

Multnomah Fair and Manufacturers' and Land Products Show Open Monday at Gresham

FAST RACES ARE PROMISED; STOCK EXHIBITS READY

The fourteenth annual exhibit of the combined Multnomah county fair and manufacturers' and land products show will open Monday morning at Gresham, with a large number of exhibits and a more attractive program than ever before. The officers in charge are: H. A. Lewis, president; J. W. Townsend, vice president; A. F. Miller, secretary; Theo. Brugger, treasurer; C. D. Minton, manager.

HORSE AND AUTO RACES

The fair ground race track is to be used this year for the first time in a series of auto races contesting for a purse of \$5000. Horse races are also assured the last three days of the week. Some very fine entries have been secured from the Northwest circuit.

The opening of Multnomah's fair on Monday has enabled the management to secure several carloads of livestock direct from the state fair and lovers of fine animals, poultry and pets will find many attractive entries.

The race track has been put in splendid shape and the grandstand enlarged and improved. It is a small track but is one of the best in the country and is never allowed to deteriorate between seasons. It is said to be especially adapted this year to the speed auto, and has been tested out by several racing auto men.

SPECIAL DAILY PROGRAMS

The Portland Railway, Light & Power company will run regular trains with extra cars to accommodate the public, at rates from Portland to Gresham for the round trip from Oregon City, 40 cents; Multnomah, 25 cents; Lents Junction, 25 cents; and other points in proportion. Monday is children's day and all under 16 will be admitted free except to the grandstand.

Tuesday is Gresham day with campfire social and musical program that evening in the gymnasium. Wednesday, pioneers, women and grocers will be honored by special programs. Thursday is for Portland and it is hoped that many motorists will be business men, pleasure seekers and those wishing to witness the advancements made in household and farm machinery will attend.

LODGES TO PARTICIPATE

Friday is reserved for the fraternities and the grange, Woodmen of the World and Elks have places of honor. The schools are also to have a special part of the day's program. The fraternity having the largest attendance will be given a prize cup. Saturday is Derby day and patriotic day. All state societies and patriotic organizations are being asked to participate. The grounds and buildings will be illuminated and special features will attract the people for the evening session.

REGISTRATION FOR VOTERS WILL BE CLOSED TONIGHT

Citizens of Multnomah county who have not registered have only until 8 o'clock tonight to get their names on the registration rolls and become qualified to vote at the presidential and general election.

The registration bureau is on the first floor of the courthouse, Fifth street side. If you have not voted at either a primary election or other election during the last two years, your name has been automatically dropped from the rolls. If you have moved from the precinct in which you were formerly registered, you must register or you cannot vote.

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MONTAVILLA BUSY CENTER; SCENIC VIEW ATTRACTIVE

Visitors to Montavilla have frequently remarked that they were not aware that this suburban part of Portland was such a busy center. But it is on one of the greatest arteries that conduct motor tourists from the far east to the Pacific coast.

Over this thoroughfare dozens of stages pass daily, loaded with passengers going to and from Portland and points in Eastern Oregon. The north and south county road passes directly through it on Eighty-second street. The terminals of two sections of the P. R. L. & P. Co. are located within its bounds, the Montavilla depot line and the Stark street line.

On its eastern border are some of the richest fruit ranches in Western Oregon. The scenery is magnificent. Mount Tabor covered with beautiful dwellings and fire near at hand, and majestic Mount Hood in the distance, deceptively appearing but a few miles away. Rocky and Kelly buttes stand out in relief on the north and south.

Montavilla has 14 groceries, three hardware stores, six light lunch and confectionery stands, two furniture stores, three barber shops, four good garages, two drug stores, two real estate offices, several wood and coal yards, two bakeries, four butcher shops, a wide range of the following: Bank, department store, jewelry store, boot and shoe store, plumbing shop, under-taking parlors, and a number of other minor establishments.

The Montavilla school is up to the Oregon high standard, with Superintendent McCord at the head of the faculty.

Some business is transacted in Montavilla by its merchants, more than in many towns of 5000 or 6000. A few houses are for sale, none for rent, and none empty.

The paving on East Seventy-ninth street is now completed and has been opened to traffic. This street is the only direct paved connection between Glisan and Stark streets east of Laurelhurst.

Freeholders on Seventy-sixth street are receiving their notices of sewer taxation incurred by the recent installation between Ankeny and Glisan streets.

much to the beauty of these homes. Two motor cars were seen on the streets of Montavilla bearing Massachusetts license plates and Boston pennants.

William E. Wilson, proprietor of the Villa barber shop; David Milton, a C. L. Ross salesman; and Mr. Mead, had a near-accident Sunday morning about 2 o'clock. They had started for a fishing trip to the Nehalem river in the Wilson car, taking the inner coast road, ran into a strip of dirt track and stuck in the mud.
