

FARMERS' VOTE EXPECTED TO WIN OREGON FOR COX

Democratic Leader's Agricultural
Aid in Contrast With Harding's
Record of Uniform Opposition.

Cox leaders are depending on the vote of farmers to aid in giving Governor Cox the electoral vote of Oregon in November. They maintain that he will receive the vote of a great majority of the farmers of Oregon because of Harding's speeches and votes against agriculture in the senate, and because of Cox's record of fidelity to the farmer as governor of Ohio.

In addition to fighting against a price of more than a dollar for wheat and opposing the farm loan system, both in speeches and with his votes, and in addition to introducing testimony in the senate characterizing the farm loan system as an attempt to use the credit of the United States in behalf of a special class, Senator Harding told members of the senate that he would like to strike at greed in certain agricultural sections of the United States.

BLOW AT FARMERS

"I share the anxiety to strike at greed," he declared, as reported on page 222 of the Congressional Record. "I should like to strike at the greed for power. I would be agreeable to strike at the manifest greed in some of the agricultural sections of the United States."

The senator further declared that if the American farmer must be guaranteed a price for wheat there was not patriotism enough in the country to win the war.

"I do not think it (\$2.25 wheat) will bring about the desired result," he said, "but I venture to say, Mr. President, that if the qualities of American patriotism are such that we must guarantee the American farmer a price for his wheat in the face of a world famine, then there is no patriotism in this country to win the war."

PAINTS OLD PICTURE

The day before, in fighting against a higher price for wheat, Senator Harding said: "I know a little something about farming. I have followed the cradle, senators, with a rake, when wheat sold for 40 cents a bushel. That was in the day when farming was something of a contest for subsistence. In this latter day farming has become an occupation for profit, and I happen to know that under normal conditions \$1 wheat makes a very profitable occupation; perhaps not to the farmer who farms the farmers, but it is to the farmer who farms a farm."

Senator Harding not only spoke against the interests of the agricultural classes, as in the above cases, but he voted against relieving the agricultural corporations from income taxes, although he opposed the levying increased

taxes on the great corporations of the country and on war profits.

COX AIDS FARMERS

Opposed to that record, Cox leaders point to the progressive governor's action in a case or two in Ohio. There was a shortage of seed corn. It was sold to farmers at prices near \$20 a bushel. Governor Cox went into other states, secured the corn, and sold it to the agriculturists at \$3 a bushel.

In another instance there was a shortage of farm labor. There was danger of huge loss to the agriculturists. The state, under the direction of Cox, set 6000 acres in the fields and established a tractor school.

The records of the two candidates, Cox headquarters insist, leave no question as to their respective views on the relation of government to farmers. His backers in Oregon depend on Cox's record on that question to bring him the agricultural vote in this state.

Fear Pamphlet on Spruce Production Squelched by G. O. P.

Washington, Oct. 2.—Senator B. Pat Harrison of Mississippi, chairman of the speakers' bureau of the Democratic national committee, has been informed that the Republican committee has withdrawn "because of error in the text," a pamphlet which had been prepared for the use of Republican speakers on the alleged waste in spruce production during the war. This pamphlet is reported to have been "fear stuff," by which is meant material gathered from the investigation conducted on the Pacific last year by a subcommittee of the house headed by Representative Fear of Wisconsin. Fear's rancor and extravagant charges caused considerable unfavorable comment at the time.

The withdrawn pamphlet is said to have centered around the charge that \$10,000,000 was wasted by the spruce production division in the Northwest, being a rebash of the old complaint about logging railroads, sawmills and other activities which were about completed when the armistice called a halt upon the operations.

Republican campaign councils are divided over the advisability of giving publicity to much of the output of the post-war committees. It is said. A large amount of this material reeks with reflections upon patriotic citizens, in a majority of cases Republicans, who were helping in war (and who are likely to resent being held up as grafters and plunderers merely because the war ended earlier than expected, before full production could be reached).

HARDING'S WOBBLY VIEWS ON LEAGUE SCORED BY BLACK

Washington Gubernatorial Candidate Speaks Before Cox-Roosevelt Meeting Here Saturday.

