

WOMAN STEPS IN FRONT OF AUTO; IS PAINFULLY HURT

Police Declare Motorist Blameless for Injury Saturday to Mrs. R. E. Bailiff, Careless Warned.

Mrs. R. E. Bailiff, 209 Halsey street, was run down and seriously injured by an automobile at Broadway and Larrabee street about 10 o'clock Saturday morning. She stepped in front of the machine, the police say, as she was crossing the street.

The machine was being driven about 10 miles an hour by Gilbert Noonan, 172 Thurman street, who is employed by a photograph company. He picked the woman up from the street and carried her to her home. She is suffering from lacerations and bruises. The police say Noonan was not to blame.

Through the evidence obtained by the traffic department, S. C. Garvin has been exonerated of blame for the death of Mrs. A. H. Stedman, who was struck and fatally injured by his machine September 28.

Captain Lewis of the traffic department said Saturday that he is going to open a campaign against the pedestrians who step into the center of the streets without looking and stop in front of moving automobiles. The bureau of traffic is conducting investigation of every accident which happens within the city limits.

The investigations are made to ascertain who is to blame for the accident, and the police say they will put the results of their investigations before the jury in event an innocent driver is being sued for damages by a careless pedestrian.

The city ordinance provides that persons crossing the streets of the downtown districts cross in accordance with the traffic policeman's signals.

The police records show 158 pedestrians injured during September. Of that number 25 per cent were sent to hospitals and 65 per cent of the accidents were caused by carelessness on the part of the person injured.

Municipal Judge Rosenbaum turned the case over to the court of domestic relations. Decision of the parents to give their blessings to the couple was made late in the afternoon and court action was withdrawn.

SIXTY-FIVE CASES READY TO GO TO U. S. GRAND JURY

Alleged Liquor Violations, Case Involving Possession of Alleged Stolen War Stamps Listed

Important liquor and narcotic cases, another war saving stamp case, and other secret matters, are to be presented to the federal grand jury which convenes at 3 p. m. Monday in the old postoffice building.

The United States attorney's office has on hand a total of 65 cases ready to present to the jury, in addition to others which may arise.

M. L. Hockfield is awaiting action on a case involving the possession of alleged stolen and altered war savings certificates.

Several cases involving alleged violation of the postal laws will be presented to the grand jury by Chief Assistant United States Attorney Hall S. Lusk.

Assistant United States Attorney Charles Reimer and Austin P. Pielke Jr. have close to 50 liquor and narcotic cases to present, some of which involve sale of liquor to Indians. One liquor case also involves the stabbing of an Indian on a government reservation.

The last grand jury adjourned June 30. Enough business has collected during the interim to keep the grand jury busy for at least two weeks, government attorneys declare.

Tuesday morning Federal Judge Charles Wolverton will open court at Medford at 10 o'clock. United States Attorney Lester Humphreys and Deputy Court Clerk Kenneth F. Fraser will accompany the court. The session at Medford is expected to last about one week.

Information was received Saturday by Lusk that the Oregon Lumber company case, on appeal to the circuit court at San Francisco, had been set over from October 8 to 15. Lusk will represent the government.

WILL OF G. GOTTFREDSEN FILED; ESTATE IS \$19,000

The will of Gotfred Petersen Gottfredsen, who died in Portland August 20, was filed for probate Saturday. The will is dated July 20, 1930, and Karen Kristine Gottfredsen, a sister, is named as the executrix. The estate consists of real property valued at \$2300,

\$3200 Damages Asked

Suit for \$3200 was filed Saturday by Helen Dakota, through her guardian ad litem, Constantine J. Dakota, against Ruth Simmons for damages sustained by the 6-year-old child when she was run down by an automobile driven by the defendant June 28 at Williams avenue and East Broadway. The complaint sets forth that the child's leg was crushed and she sustained other serious bodily injuries.

Dunphy Files Suit

J. R. Dunphy filed suit against R. G. Paulin Saturday, in which he sets forth that he and Paulin formed a partnership September 18, 1919, as the Western Newspaper Union, for the purpose of handling advertising accounts. He alleges mismanagement of the business by the defendant and asks for the appointment of a receiver, an accounting and a dissolution of partnership.

and not to fasten upon the people of any state or any part of the people of that state the existing government of existing territorial integrity, but the of that territory as many states as they like and erect in these several states the form of government desired by the inhabitants of each.

Pointing out that the American constitution recognizes the "pursuit of happiness" as an inalienable right of individuals and asserting that the league constitution also recognizes "that the happiness of nations also is, as it should be, a fundamental right," Governor Cox said:

"There can be no international peace unless there be happiness, and there can be no happiness unless there be justice. It is folly for us to look forward to abiding peace in the world as long as the peoples of smaller weak nations are held in political penance by powerful or imperialistic governments."

"Let us forget that the structure of

the future peace of the world will in no small measure rest upon the firm foundations of accord between the English speaking peoples. Anything which disturbs that accord does not make for world peace.

