

WEATHER UNUSUAL, STATES OBSERVER

Cold Wave Comes Early; Heavy
Rains Delay Farm Work and
Damage Fruit

Winter weather which has been visiting Portland for the past few weeks is unusual for this time of year, according to records in the office of Edward L. Wells, meteorologist.

"The winter conditions prevailing here now originate in the North Pacific ocean," Wells said Saturday night, "and it is therefore impossible for us to predict the weather far in advance."

It is customary for such weather as we had Saturday to come from this region later in the season, but it is quite uncommon to have storms blow in from this section at this time of the year.

The report compiled Saturday night does not promise any relief for today. Occasional rains with a southerly wind is the prediction. Saturday's rainfall was 46 of an inch, making the total so far this month 7.34 inches. This is almost double the normal October rainfall. September's record for 1920 was also high, it being 4.18 inches against a normal precipitation of 1.84. In spite of the heavy downpour for the past two months the year's record is still 3.56 inches behind the average. This is due to the unusually fine weather the first three months of 1920.

The continued rain has injured some crops and is now hindering fall plowing in some sections. A large quantity of hops and prunes have been ruined, and unless the fall of moisture slackens damage to the apple harvest is anticipated, as growers cannot pick their fruit.

A panel of the famous Charter Oak tree which for many generations has been in the family of Herbert L. Parrish, will go to the grave with Parrish. The relic was handed down from father to son, until it reached Herbert, who left instructions that when he died it should be interred with his name and used as a casket plate.