"We say we're a civilized nation, and yet we haven't evolved any better system than that used by savagery, a system that took the very flower of the young manhood of the nations of the world and carried millions of them to their graves through the horrors of bloody war."

"The very fact ought to make every man and woman who loves their fellow man long to do something to put a stop to war. The League of Nations may not be a perfect plan, but it is the only one presented that offers hope to humanity. We do not claim that it is perfect, but it is our star of hope."

Thus spoke Judge W. W. Black, Democratic gubernatorial candidate of Washington, before a meeting of the Cox-Roosevelt club Saturday night in the auditorium of the Lincoln high school.

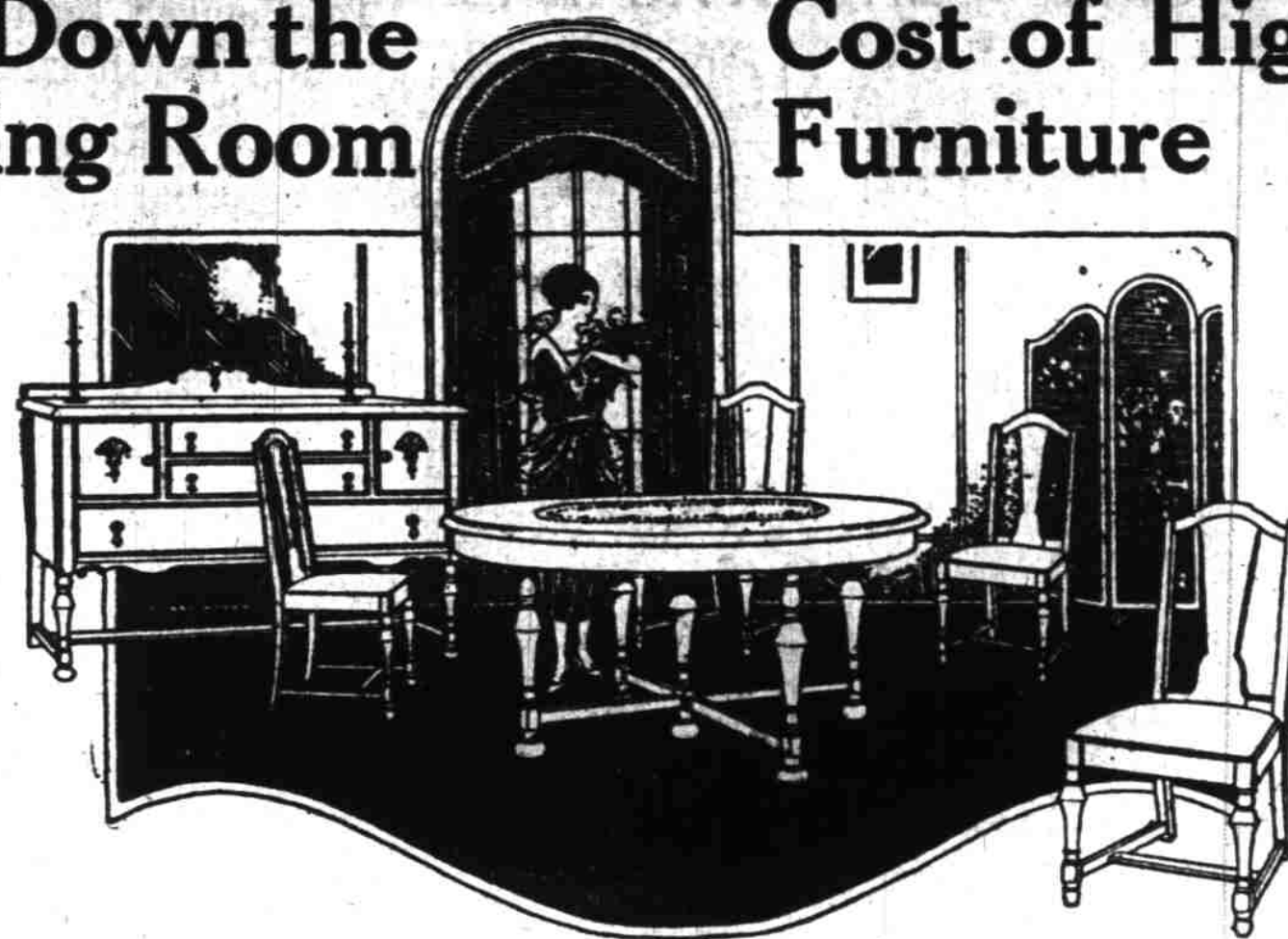
"Over in Washington the League of Nations is the one striking feature of this campaign," said the speaker. "I believe that Washington will ratify the League of Nations by voting for Cox and Roosevelt. One of the greatest battles for humanity that has ever been fought is in progress at the present time. This year we have a Republican candidate who is not the choice of his party, and our own leading Republican paper in the state of Washington has said that Harding tossed a coin to determine which side he would take on the League of Nations. He says himself that he hasn't tossed the coin yet; and Hiram Johnson interprets him one way while Taft interprets him exactly another way."

