

OREGON WATER TO IRRIGATE LAND IN CALIFORNIA ASKED

Salem, Oct. 8.—Application for permission to store 1,600,000 acre feet of water in the Upper Klamath lake for the irrigation of 150,000 acres in California was filed with State Engineer Cupper Thursday, by Roy E. Swigart, president of the Shasta Valley Irrigation project of Montague, Cal.

Swigart recently filed an application with the Oregon engineer covering the appropriation of 1800 second feet of water from Klamath river for irrigation purposes and power development. This new application contemplates the organization of an irrigation district which will enter into contract with the United States reclamation service for the necessary surveys and construction work.

In a statement given out recently State Engineer Cupper declared that no application for water rights for California projects would be given favorable consideration by the Oregon department until provision had been made for the irrigation of all Oregon lands adjacent to these streams.

Other applications for water rights have been filed with the engineer's office here as follows:

By Nels Nelson of Garibaldi, water from Canyon creek for domestic supply.

By Frank Sullivan of Canyonville, water from Canyon creek for irrigation of a small tract in Douglas county.

By L. E. Springer, J. F. Springer and William Palgrave of Dufur, water from Fifteen-Mile creek for irrigating 50 acres in Wasco county.

By the Broken Irrigation district of Jamieson, storage of the waters of Willow creek and its tributaries, Pole creek, Blackie creek, Rhodes Canyon creek, Cow Valley creek, Mormon Basin creek, Lost Watch creek and Glascock creek, for the irrigation of lands near Jamieson, Malheur county.

By William S. Hoffman of Dayville, water from John Day river for irrigation of a small tract in Grant county.

Oregon has lagged behind her two sister states in the matter of organization for the preservation of its scenic beauties, according to Madison Grant, New York attorney and nature lover, who has written to Governor Olcott commending the executive on his move toward the preservation of forests along public highways in this state.

In California, Grant points out, the "Save the Redwoods" league and in Washington the "Natural Parks Association of Washington" have been doing effective work but efforts made by Grant toward similar organizations in Oregon met with failure.

"The people of the East will be very glad to cooperate with you and your highway commission in your efforts for conservation," Grant writes.

Morrow county voters will be required to pass upon the question of an increase in the salary of the county superintendent of schools at the November election. The ballot title on the measure, which provides for a salary of \$2000 per year, has been prepared by the attorney general's office.

State Engineer Percy A. Cupper is in Columbia county making an investigation of the Marshall drainage district, which has applied for the certification of a \$30,000 bond issue.

Bankers Trying to Force Union County To Pay Up Interest

La Grande, Oct. 8.—With the announcement that the Ladd & Tilton bank of Portland had filed in the supreme court a petition for mandamus against John Frawley, Union county treasurer, to compel payment of interest on \$60,000 of county highway bonds, the invalidity of the Union county bonds was brought home.

Action on these bonds has been delayed by the supreme court holding invalid the Clackamas county issue, in which the same considerations are involved, and for which a petition for a rehearing in the case of W. P. Hawley vs. County Judge Anderson of Clackamas was this week denied by the supreme court.

When the Union county road machinery was purchased this spring, the machinery was paid for with \$60,000 of the \$1,000,000 road bonds. These came into the hands of the Portland bank. When the Union county budget was assembled provision was made for the interest on these bonds and the money is now in the hands of the county treasurer, but upon the advice of the district attorney was not turned over, pending the decision

of the Clackamas county case. The hearing of the Portland bank against the Union county treasurer has been set for October 15.

Committee Named To Manage Pulpit At White Temple

An executive committee to manage the affairs of the White Temple while the church is without a regular pastor was elected at the annual meeting of the congregation Thursday night. The committee is: E. E. Hilton, Grant Phegley, W. N. Everett, Fred Leary and Miss Grace Stevenson.

The pulpit committee reported through Floyd R. Smith that no pastor had been called and that supplies for the pulpit had been secured through November. These deacons were reelected: C. H. Lewis, O. P. M. Jamieson, Fred Leary, J. W. Mills and H. W. Stone. Other officers reelected are: W. N. Everett, clerk; Grant Phegley, treasurer; Floyd R. Smith, Sunday school superintendent; C. E. Milligan and A. B. Moore, auditors; Dr. E. P. Shepard, head usher; J. G. Malone, superintendent Chinese mission; Miss Maude Cook, president Senior Young People's union; Miss Jewel Fields, president Intermediate union. About 200 members attended.

EMPLOYMENT FOR BLIND REQUESTED

Salem, Oct. 8.—If managers and foremen in factories in this state can be sufficiently interested in the placing of blind workers where they can work the number of idle blind in Oregon will be materially reduced.

according to J. W. Howard, superintendent of the state school for the blind, who has written Governor Olcott suggesting the hiring of a field worker to arrange for the employment of adult blind in Oregon industries.

Pupils in the state school here, Howard explains, are trained in basketry, carpet weaving, chair caning, sewing, cooking, hammock making, broom making, dictaphone work, piano tuning and manual training. Teaching music and salesmanship, Howard points out, are other occupations which make many blind persons self-supporting.

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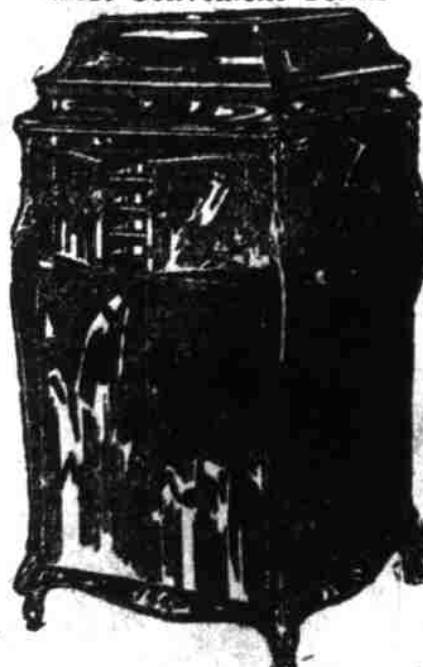


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