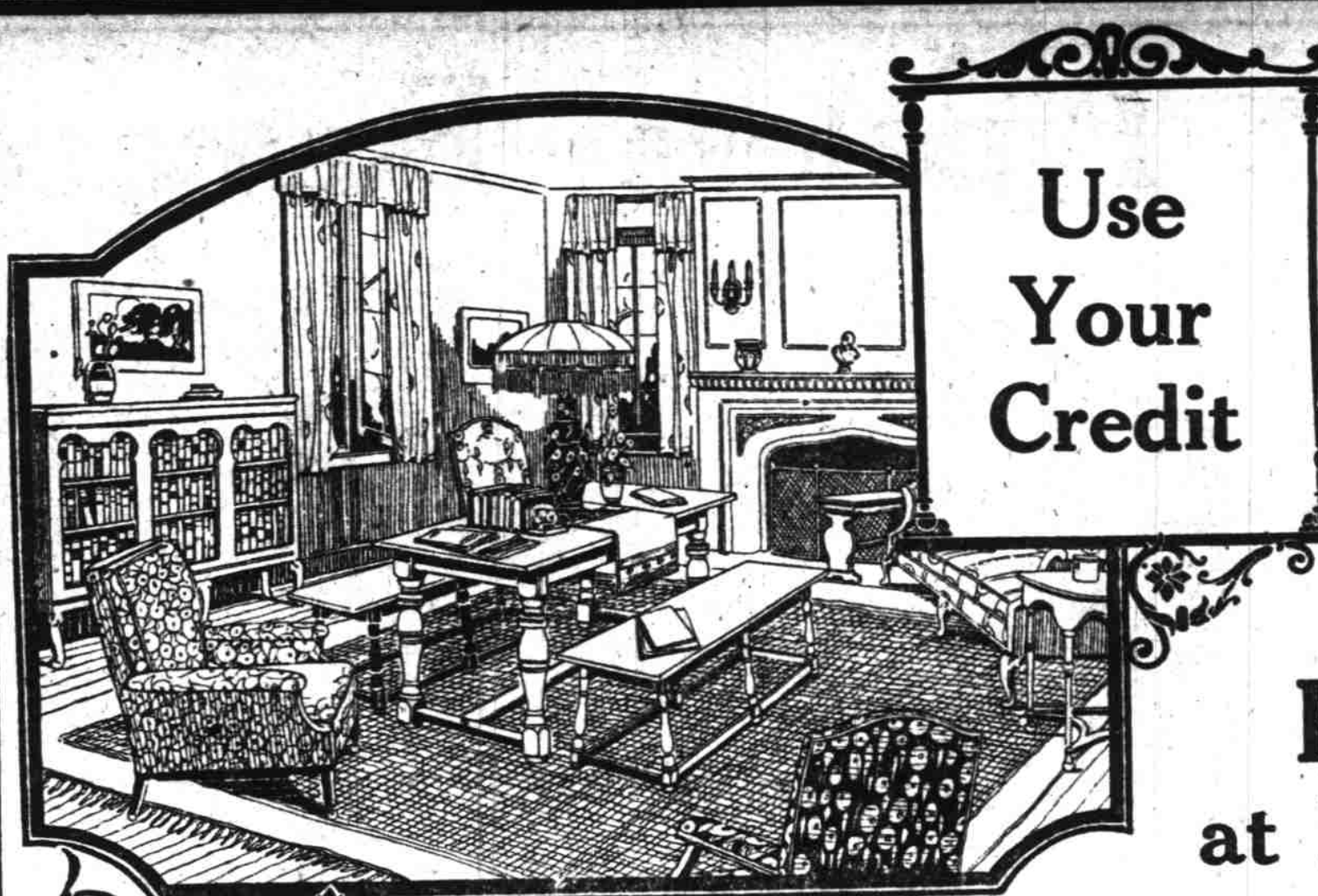

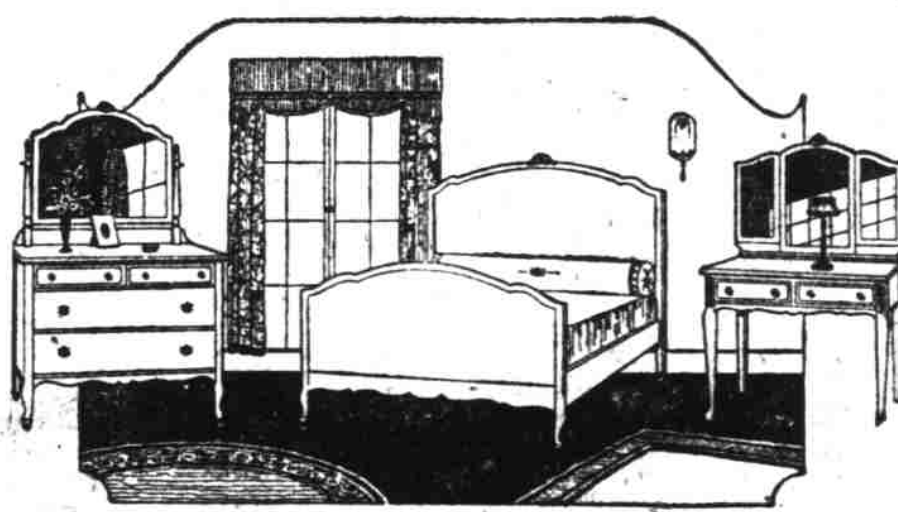

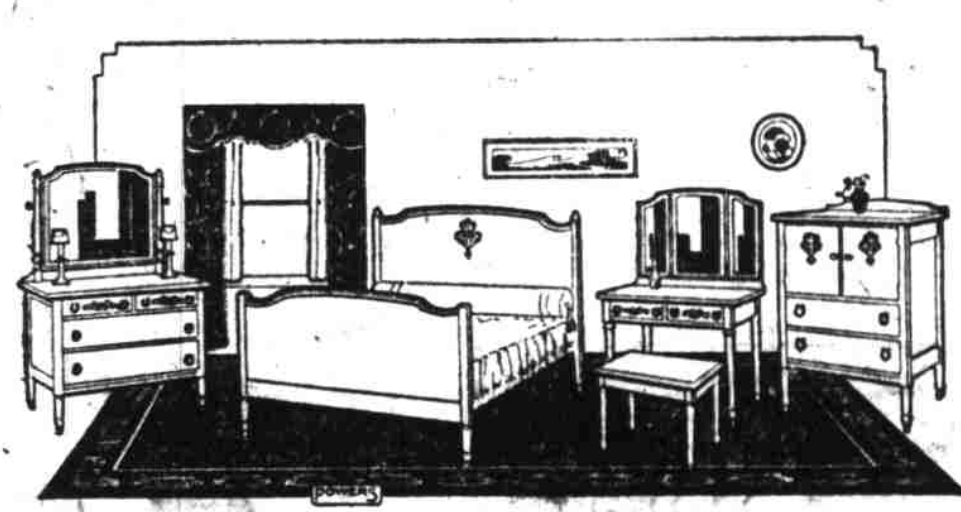