LEGION PLAN INDORSED

At Joplin, earlier in the day, Governor Cox indorsed the four-fold optional plan proposed by the American Legion for federal reward of the services of the soldiers in the world war. Under this plan, the ex-service men would be enabled to elect to accept aid in the purchase of a city or farm home, vocational education, paid-up insurance or a cash bonus.

Previously the governor had said "a better plan" that he favored was a farm and a home for every soldier who desired it. Today's declaration also puts him on record in favor of an optional cash bonus. He said:

"I have been much gratified to see that the American Legion in its session at Cleveland has adopted what is called the four-fold plan. It seems to me practical, it seems to be sensible and it seems to be fair, and I am happy to give it my indorsement."

Cox's speech here tonight ended a tour which, starting a month ago today, has taken him into 32 states. During that time he has made 238 speeches and when he reaches Dayton tomorrow night he will have traveled 975 miles. To date Cox has visited 17 states, including all those west of the Mississippi river except Arkansas, Louisiana and Texas. With election day just a month away, he will concentrate his stump efforts to the east and middle west.

RANCHER ATTEMPTS TO KILL HIS FATHER

Unsuccessful in Effort, Snell McRea of Rea, Idaho, Then Shoots Himself to Death.

Chicago, Oct. 2.—(I. N. S.)—Snell McRea, 35, ranchman of Rea, Idaho, is dead today from a self-inflicted bullet wound in his head. McRea this afternoon entered the office of his father, W. S. McRea, former treasurer of the People's Gas, Light & Coke company here and fired three shots at the elder McRea, all of which missed their mark, and then turned the revolver on himself.

The elder McRea, in a statement to the police, could give no reason for his son's action other than that he believed he was being drunk.

The younger McRea told hospital attendants before he died, he had been given a bum deal by his father in a real estate transaction and that his father had aided his wife during an estrangement.

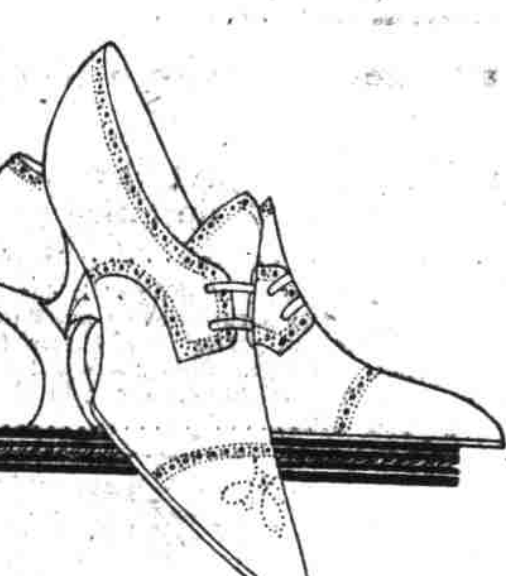

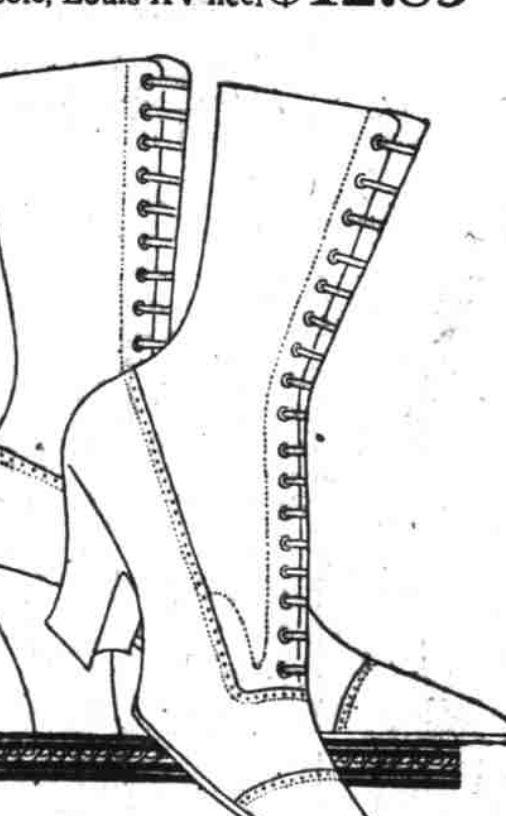

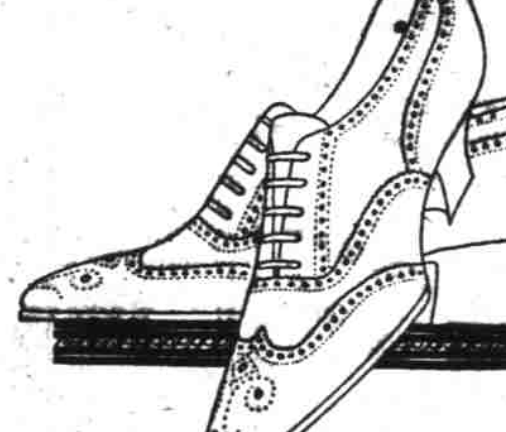
