

ATTORNEY COSHOW ENTERS RACE FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL

O. P. Coshow of Roseburg has made formal announcement of his candidacy for election as attorney general to fill the vacancy caused by the appointment of George M. Brown to the supreme bench and his consequent resignation as attorney general.

Coshow is widely known throughout the state and has for many years been one of the prominent members of the Oregon bar. He has represented Douglas county in the state legislature and has for a long time taken a prominent part in Oregon politics. His candidacy has been endorsed by the Democratic state central committee and he will make an active campaign to secure sufficient votes written upon the ballot to bring him election.

The entrance of Coshow brings the list of active candidates for the attorney

generalship up to three. J. O. Bailey, who has served for several years as assistant attorney general, is waging an active and energetic campaign for the place. I. H. Van Winkle, who has been deputy attorney general for several years and who now holds the office by the appointment of the governor, is also an avowed and active candidate. There has also been some talk of the candidacy of J. J. Johnson of Portland and of Francis V. Galloway of The Dalles. Galloway, however, is the regularly nominated Democratic candidate for district attorney of Wasco county, and cannot be a candidate for the attorney generalship at this time.

REED PROFESSOR DIDN'T MEAN MEN- GAIN BY SMOKING

Reed college students and faculty were much disturbed during the week over an interpretation of a lecture delivered in psychology class by Professor Gardner C. Basset, in which it was made to appear that the professor upheld the theory that children who smoke are brighter in school work than those who do not.

The professor actually did not sponsor that theory, but cited certain statistics gathered in the slum district of Pittsburgh as example of how figures may be compiled in such a way as to make them show exactly what the compiler wishes them to show. He coupled the example with a warning to distrust indiscriminate statistics.

What the professor actually said in illustrating his point, but what was mis-

understood by some, including The Journal's Reed college correspondent, was:

In the interpretation of statistical data much care needs to be exercised lest our conclusions be contrary to fact or colored by our own prejudices. As an example of such misinterpretation, let me quote some figures obtained by me some years ago with the children residing in the slum districts of Pittsburgh. Two thousand and fourteen boys were questioned with respect to the use of tobacco. It appeared that about 33 per cent of the boys 6 years of age smoked, until at the ages of 12 and 14, 67 per cent were smokers or chewed tobacco, or both. Further, an inquiry with respect to the school progress of these boys shows that the smokers average a grade ahead of non-smokers of the same age. Now, statistically, we might make the mistake of assuming that, in order to make progress in school the growing boy should smoke. However, we know that to be a conclusion contrary to fact. How, then, shall we account for the precocity of the smoker? Being a psychologist and a student of child nature, I have found it to be true that the brighter children seek experiences, and, in the unfavorable environment of the slums, smoking is an ever-present part of the environment. The dull child in such environment lacks the necessary initiative to seek experiences, while the fundamentally bright child, although smoking is harmful, is not lowered to the plane of the fundamentally dull by his bad practice.

Brown, Van Winkle Take Up Duties of New State Posts

Salem, Oct. 15.—George M. Brown was sworn in as a justice of the Oregon supreme court by Chief Justice McBride at 1 o'clock Thursday afternoon, to sit as a member of department number 2, together with Justices Johns and Bean, in the place of Justice A. S. Bennet, resigned.

Brown's qualification for the justice-ship, automatically vacates the office of attorney general, which he has held for the past six years. Governor Olcott, acting upon his previously announced intention, named I. H. Van Winkle, Brown's first assistant, to fill the vacancy.

Van Winkle was sworn in as attorney general at 2 o'clock, Don H. Upjohn, secretary to the governor, administering the oath of office. Van Winkle has stated that there will be no change in the personnel of the office so far as he is concerned, except that he expects to name another assistant to replace J. O. Bailey, who has resigned.

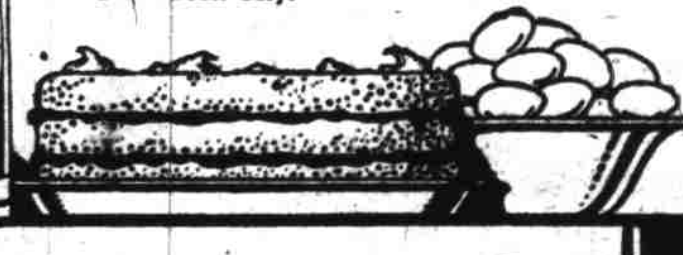
