

NO LEAGUE AND NO COURT FOR MINE, DECLARES BORAH

(By United Press.)
Danbury, Conn., Oct. 5.—Senator William E. Borah, leader of the ir-reconcilable group, wants no league of nations or international association of any kind.

He made this declaration here on Monday night, speaking in behalf of his colleague, Senator Frank B. Brandegee.

Borah's speech was his first public utterance since he declined to make further addresses under the direction of the Republican national committee because of reported dissatisfaction with the position of Senator Harding on the league.

The speech revealed the differences between the views of Harding and Borah. Harding, in his Inauguration speech, said he wanted "an association of nations," and an international court. Borah said this:

FART'S HIGH TRADITIONS.
"Whether you call the league a league, a concert of powers, an alliance or an association—they all lead you to Europe and place upon the bended shoulders of the American youth the military burdens which must eventually grow out of this scheme."

Borah declared the people may have confidence in the Republican party.

"The people of this country can depend upon the Republican party, regardless of the views of particular individuals, to be true to its highest and noblest tradition—devotion to the integrity and untrammelled and unpawned independence of the American republic."

The question of self-government is involved, the speaker declared, adding:

HOLDS LEAGUE DANGEROUS.
"Let us not be confused by terms, nor mistake names for principles. Let us consider rather results and the final goal and not waste our time debating over what particular route we shall reach that goal. If compromise leads to the same result as the league without compromise, then we certainly want no compromise. The real question which the whole league scheme presents to the average citizen is this: Shall we go into Europe and take upon ourselves as a people and as part of our burdens and obligations the turmoil, the strife, the racial conflicts and the imperialistic schemes of the old world, or shall we stay out?"

"Keep that plain, fundamental proposition before you. All these schemes lead to but one destination—Europe."

WHITE PLAGUE GRIPS UMATILLA INDIANS

Robert W. Osborn, who has devoted the past three months to making a tuberculosis survey of four Eastern Oregon counties—Union, Baker, Walla Walla and Umatilla—returned to Portland Monday, having completed his task. The purpose of the survey was to ascertain whether or not there was a need for a county district hospital for tuberculosis patients and to sound out the prominent citizens on the proposition. Representative citizens, physicians and nurses were interviewed in each county and they were almost unanimous in their desire to have such a hospital erected.

The number of living cases of tuberculosis and the number of deaths in the several counties since 1918 as secured by Osborn, are as follows: Union, 50 living cases, 20 deaths; Baker, 33 living cases, 24 deaths; Walla Walla, 39 living cases, 22 deaths; Umatilla, 30 living cases among the Indians; 55 deaths among the Indians, 75 white living cases, 49 deaths. As the total population of the Indian reservation is 11,177, it will be seen that the number of cases of the white plague among the Indians is notably great. This makes a total of 246 living cases in the four counties and 162 deaths in a district having only a total population of 70,000. In addition to these actual cases there is a large number of contact cases, people living in close association with people who have the disease in an active form. Osborn was much impressed with the number of children who have the disease, as it is these cases to whom a district hospital would be of greatest benefit.

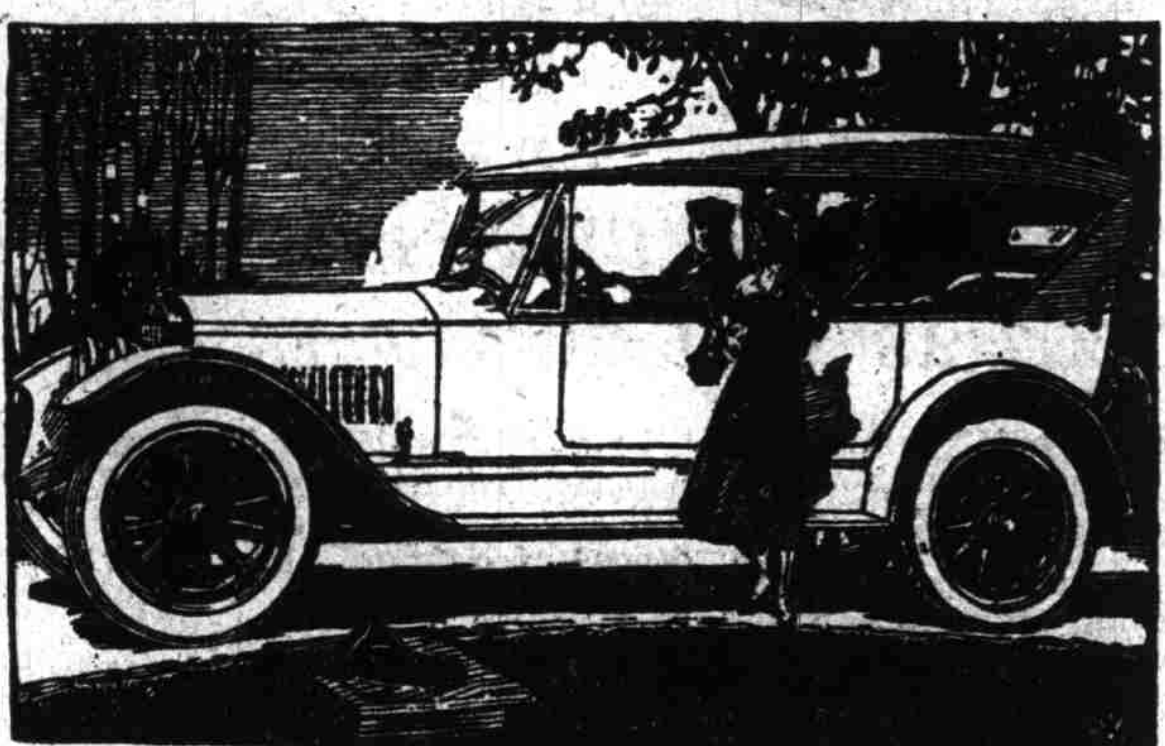
