

7 TRUE BILLS ARE RETURNED BY U. S. GRAND JURY

Seven true bills, one no true and three secret indictments were returned by the federal grand jury at 2:15 o'clock this afternoon to Federal Judge R. S. Bean as a partial report. The jury then retired for further deliberation.

Three jitney drivers in Southern Oregon who sought to solve the gasoline shortage problem by appropriating gasoline from the government tanks at Klamath Falls and Indian reservation were indicted on charges of conspiring to steal and with stealing government property. They are John Flodin, James Hunsaker and E. A. Quaf. Each is at liberty under \$2000 bonds. About 300 gallons of gas was missed by the superintendent, the report states.

LIQUOR CASE INCLUDED

Carl Henry is charged with operating a still on a barge in the Willamette river near Linton. He is out under \$1000 bonds.

John Rouer is said to have transported a stolen automobile from Northern Washington to Oregon in violation of the federal motor vehicle act. Rouer also broke up harvesting operations around Hillsboro by stealing about \$4000 worth of bellows. He was caught while trying to dispose of the bellows to Portland second-hand merchants.

R. J. Wittel is charged with violation of the Mann act. He is said to have induced Mrs. Mary Rose of Chico, Cal., to leave her husband and three children and go with him to Klamath Falls. Mrs. Rose took her fourth child with her, a baby. The government has effected a reconciliation between the Roses. Wittel is held in the county jail in default of \$1500 bail.

One of the surprises was the returning of a not true bill against W. L. Hall, who is said to be the owner of a farm where a large still was recently found by the government. The buildings on

the place were burned down by the prohibition agents.

LANDON ACCUSED
George Landon is charged with transporting a 16-year-old girl from Washington to Oregon in violation of the white slave law.

John Hadden, alleged narcotic peddler, who had several young men working for him whom he had placed on the drug, was also indicted. He is held in the county jail in default of bail.

Business Men of The Dalles to Pay For Street Lights

The Dalles, Oct. 12.—Second street, along which are located the principal business establishments of the city, is to be illuminated. The business men decided to put in a system of eight ornamental lights to the block, 72 in all, running from the Wasco mills to a point opposite the railroad station, at a cost of approximately \$8000.

At the special election, November 2, voters will decide if the city is to pay expense of maintenance for the second six months. Should the voters decide adversely, the business men say they will bear the entire cost.

John Barrett Head Of Trade School

John Barrett, former director general of the Pan-American union, is now president of the administrative council of the Pan-American College of Commerce, according to information received by the Chamber of Commerce. Barrett has a wide acquaintance with Portland business men. The Pan-American College of Commerce provides special trade courses for students interested in Latin-American trade.

Boosts Spokane Products
Spokane, Wash., Oct. 12.—"Purchase every product that is made in Spokane territory," is the watchword of the Brotherhood of P. E. F., a new organization of boosters for the Inland Empire. The payroll bureau of the Spokane Advertising club is behind it.

SEEDS OF OREGON TREES ARE TO BE SENT TO AUSTRALIA

J. F. Kummel, forest examiner in charge of reforestation, accompanied by A. Helm, Australian forester, who has been studying American forestry methods for several weeks, has returned from a visit to the Selduc burn plantation in the Olympic and the Clispus burn in the Rainier national forest.

Helm has left orders for Douglas fir, Sitka spruce and Western white pine to be sent to Australia for experimental planting. From Portland he will go to California to visit the redwood area, and thence to Arizona. In California he will gather seeds from the Jeffrey pine, yellow pine and Douglas fir.

Helm has great hopes for the establishment of the Douglas fir forest in Australia. While visiting in Denmark he was deeply impressed with the splendid progress made by 30-year-old Douglas firs grown from Pacific Northwest seed, and believes it will grow well in his own country.

On the Selduc burn 85 per cent of the trees planted last spring have survived, which is quite satisfactory from the forest service standpoint. The trees were endangered by fire last spring. The area is more than 1800 acres in extent.

On the Clispus burn, 500 acres were planted last spring. Results are only fair, many of the trees which made a splendid growth in the early summer suffering from drought later on. On one rocky slope almost every tree was eaten off, supposedly by rock cones. Trees have hitherto been damaged by mountain beaver and grouse, but this is the first instance known of cone injury.

Helm was much interested in the American method of planting without regard to dead wood and brush already upon the land. In foreign countries, says Helm, all this is cleared off before the trees are planted. He is undecided as to which method he will use in Australia.

