

TEACHERS IN HOT DISCUSSION, TOLD TO 'HIRE' A HALL

Principals and grade teachers wrangled two hours before the school board Tuesday night over tenure and salary, disputed among themselves, presented juggled statistics, agreed on nothing and in the end were instructed by the board to "hire a hall."

The directors' room was packed with the teachers, the principals who had split from the Federated Teachers' council on one side and the grade teachers on the other. Mrs. Jennie Richardson came to bat for the grade teachers, although she claimed to express the opinion of neither the council nor the Grade Teachers' association. She is president of both.

TENURE LAW LAUDED

She gave the history of the tenure law and urged the retention of the present system because the teachers are happy under it, and because the legislators might have a poor opinion of them if they again sought to have it changed.

H. M. Sherwood, president of the principals' association, formally presented the resolution adopted by his association, favoring the board power to try all cases against teachers on presentation by the superintendent and, by unanimous verdict to drop any such teacher.

OBJECTION IS MADE

Mrs. Richardson then rose to object to the letter sent by the principals explaining their reasons for withdrawal, declaring it unfair. She denied any disruption.

Principal A. A. Campbell of Thompson school responded.

"Freedom sometimes runs to license, especially when people have been coerced before there was any tenure in the city," he said. "It is easy to see how we can advance from one extreme to another extreme. Teachers now tell their principals they are inefficient. If we are inefficient, we don't want to hide behind any tenure law. We want the board to have the power to say, 'There is an inefficient principal,' and put him out."

Mrs. C. K. Likely of Couch school responded in a heated manner.

Then the board members expressed their opinions. Director Orton said he was weary of expensive trials and was willing to accept the recommendation of the superintendent and his assistants for removals without going through trials such as the board has been compelled to listen to.

ORTON HURLS REPLY

"But do you think the teachers should take the initiative?" asked Mrs. Richardson.

"Do you think the teachers would object if the board took the initiative?" responded Orton.

Director Orton said he considered it the business of both teachers and direc-

tors to initiate the business before the legislature.

Director Thomas said it was inconsistent for three men to try what five men have already gone over and that the best interests of the children are that incompetent teachers be weeded out.

Director Woodward said conditions that made the tenure law a good thing had changed and that a teacher who fails in her responsibility should give up her position.

Director Newill said he believed firmly in "tenure of office," but not in the present law. He said it was regarded everywhere as a joke. He suggested that the teachers themselves who are "presently successful in politics," should go before the legislature with it.

PAY SCHEDULE OFFERED

Principal Sherwood presented the salary schedule recommended by the principals, based upon a comparison of salaries in 28 "selected" cities. Miss Roach of Couch school immediately declared she was the third member of the statistics committee which made up the list of cities and that she had not even been notified of the meetings until the list was made up. She declared the cities had been "picked" to show a greater differential between principals and teachers.

W. V. Green, chemistry teacher of Washington high, and other members of the committee, explained he had been personally responsible for not calling Miss Roach, that he had neglected to do so, but said she had been called to approve the work after it had been done.

He admitted the cities had been "jockeyed," but in such a way as to "reflect a good situation." For instance, New Orleans, Atlanta and such cities which did not reflect a good situation, were left out.

Miss Laura Richards, grade teacher, asked if he had investigated living costs in these cities. Green admitted he had not.

The board put a stop to further wrangling and instructed them to hire a hall to sit and instructed them to discuss the issues only at recess and after school hours.
