

COOLIDGE APPEARS UNRUFFLED ABOUT COMING ELECTION

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Boston, Mass., Oct. 15.—Governor Calvin Coolidge, Republican candidate for the vice presidency, is about as clear-headed and dispassionate a person as can be found by the political wayfarer who wants to get at the currents of thought in Massachusetts and not the tides of partisanship.

Perhaps it's the atmosphere created by men like President Lowell or the influence possibly of Root, Hughes, Taft, Hoover, Wickersham, but the state house in Boston doesn't exude "bitter ends" or an irreconcilable spirit on the League of Nations. Governor Coolidge insists with emphasis that he is in complete agreement with the Republican platform and Senator Harding's speeches.

LEAVES IT TO HARDING
The governor himself, with natural modesty, doesn't attempt to argue issues that are more properly within the jurisdiction of the head of the ticket, Senator Harding, but such thoughts as he does express in his public speeches rather incline toward the Ellihu Root notion of what the Republican platform means than the Borah or Johnson view.

Coolidge called my attention to a telegram from Senator Harding published in the last two days, in which the latter says the speech at Des Moines was not out of harmony with the one delivered at Marion August 28. It is from the latter address that Governor Coolidge always quotes, and he picked up a copy of it while we talked and pointed to a paragraph in which, after discussing the present League of Nations and the Hague tribunal, Senator Harding said:

"I would go even farther. I would take and combine all that is good and excise all that is bad from both organizations. This statement is broad enough to include the suggestion that if the league is so entwined and interwoven into the peace treaty of Europe that its good must be preserved in order to stabilize the peace of the continent, then it can be amended or revised so that we may still have a remnant of world aspirations build into the world's highest conception of helpful cooperation."

SOME ACCEPT JOHNSON
That's the policy which Senator Harding is expected here to fulfill if he is elected to the presidency. Plainly the people who, with Governor Coolidge, favor a league of nations or association of nations are pinning their faith on the revision of the treaty of Versailles to conform to Republican doctrines. Some folks here accept the Johnson interpretation of the Republican platform, but the predominant Republican feeling is for some kind of a league, even though it has to be built on the foundations of the present structure. Senator Hale of Maine in the recent campaign in that state made it clear that he didn't believe Republican victory means repudiation of the idea or principle of a league of nations. And anyone who talks with Governor Coolidge or reads his speeches recognizes in them an emphasis on the affirmative rather than the negative side of the league controversy. For instance, he said recently: "A world relationship exists. It is. It did not come into being as a result of any proposed treaty, and it will not be changed by any great and solemn referendum."

The foregoing is a significant warning that Republican victory in the nation should not be interpreted as a rejection of the idea of partnership or

association with Europe in an effort to preserve world peace. Rather it carries the suggestion that the interests of the United States and the rest of the world have been almost irrevocably drawn together.

DEFINES STATESMANSHIP

"The course of true statesmanship," continues the governor, "is to seek out, to discover what world relationship is, and put the action of the nations in harmony with it. This Senator Harding is proposing to do. That relationship is not founded upon major force. Prussia made that mistake. It is founded upon compelling reason. Its herald is not a clanking saber, but the still small voice. To the establishment of that relationship through the recognition of reciprocal rights and duties, the Republican party, by its history, by its policy, by its candidate, stands pledged. This is the way with national honor, with independence, to a world peace. In the direction Senator Harding leads."

EXAMINATION OF OTHER UTTERANCES
Examination of other utterances by Governor Coolidge shows that he is by no means a "bitter ender" or a member of the Borah-Johnson faction, but wants some league of nations. He argues against the incurring of obligations that America would not wish to fulfill. He believes international morality is not aided by the acceptance of obligations on a treaty that is not intended to be enforced.

FAVORS LODGE BRAND

Reservations, such as Senator Lodge framed in the senate, would probably please Governor Coolidge. In some of his speeches he goes back to the Lodge reservations and analyzes them. "This cannot be merely affection for the work of a fellow Republican from Massachusetts, but is unquestionably based on a fundamental belief in world cooperation as essential and inevitable in the present day and age."

Governor Coolidge is not a spectacular individual, but he talks common sense. Even in private conversation he doesn't talk like a candidate or politician. He doesn't breathe the bitterness of partisanship which the writer has encountered so often in Washington and elsewhere in the last two years. If he is elected vice president, he will give such advice as is asked of him, will preside as fairly as he knows how in the senate, will not insist on a place in the cabinet or anything else that is outside a vice president's bailiwick. He has no exaggerated idea of the part he may play if the Republican national ticket is elected. He doesn't seem to be excited over the campaign or the fate of the United States or the rest of the world, no matter what the verdict is next November. He's a plain everyday citizen who is evidently not wrapped up in ambition but in useful toil.