Socialist Replies To Attacks Upon Party by Pastor

Pasco, Wash., Oct. 12.—At the Methodist church Sunday evening W. H. Mangold, Socialist, answered addresses by Dr. Eaton, the pastor, on the two previous Sunday evenings, attacking the doctrines of Socialism from religious and educational standpoints. He asserted that Dr. Eaton had built up a straw man, composed of equal parts of I. W. Wism, Bolshevism, Non-partisanship and communism, and then label it Socialism, and then proceeded to tear it apart. Mangold denied that any similarity exists between the I. W. W. and Socialism, explaining that Socialists advocate a peaceable change in society by means of the ballot, while the I. W. W. and Bolshevists advocate a change by direct action.

Dr. Eaton announced that his series of talks on social issues will continue and that Mangold will be given another opportunity to reply.

Federal Attorney's Office Looks Like Indian Reservation

The United States attorney's office today reminded one of an Indian reservation. Ten Indians from the Klamath Falls reservation were brought to Portland Monday by Abraham Charlie, an Indian policeman, to testify before the federal grand jury in liquor cases. Braided hair, red blanket coats, new rubber elastic shoes and other Indian fashions were in evidence.

Federal officials say they have been having much trouble lately with bootleggers who operate around the reservation. The purpose of the hearing is to obtain evidence that will put a stop to present activities, and if possible get court convictions that will scare others away.

Columbus Revered In Honor Be fitting Great Discoverer

Portland observes Columbus day today by a series of programs in all the schools, a Knights of Columbus banquet tonight at the Multnomah hotel and the closing of banks and the city hall.

W. F. Woodward, chairman of the educational committee of the school board, arranged for informal talks to all students by their teachers.

Tonight at the Multnomah banquet more than 200 people will hear "Fighting Captain Jack" Sullivan of Seattle deliver an address. Captain A. A. Murphy will act as toastmaster.

Dining Car Raided, Whiskey Is Seized; Four Men Arrested

Suspicious of the police that liquor was being brought into Portland from Canada were confirmed Monday night in a raid on a dining car just after a Great Northern train pulled into the station from Vancouver, B. C. Forty-two quarts of Sunnybrook whiskey were secured. The conductor, George M. Nichols; cook, Frank Pierce; and two colored waiters, Bud Brady and M. W. King, were arrested and held in the city jail overnight. Federal officials were appraised of the facts this morning by the police and it is probable the case may be prosecuted in the federal court.

Col. White Urges Guard Enlistments

Colonel George A. White, adjutant general of the National Guard of Oregon, has returned from Washington, D. C., and Monday evening spoke to the officers of the National Guard units in Portland, urging enlistments in the organization, as it has now been recognized as the main arm of national defense. An extensive recruiting campaign is to be started throughout the state.

'Government Liquor' Sent to California

Two thousand quarts of liquor were loaded on two large army trucks this morning by soldiers working under instructions of United States Marshal George Alexander and were sent on their way to California, where the government will use the liquor in army hospitals for medicinal purposes. Not one bottle was broken during the entire transaction.

COLE DIVORCE IS UPHELD BY COURT

Salem, Oct. 12.—Because Lu Elsie Cole failed to substantiate her charges that she was forced into marriage through threats and menace, the supreme court Tuesday morning refused to annul her marriage to Robert Cole. The opinion, written by Chief Justice McBride, affirms the decree of Judge Gantenbein of the Multnomah county circuit court.

A. M. Logan and Fisher C. Logan, copartners doing business under firm name of Logan Bros., vs. R. B. Cross, appellant; appeal from Crook county; action to dismiss appeal for want of sufficient undertaking. Appeal dismissed.

Smith Security company and R. R. Thompson Estate company vs. Multnomah county, appellant; appeal from Multnomah county; action to review and correct property assessment. Opinion by Justice Johns. Action dismissed.

L. D. Razor et al. vs. West Coast Development company et al.; appeal from Coos county; action to recover money. Opinion by Justice Johns. Judge John S. Coke affirmed.

Chicago, Oct. 12.—(U. P.)—The supreme court today granted a writ of supersedeas in the case of Joseph C. Tanga and Samuel Gerra, two of the men scheduled to hang here for murder Thursday and Friday. The others will be hanged Saturday to schedule, Sheriff Peters announced.

Maryland Convicts In Fierce Riot, but Are Quieted Down

Baltimore, Oct. 12.—(L. N. S.)—Rioting in the Maryland penitentiary broke out anew late this afternoon, the convicts clashing with the prison guards in a stiff battle. The prisoners, fighting furiously, reached the outer walls, with only a single gate between them and the street, but it is understood, were driven back by the guards. A similar disturbance occurred several weeks ago, at which time part of the prison was wrecked.
