

WM. J. BRYAN MAY YET JUMP INTO SENATE CAMPAIGN

Washington, Oct. 15.—(I. N. S.)—William Jennings Bryan may yet throw himself into the national campaign. During an interview by telephone today he specifically insisted that it should not be set down in black and white that he would not take part in the presidential campaign between now and November.

"While I'm not discussing presidential candidates," Mr. Bryan went on, "I will say this: The election of 'dry' senators and members of congress is very important.

"Wherever a 'dry' is running against a 'wet' for the senate or the house of representatives, I am for the 'dry,' regardless of party. The election of a 'wet' congress would be such a disaster to the country that I think the 'drys' should take no chances on this subject."

Further than that the former chief of the Democratic hosts would not say. He would not—positively and absolutely not—discuss what he might or might not do between now and the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November.

John Melcher Jury Is Unable to Agree And Is Discharged

After being out nearly 10 hours, no verdict could be reached by the jury in Judge McCourt's court Thursday in the case of the state against John Melcher, charged with a statutory offense against 16-year-old Eva Conley of St. Johns. The jurors were discharged.

Deliberate attempts at blackmail were charged against the father of Eva Conley by Attorneys Lou Wagner and Paul Long in their argument before the jury. They charged he was attempting to extort money from the father of John Melcher and refused to allow the boy and girl to marry after the escape in which they left St. Johns on a Saturday evening in Melcher's automobile and did not return until the following Sunday evening. Young Melcher denied any wrong doing, but admitted he and the girl had spent the night and the following day in his automobile. He said the girl refused to go home because she was having trouble with her father. Conley offered to settle for \$800 and later, it was testified, he was willing to take \$250, which the senior Melcher would not pay.

Jaeger Apartment Owners Sue Car Co. For \$23,387.29 Loss

An outcome of the fire May 13 in the Jaeger apartments, Park Court and Washington street, is a suit filed Thursday by A. P. and Ella Thatcher, owners of the building, and four insurance companies, the New Zealand company, the London and Liverpool and Globe company, the Phoenix company and the Rhode Island company, against the Portland Railway, Light & Power company and the Hartford Fire Insurance

company. The plaintiffs ask for \$23,387.29.

They allege that the Jaeger apartments were being fitted up with electric heaters and ranges and that on the day of the fire an employee of the power company was engaged in cleaning these stoves, using rags saturated with oil, which he left on a newspaper, causing spontaneous combustion.

The companies joined as plaintiffs paid \$20,000 on the fire loss and the Hartford company also its quota, but refused to join in the suit to recover from the company installing the heaters, and it is made a defendant in the suit.

Light Wines, Beer, Recommended by Medical Profession

New York, Oct. 15.—Use of light wines and liquors is recommended by the Perth Amboy, N. J., Medical society in a resolution adopted today. The resolution suggests the modification of the Volstead act so as to permit their use. The explanation given is that "intoxication has become alarmingly more prevalent than before the enactment of the Volstead act."
