

# SPEAKERS TAKE POT SHOT AT ONE C. A. MARATHUR

The "Lovejoy for Congress" meeting at the Library-Friday night was a meeting of surprises. It was a meeting of opinions. And it was a meeting of enthusiasm. And it was a meeting in which all were in agreement on one point—that C. N. McArthur should not be returned to congress and that Esther Pohl-Lovejoy should be sent in his place.

The surprises were three. First was the crowd, a capacity crowd. Second was the unanimity of support for Dr. Lovejoy. And the third was largely to Dr. W. T. McElveen. He found that the League of Nations has friends, oceans of friends, and that about 300 of them were packed into Library hall last night. The crowd had opinions. Those assembled knew who they wanted in congress. And they knew that they wanted America to enter the League of Nations. And they were enthusiastic in support of their choice.

**PLANKS ENUMERATED**

Dr. Lovejoy told without qualification what she stands for. She wants a progressive and humanitarian government, she informed her audience. She advocates laws to secure to the workers in the field a just share of the product of their labor. She favors a budget system, a federal department of education, preservation of the federal reserve banks and measures regulating immigration, including racial restrictions, to be assimilated. She is for a soldier bonus and for every provision for those injured in the service of the country. She will fight to the limit, she declared, measures designed to defeat the prohibition amendment or the Volstead act. She wants the channels of trade opened and the profiteer eliminated.

"I want to promote the general welfare," Dr. Lovejoy declared. "And if there were more public officers who worked to promote the general welfare instead of the special welfare at the expense of the general welfare, this country would not be having much of the trouble we have now. Those who promote the general welfare are 100 per cent Americans. Those who promote special welfare need Americanization."

**AUTOCRACY SCORED**

Dr. McElveen opened his address by declaring he was not in favor of one party controlling all departments of the government. With too much power governments become autocratic, he declared. He then told the audience he would vote for Harding for president, although he was not his choice at the Chicago convention, and that he thinks both candidates are second rate. He then launched into an attack on the League of Nations because he thinks it is a pact based on greed. A few people left the hall as he denounced the league.

McElveen declared his opposition to McArthur because he was a member of a "do-nothing-congress." "Can you think of one piece of constructive legislation passed since the armistice was signed?" he questioned.

"Wasn't it a Republican congress?" someone asked.

"You wait a minute," was the answer.

**CUMMINS BILL HIT**

Again arraigning congress for its lack of activity and flaying McArthur as a member, McElveen told of the Cummins-Esch bill which, he said, would add \$250 to the taxes of every family, for the benefit of a special class—the railroads. He declared McArthur is tied up with the special interests, that he opposed almost all bills that were proposed in the interest of the people, that he was for booze, voted for "pork," is reactionary, a figurehead, and "never introduced or championed one single important constructive measure."

He branded McArthur as foe of farmer and laborer, said he was for the vicious Shields waterpower bill, and told the audience of a poor speech McArthur made in Baltimore.

**LEAGUE DEFENDED**

Dr. McElveen was followed by Ada Wallace Unruh. He had denounced the League of Nations. Mrs. Unruh's first words were, "I am for the League of Nations already established. The crowd howled. For fully half a minute they applauded and shouted. She made another reference to the league. Again

The following varieties are shown: Rantams, Rhode Island Red, Dark Cornish, Rhode Island White, Black Minorca, White Rocks, Barred Rocks, Pit Games, Anconas and all Polish varieties. The boys' and girls' clubs are also showing good stock. The show also contains a fine exhibit of water fowl, turkeys and a lone owl.

Over 100 entries have also been made in rabbits, the following varieties being found in the hutches: New Zealand, Himalayas, Flemish Giants, Cheeked Giants, White Giants, Angoras and American Blue. All exhibitors are members of the Oregon branch of the National Breeders' and Fanciers' association, Inc., and are showing their stock in an effort to educate the public to the commercial value of their product. The rabbits were judged by I. D. Mow of Portland.

# WIDOWS NAMED ADMINISTRATRIX OF HEDDERLY ESTATE

Mrs. Lena A. Hedderly, widow of Robert W. Hedderly, who was fatally shot when federal and police agents attempted to place him under arrest the night of September 10, was appointed by Presiding Judge Tazewell Saturday as administratrix of the estate of her husband.

