Varied Program to
Be Given Sunday
At The Auditorium

The popular Sunday concert, conducted by the city of Portland, which opened at The Auditorium next Sunday afternoon, have been recognized by the United States government to the extent that the war tax, heretofore paid, has been eliminated.

During the past two years the city has been forced to pay a war tax on each admission out of the receipts which added materially to the loss of staging the events. Last year an unsuccessful effort was made to secure elimination of the tax. However, when the request was made this year, the officials of the internal revenue department consented to the elimination of the tax on the basis of the concert being non-profitable and also of an educational value.

The Royal Rosarian band, the Rosarian quartet, several soloists, both instrumental and vocal, and William H. Boone, organist, will make up the opening concert program. The city has dropped the plan of conducting concerts with only organ numbers and has arranged for a variety of musical features.
