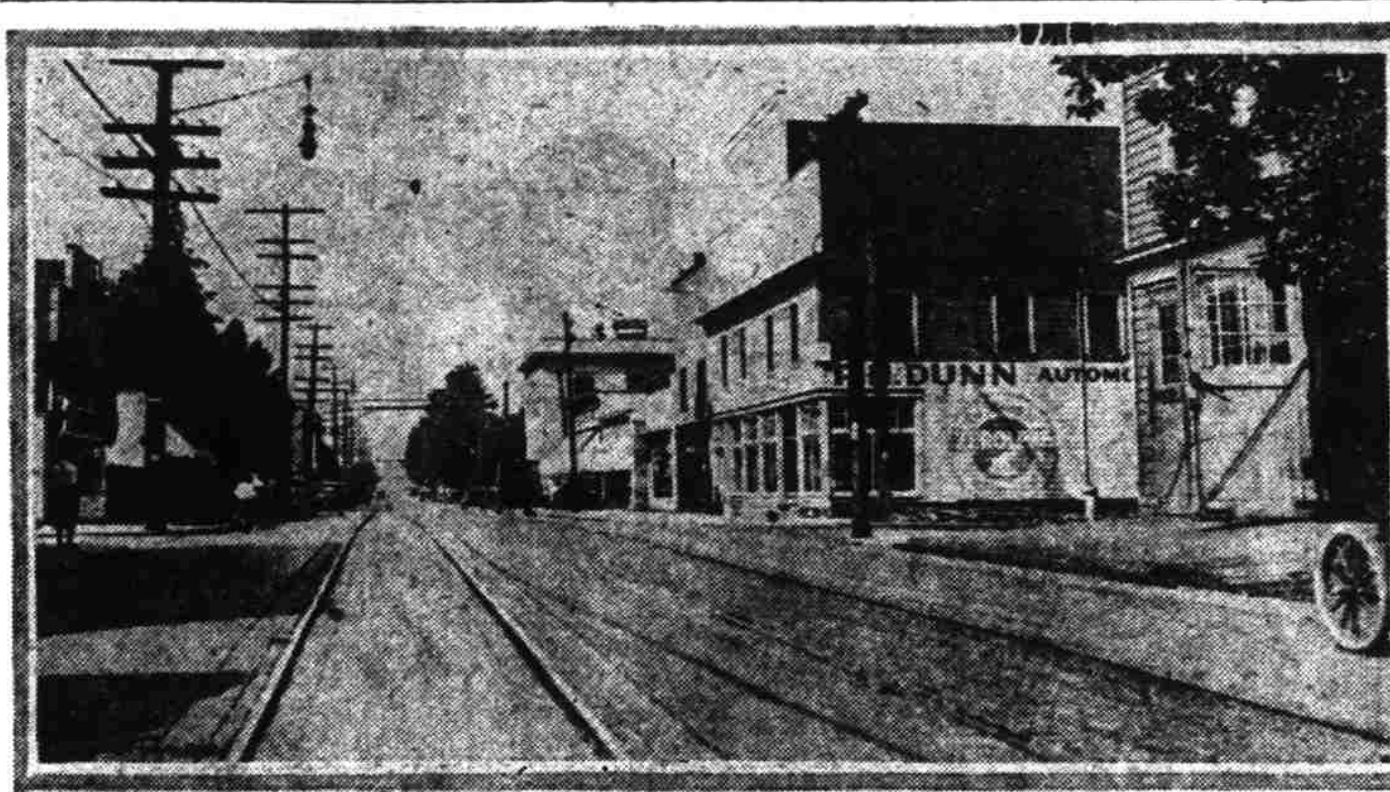

Marion County in Two-Year Period Gains 1500 Voters

Salem, Oct. 16.—Of a total of 18,813 registered voters in Marion county, 13,664 are Republicans, 3570 Democrats, 14 Progressives, 280 Socialists, 421 Prohibitionists, 400 Independents and 114 miscellaneous. Men registered number 11,215, women 7598. The Prohibition party numbers 260 women and 161 men.

The registration shows a gain of approximately 1500 over the figures of two years ago, and approximately 2900 over the 1916 registration.