The petition estimates the estate at some \$1290 and an unliquidated claim against W. R. Wood, E. M. Jackson, William D. Morris, James J. Higgins and Delazar C. Smith for damages because of Hedderly's death. The heirs are, in addition, one child, John R. Hedderly, aged 4 years, of 267 Columbia street.

**ADMINISTRATOR NAMED FOR NEWBERRY ESTATE**

Presiding Judge Tazewell Friday appointed James Donovan of Portland as administrator of the estate in Oregon of the late Amelia Newberry. This estate consists of the right of action for damages for injuries sustained by Mrs. Newberry, resulting in her death, on the night of March 13 of this year when, says the petition for the appointment of an administrator, she was struck by a taxicab driven by Charles Wheatley.

The petition set forth that the heirs are residents of California, three daughters and one son, being located at Los Angeles or Pomona, and that they have written and served a notice of appointment of Donovan, so that a suit for damages may be instituted.

**Service Fish Company Files**

# Electric Exposition Will Be Discussed At Library Tonight

To discuss the proposed electric exposition to be held in Portland to celebrate the discovery of the electric magnet in 1825, F. E. Beach, ex-chairman of the Columbia Hydro-Electric league, has called a meeting of 25 leading citizens in room A, Central library, at 8 o'clock tonight.

George W. Joseph will discuss the electrical power development possibilities of the Columbia river basin. Henry Reed, county assessor, will give some suggestions and data on the subject of financing an exposition. George L. Cleaver will review the discovery and development of the electric magnet.

One of the attractive features of the proposed exposition will be the gathering of the best electrical talent in the world and there will be on exhibition in Portland the most modern and up to date appliances in all electrical developments.

The same exposition is proposed to celebrate the centennial of the Pacific and Columbia river highways in connection with the Lincoln highway.

# CONSTRUCTION OF WOOL WAREHOUSE BEGINS IN 60 DAYS

Construction work will begin within 60 days on the plant of the Western Wool Warehouse company at the foot of Richmond street, according to announcement made today by Louis Irvine Thompson, architect for the company. The buildings are estimated to cost \$300,000 and will be located on a three acre tract recently purchased by the warehouse company from the American Marine Iron Works for \$275,000.

Plans outlined by Thompson call for a main building 100 by 160 feet in dimensions and three stories high, a two story building 24 by 130 feet in dimensions to house the scouring plant, a two story warehouse building 60 by 160 feet, power house 20 by 40 feet, fuel storage building 50 by 100 feet and a large warehouse to be erected on the company's block.

**BUILDINGS FIREPROOF**

All buildings are to be of concrete construction and absolutely fireproof, according to the architect.

The tract purchased by the Western Wool Warehouse company has a frontage of 380 feet on the Willamette river and a depth of 465 feet. Rail transportation will be furnished by spur track from the O-W-R. & N. belt line which will enter the warehouse and communicate with the docks on the waterfront. The new plant will be completed in time to handle the 1921 wool clip and will have a capacity of 15,000,000 pounds, according to officials of the company.

The Western Wool Warehouse company is incorporated under Oregon laws with capitalization of \$2,000,000. Officers are: M. L. Jones of Brooks, president; S. F. Wilson, vice president and general manager; A. H. Lea, secretary, and R. H. Cochran, treasurer.

**\$250,000 STOCK TAKEN**

According to Beverly & Goodwin, fiscal agents of the concern, about \$350,000 of the company's stock already has been subscribed.

Besides its investment in buildings and equipment the company proposes to have approximately \$1,500,000 available for loans to wool growers and livestock men. Operation of the company will tend to stabilize the Western wool market and more firmly fix Portland's position as the Pacific coast center of the wool industry. The plant will be the only one west of Chicago especially designed for scouring and handling wool. The grader in charge of the plant will be selected with the approval of the federal bureau of markets at Washington.

# City Purchases Park Acreage in St. Johns Section

The city of Portland today acquired 65 acres of property for a park site in the St. Johns district. The site known as the Ladd & Strong tract, is in Holbrook addition, extending from St. Johns avenue north to the Oregon-Washington Railroad & Navigation company right of way. City officials, headed by Deputy City Attorney Tomlinson, were "up before breakfast" to close the deal, as a clause in the insurance of title made it necessary that the deal be consummated before that hour.

