

BORAH IS BITTER OVER ORDERS BY G.O.P. COMMITTEE

Idaho Senator Keenly Displeased
at Request That He Return
to State and Work for Gooding

Boise, Idaho, Oct. 9.—Prominent Republicans here make little secret of the fact that Senator William E. Borah was recently ordered by the Republican national committee to return to Idaho and campaign for the election of Frank R. Gooding to the United States senate. Some attribute to this fact the open break that has come between Senator Borah and the national committee.

It is well understood here that the Gooding candidacy is distasteful to Borah. Two years ago the Non-Partisan league endorsed Borah for reelection. This was at a time when Gooding was making a sensational fight against the league and charging the leaders with disloyalty and anarchy. At the election Borah won by a margin of 30,000 over his Democratic opponent. Gooding was defeated by upward of 900 plurality. Senator John P. Nugent, Democrat, who ran against Gooding, also was endorsed by the Non-Partisan league.

BORAH'S DISPLEASURE KEEN
Senator Borah has made no secret of his opposition to Gooding. He left the state for the East when he became satisfied that Gooding was to be nominated over his opposition. To intimate political friends he announced that he would not return until after the election. In view of this state of mind an order from the national committee to return and enter the fight for Gooding was especially exasperating.

Democrats here are elated over the rupture that has come between Borah and the committee. They feel that it will make certain the reelection of Senator Nugent. The Democratic senator has the endorsement of the Non-Partisan league and the league is credited this year with 20,000 votes. A large majority of these will vote for Senator Nugent, however, they may vote for president. It is conceded on all sides that nothing short of a Republican landslide in the state will defeat the reelection of Senator Nugent.

Republicans are confident of carrying the state for Senator Harding. Some talk of 25,000 majority. As there has been no canvass made this claim is set down to the desire of the men making it rather than to information or clear judgment.

Four years ago the total vote in Idaho was 135,000 in round numbers. Of these Wilson received 70,000, Hughes 55,000 and the Socialists and Prohibitionists the remainder. This year again Republican politicians at headquarters place the total vote at 150,000. Of these the Socialists are credited with at least 5,000. This would leave 45,000 to be divided between Democrats and Republicans.

MAJORITY TALK SILLY
In the light of this analysis all talk of 25,000 Republican majority seems all-

ly. Should the Democrats do no better than hold their own and poll the 70,000 votes they had four years ago, the best the Republicans could hope for would be a lead of 5,000. Men who aim to get at the facts rather than let their wishes run away with them insist that the result in Idaho depends largely on how the Non-Partisan leaguers will vote for president. In their antecedents a large majority of these leaguers are Republicans. Should they decide to vote for Governor Cox in large numbers, Cox will carry the state. The best that can be said about it at this time is that Idaho is doubtful with leanings toward the Republicans on the head of the ticket.

In making this concession it must be remembered that Idaho never cast her electoral vote for a Democrat after free silver days until the big Republican split in 1912 and then the Democrats polled only 22.5 per cent of the total vote. Republicans insist that President Wilson's sweep of four years ago was not a fair party test.

CYCLONE STRIKES SAN JOSE, 1 HURT; TREES UPROOTED

First Violent Disturbance of Kind
Since 1868 Causes Property
Damage; Santa Clara Struck.

San Jose, Cal., Oct. 9.—(U. P.)—One man was injured, orchard trees were uprooted, and shingles were blown from houses, in a heavy cyclone, the first of the kind in this city since 1868, which today swept through the outskirts of this city and Santa Clara section.

The damage amounts to several hundred dollars.

Several automobiles standing on the streets were moved.

The cyclone was one fourth of a mile in diameter at the top.

M. Bamba, the man injured, was carrying a box in a vacant lot when the twister passed through. He was lifted from the ground and hurled 50 feet against the trunk of a tree. His injuries, it was stated, will not prove fatal.

Joe Gringwall, aged 15, was hunting on Guadalupe creek. The cyclone lifted him into a bush 15 feet away. He was not hurt.

When the center of the cyclone passed through a lumber yard, 15-foot planks filled the air.

A large garage belonging to the Walnut Growers association was moved 6 feet but remained intact.

In Haven Grove, a suburb, a prune tree in full fruit was deposited on the roof of a bungalow. Along the entire path of the twister shingles were torn from roofs, trees were uprooted and similar damage done.

The twister came up from the southwest with practically no warning and passed through the town to the northeast. It was not of an exceptionally violent nature as such storms go, according to the weather bureau.

THREE ACCUSED IN CALIFORNIA'S LIQUOR SCANDAL

Warrants Out for Harry Brolaski,
Former Mayor of Redondo; E.
H. Murphy and D. S. Newton.

San Francisco, Oct. 9.—(U. P.)—United States Commissioner Francis Krull tonight issued warrants for the arrest of Harry A. Brolaski, broker and former mayor of Redondo, Cal., E. H. Murphy, now said to be in Seattle, and Douglas S. Newton of San Francisco, charging conspiracy to violate the prohibition law.

Krull announced bonds in each case will be set at \$10,000.