BANDIT MURDERER GOES TO GALLOWS, CURSING MANKIND

Chicago, Oct. 15.—(I. N. S.)—The third man to be hanged in Chicago within 24 hours paid with his life on the gallows in the county jail today. He was Frank Zagar, who killed two men during the holdup of a hotel at Burnham, a suburb, more than a year ago.

Zagar spent his last night on earth sullenly pacing the floor of the death cell, cursing, or playing cards with the guards. When his 12-year-old sister flung herself at his feet and begged him to kiss her goodbye he drove her away and cursed the guards for permitting his family to come near him.

"What in hell did you come here for. I told those guards to keep you out of here," he shouted when Father James Shields of Holy Name Cathedral visited him at 1 o'clock this morning. Almost until the time he walked to the scaffold Zagar was hopeful of a reprieve. His attorney spent the night awaiting word from the governor at Springfield that never came.

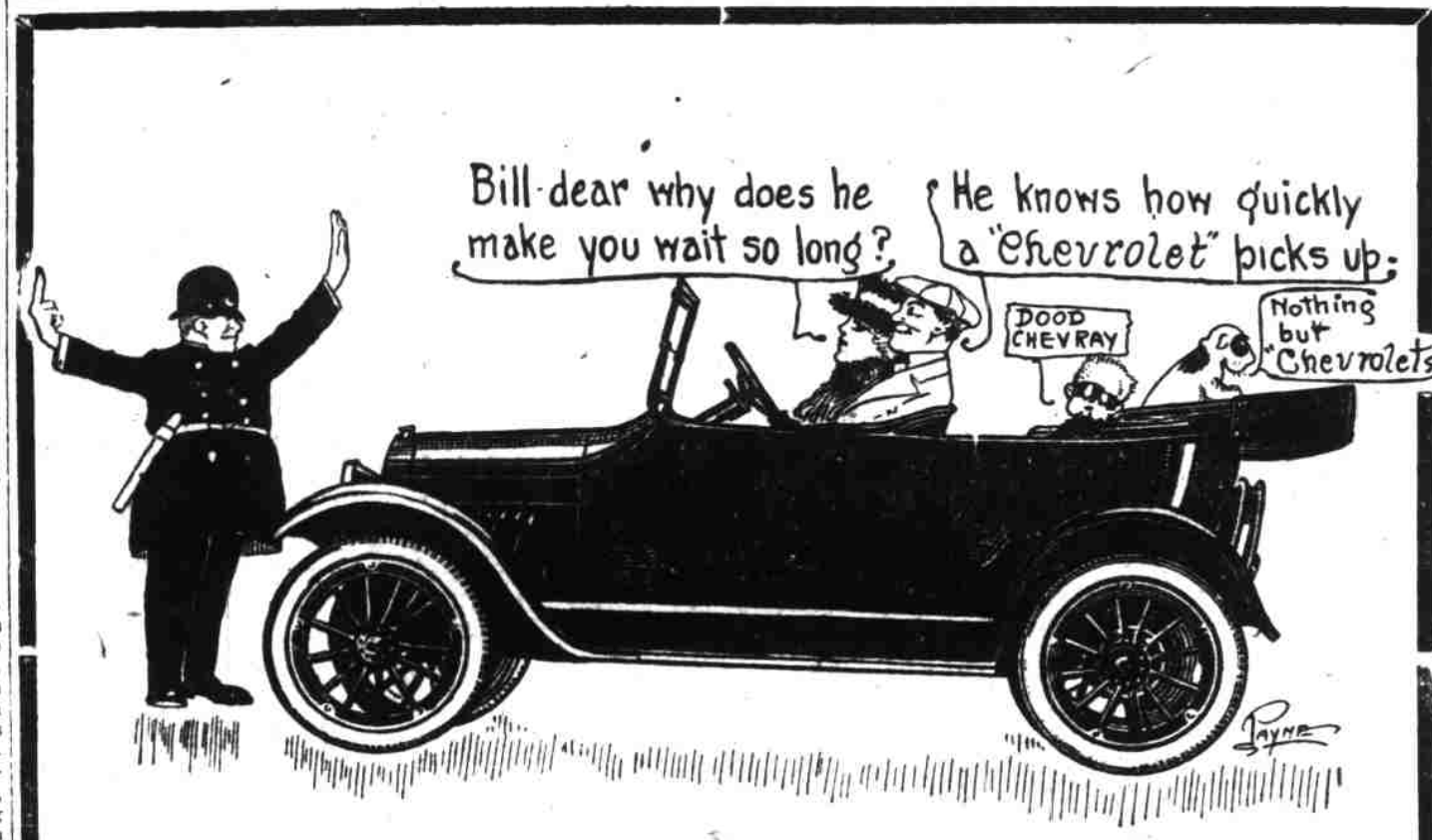
Jail guards said Zagar was the most hardened slayer who ever occupied the death chamber here.
