fact that a special committee, appointed to sift and determine the matter, reported that Pederson was entitled to some \$65,000 of his \$77,000 claim, the city commissioners failed Thursday to reach a decision on that report.

Mayor Baker took a firm stand at the outset, favoring payment of the sum recommended, providing the city had the money. Otherwise, he wanted the proposition put to a vote of the people. Commissioner Bigelow fought both suggestions, saying he believed the matter should be sifted in court.

It was freely admitted that the city was "morally" obligated to pay the charge, though City Attorney La Roche reported that legal obligation was a matter of conjecture.

Commissioner Barbur recalled that attorneys for the bondmen of Pederson had promised to take the matter into court at the time the committee was recommended, and in line with that promise stood firm for such action.

The question was unsettled, as Commissioner Pier asked time to interview various interested parties between now and Monday. At that time it will again come before the council.