"The Democrats stand four-square for a covenant that gives promise of abolishing wars and their horrible results. The League of Nations may not be perfect. There isn't a single law ever made by man that is perfect—if you wait for one you will never adopt anything. We have laws against murder and against larceny and against arson, but they are not so perfect as to stop all these kinds of crime. There may be little disturbances even if the League of Nations is ratified, and it is true that we may at some time have to use force of arms to carry out its great provisions, but it holds forth the great end we are trying to achieve."

"Some people pretend to be so devoted to the Monroe doctrine that they oppose the League of Nations. If Hiram Johnson is logical, he'll say that the United States shouldn't aid the South American nations in preserving their integrity against the nations of Europe—in defending the Monroe doctrine. Article X of the League of Nations really extends the spirit of the Monroe doctrine to all the world. No man or woman who pretends to believe in the Monroe doctrine can logically object to the League of Nations. It offers hope to humanity for the abolition of wars."

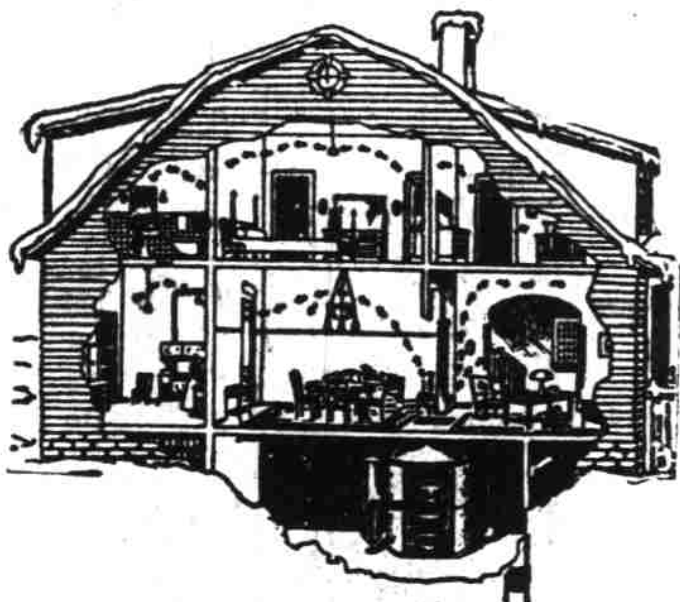

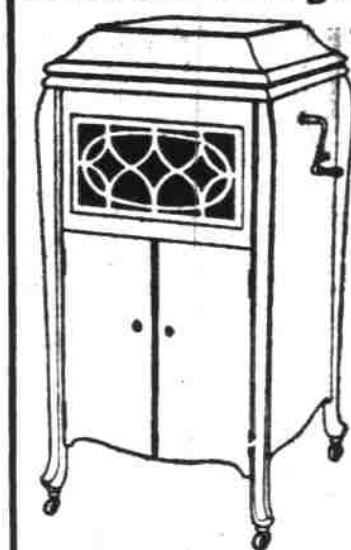