The purchase price was \$42,333.33, an even third more than the assessed valuation.

The site is said to be admirably suited for park and playground purposes. It has a commanding knoll, from the crest of which a view of the Columbia basin may be had. Its general contour will permit the construction of artificial ponds.

The property was sold by the owners, headed by the Ladd & Strong interests.

# Mrs. Mary Gilbaugh Of Astoria Is Dead

Gilbaugh of Astoria, died Friday evening at St. Vincent's hospital following an illness of several years' duration, which culminated acutely several days ago. Mrs. Gilbaugh was the daughter of W. C. Nicholson of Baker county and is survived by her husband, a daughter, Mrs. R. C. Pederson, and a son, John Herbert Gilbaugh of Astoria, and a sister, Mrs. Nannie J. Hoberg of Tigard, Or. Funeral arrangements have not been made.

# Brass Knucks Are Seized; Deportation Faces Accused Man

R. P. Bonham, chief of the United States immigration service here, Thursday arrested Emanuel Chagarakin of Astoria on the charge of running a lodging house and living off the earnings of women. Chagarakin is lodged in jail under \$3000 bond. Bonham brought said to have been used by Chagarakin in threats to his victims should they inform against him. The attorney for Chagarakin, when Bonham produced at the hearing letters and telegrams between the defendant and his wife, the women who testified against him, dropped the case.

Chagarakin, who is a native of Greece, will be deported, and should he return to the United States will be given a two-year jail sentence followed by a second deportation.

# Wheat Farmers Of U. S. To Strike

Chicago, Oct. 9.—(I. N. S.)—Grain futures averaged higher today at the Board of Trade. Wheat led the upturn, gaining strength from the start on the bullish government crop report and advancing in the final half hour on reports that the return of Russell Brake from the state penitentiary to the Multnomah county jail.

Brake was returned to the jail in Portland Friday afternoon. This morning the mandamus proceeding brought against L. H. Compton, warden at the state penitentiary, by Tom Garland, attorney for young Brake, is scheduled to be heard at Salem, but it probably will be quashed because of the voluntary return of Brake by the warden.

Brake, who was convicted in the Clackamas county circuit court for his part in the murder of Harry Dubinsky, a for hire automobile driver, is applying to the supreme court. He desires to remain in the Multnomah county jail rather than in the penitentiary, pending this appeal. A certified copy of probable cause for his arrest was presented by Garland to the warden four days ago, with the request that Brake be returned to the authorities from whom he was released at Salem, but he was denied. Garland then began his mandamus action, which culminates today before Circuit Judge Percy R. Kelly at Salem.

# Motorist Permitted To Pay for Injury

In order to give J. E. Bentley a chance to settle with the parents of Eileen Murray, 9-year-old child, whom he ran down Sunday with his machine, Judge Roseman continued the case until October 15 for judgment.

Bentley is charged with reckless driving and passing a streetcar which had stopped. He is alleged to have run into the Murray girl as she was boarding a streetcar. The accident resulted in fracture of the right leg and was badly bruised.

# Hood River County Judgeship Sought By H. L. Hasbrouck

Hood River, Oct. 9.—Considerable interest is aroused in this county over the prospects of a hot fight for the post of county judge, which is expected to be resigned by Judge L. N. Blowers. H. L. Hasbrouck at the primaries, received the nomination from both Republicans and Democrats, and was generally accepted that he would be next judge. Hannum, defeated for renomination as county commissioner in the primaries by George Sheppard, has announced his intention to run for the county judgeship on the independent ticket. His entry into the race reopens an old political sore here and the race is expected to be spirited.