The issuance of warrants formed the climax of two weeks' investigation of prohibition enforcement in Northern California, which started immediately after Former Prohibition Director Loren Handley was killed in an alleged mysterious automobile accident.

WOMAN AGENT REMOVED

The removal yesterday of Mrs. Glad Kimball Warburton, who had succeeded Handley in charge of the prohibition forces in California, was one phase of the case, and charges that 50 gallons of liquor were served to delegates to the Democratic national convention were another phase.

Brolaski was arrested later in the evening at the office of his attorney. Officers expected to serve the other warrants soon.

Brolaski, according to the United States attorney's office, figured in the alleged liquor ring as the "master mind" which is alleged to have directed illicit dealings in liquor netting nearly a quarter million dollars in profits.

The liquor, it was charged, was secured from government bonded warehouses on orders said to have originated in the San Francisco prohibition enforcement office.

HANDLEY CASE INVESTIGATED

Another development in the investigation today was the announcement by federal authorities that an investigation of the death of former Prohibition Director Handley is in progress. They said attempts to locate the chauffeur with whom Handley was riding to the Democratic state convention at Sacramento, when he was killed, thus far have been fruitless.

Other developments in the liquor investigation today included charges that telephone wires to the prohibition director's office had been tapped and that important documents were missing from the office.

IN PUBLIC EYE
Brolaski's case, however, was the chief center of interest, owing to the fact that he had been much in the public eye.

A few years ago Brolaski announced he had given up stock promotion and similar lines of work, that he had "reformed" and would devote the remainder of his life to other pursuits. He followed this announcement by the writing of a book called "The Fool and His Money." It sparked with observations on how easily the public could be misled.

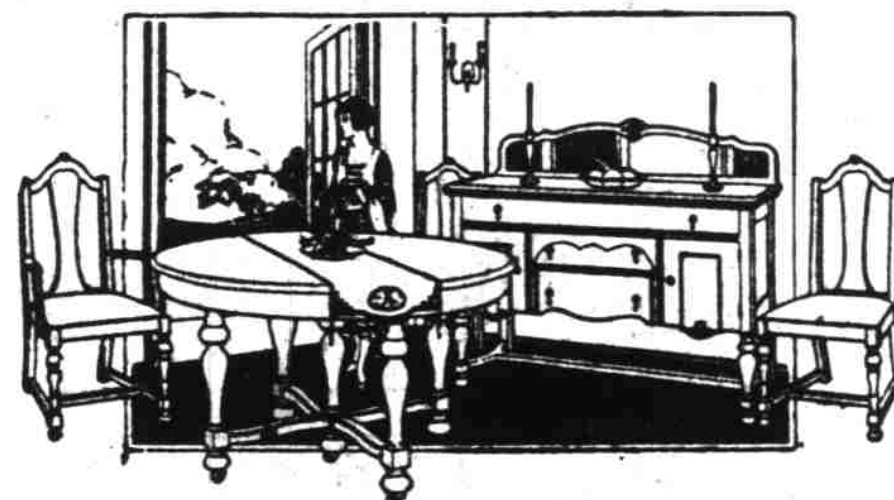

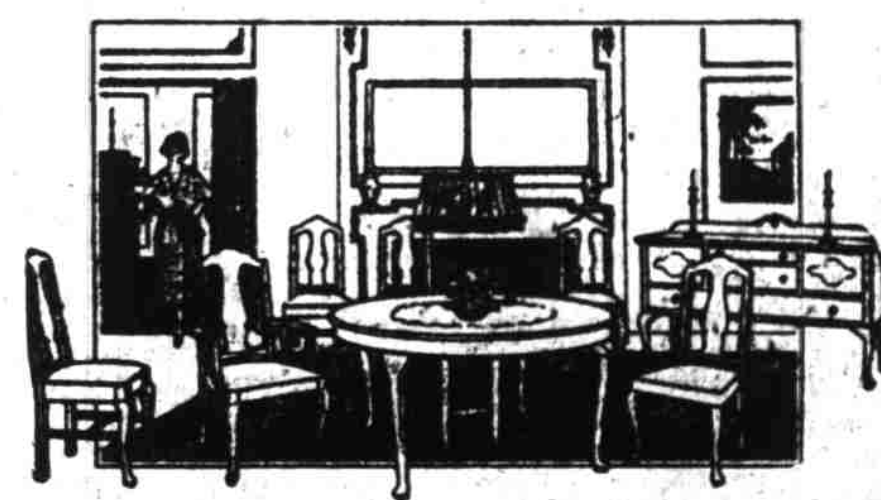

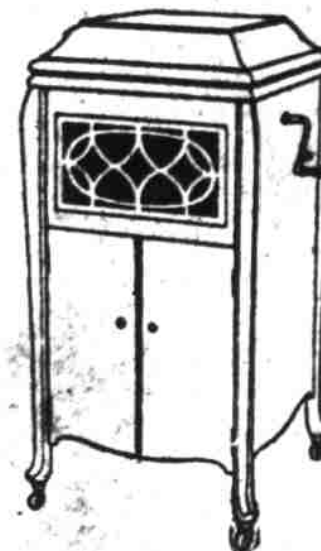