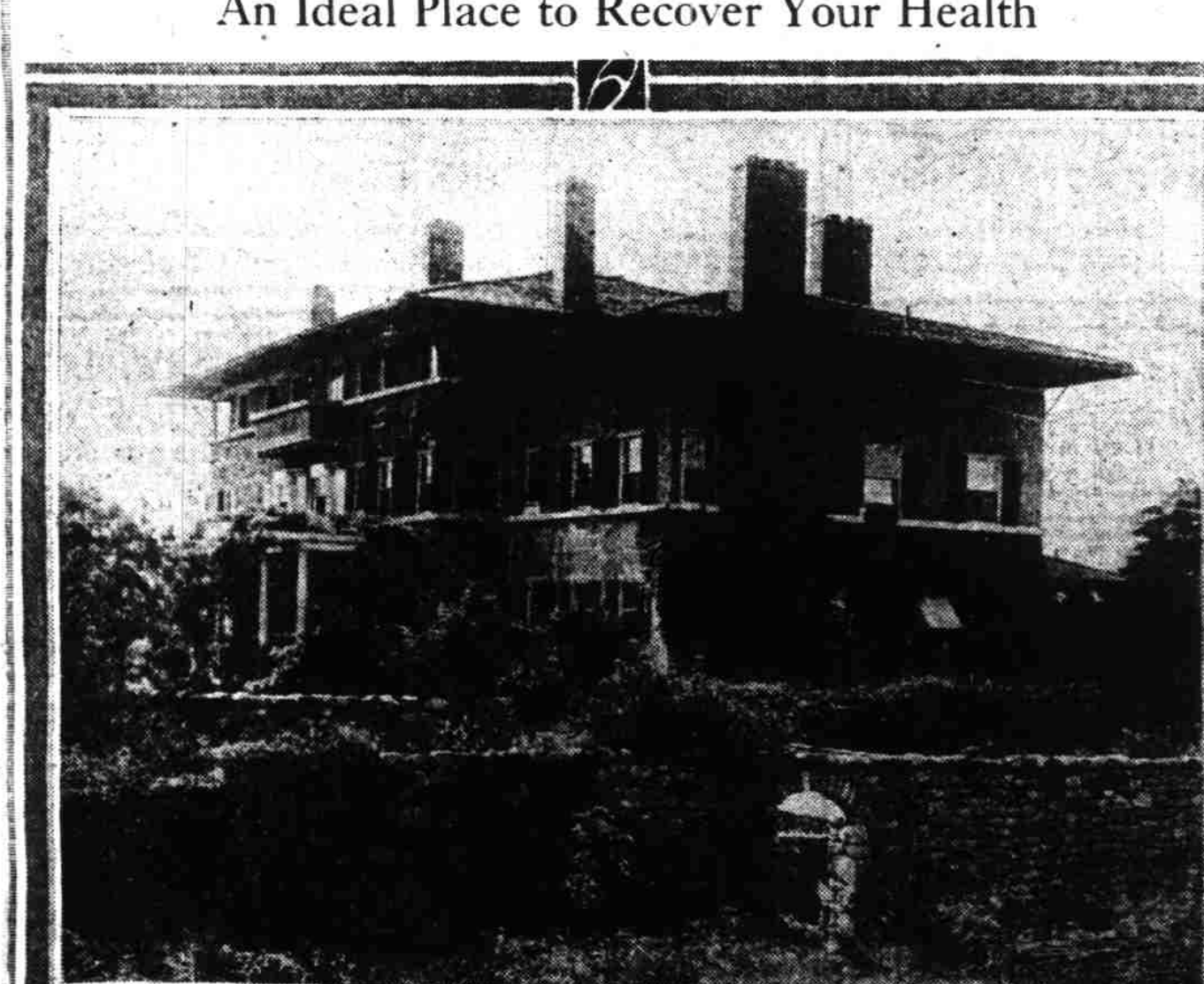
# Powell Valley Road Repairs Requested

**PATROLL IS PROVIDED**

That the new national guard is a payroll enterprise rather than a heavy expense to the state was stated by White, who said that the new law provides liberal pay for every man attending drill, the payment being made by the federal government. It will require more than \$100,000 a year to pay for the Army drills and this sum will be distributed among the towns and cities maintaining companies. The amount paid in by the government will be far greater than the amount of appropriation required of the state to maintain the troops, he said.

A survey of the state will be necessary before formation of new units can be undertaken on a large scale and this survey will be undertaken by the general staff of the Oregon National Guard later in the year. A troop of cavalry, a battery of field artillery and battalion headquarters, a company of coast artillery, a field hospital and a company of infantry will be formed at once. The infantry company goes to Dallas. Towns now having vacant armories will be given the first opportunity to furnish units. These towns are Albany, Roseburg and Woodburn.
