

CHEMICAL WORKS BEGIN BUILDING ON LINNTON SITE

Quick action marked the development of Portland's new chemical works. It developed today, following the granting of permission by the city council for the establishment of such a manufacturing here.

The Stauffer Chemical company, an international organization, with headquarters at San Francisco, recently sought the opinion of the council on establishment of a sulphur and chemical plant on the Columbia Engineering works site at Linnton. On recommendation of Fire Chief Young, permission was granted.

Since that time a day and night crew have been clearing the old buildings away and today machinery was shipped from San Francisco.

The steamship Claudius, now in harbor, one of the first vessels to bring an exclusive shipment of sulphur to Portland, is unloading part of its 4600-ton cargo for the new company. Six carloads were moving forward and will be the first sulphur ground in the new plant.

While some of the present buildings will be utilized, plans are being made for erection of a modern sulphur-grinding and chemical plant that will be one of the largest on the coast. The ultimate investment will be more than \$1,000,000. It was announced.

REBUILDING OF PORTLAND SANITARIUM TO BE ASKED

A petition signed by 1118 property owners of the Mount Tabor district favoring the rebuilding of the Portland sanitarium at East Sixteenth and Belmont streets was expected to be filed today with the city auditor. The petition is an answer to objection raised against the rebuilding of the institution on the contention that it will create a hospital district rather than a residential district in that neighborhood.

Ralph R. Dunaway, attorney for the association, characterizes the latter belief as a "fallacy," pointing out that the present hospital on the site was built long before the district contained homes. The hospital officials recently announced a plan to rebuild modern institution on their grounds, which occupy two square blocks.

Prohi Agent Likes Local Work Better Than San Francisco

James Flanders, director of prohibition enforcement work in Oregon, has returned from San Francisco for a month to take care of affairs in his own office. Flanders said he likes it better in Portland because things are "not so stormy." Flanders was temporarily appointed assistant to the prohibition director at San Francisco and was there during the recent government investigation. Flanders admitted that some startling disclosures which might involve a few men of prominence are anticipated when the grand jury reports.

S. P. Man Arrested

Ellery C. Smith of the Southern Pacific company was arrested Monday night on charges of driving a machine while intoxicated. Smith's machine is said to have been run over a curb and into a telegraph pole at East Portland and Stark streets. Mrs. Smith and two small children were thrown from the machine, but escaped injury.

A. G. Long's Funeral Set for Wednesday At Family's Home

Funeral services for A. G. Long, prominent business man, will be held Wednesday afternoon at 2 o'clock at the family residence, 147 Sixteenth street, Portland. Long, who has been in Portland since 1891, was a member of the Presbyterian church. He was also a member of the Portland Elks lodge No. 163, Masons, St. Paul, and also a life member of the Scottish Rite and Al Kadar temple, Portland. He was also a member of the Portland Elks.

Long was representative in the Northwest of the American Lumber Company, Apparatus company and as such was well known in civic circles. He left considerable money to charity.

Mrs. Sarah Campbell

Mrs. Sarah J. Campbell, 72, died at the home of her daughter, Mrs. E. U. Will, 1125 Williams avenue, this morning after an illness of more than a year. The funeral will be held Thursday at Corvallis.

Municipal Paving Plant Finishes Job; \$4715.94 Saved City

The municipal paving plant today completed work on its job of paving Killingsworth avenue from Thirtieth to Forty-second streets. According to a check furnished by Commissioner A. L. Barbur, the plant saved the city \$4715.94 on the job. It turned over to the city treasury a profit of \$613.

The lowest bid for the work submitted by any outside contractor was \$20,045.24. The total cost of the job by the municipal plant reached \$15,329.30.

INHERITANCE TAX IN DEMPSEY CASE FIXED BY COURT

On petition of the executors of the estate of William A. Dempsey, Presiding Judge Tazewell today fixed the amount of the inheritance tax due the state.

Dempsey died last December leaving an estate valued at \$95,369.27. The total deductions for indebtedness left \$84,369.69. The exemptions from the inheritance tax amount to \$60,246.46, making taxes due from the estate in the sum of \$1212.39 and \$141.23 due from the bequest to each of the brothers and the sister.

The estate is divided as follows: To Grace Capra Dempsey, the widow, \$28,123.22; to Zolpha Lillian Dempsey, the daughter; \$28,123.22; to Lillian E. Dempsey, sister, and to Harrison E. Dempsey, brother, \$7000.80 each.

WIFE'S RELIGIOUS BENT BLAMED FOR UNHAPPINESS

Harry S. Achenbach filed suit for divorce Monday against Cora Achenbach, declaring that during 1917 his wife espoused the cause of the Disciples of the Apostolic Faith, and thenceforth made his home life miserable. He says she "straightway became an ascetic, frowning upon such amusements as the theatre, moving pictures, baseball games, card parties and the like," and that she would seriously object to his participating in any of these amusements. He says she became so suspicious that she would consult fortune tellers to try to learn of his actions when away from her, and that she "made home a place of torture, where all was dull, dreary and gloomy, without cheer and without hope."

MRS. HARVEY'S DAUGHTERS FILE CONTEST ON HER WILL

Emma Thiesen, daughter of the late Mrs. Frances M. Harvey, who died in Portland, January 27 of this year, filed contest Monday against the will of her mother which disposes of an estate valued at approximately \$28,000. The contestant, whose home is in Hubbard, Marion county, states that she and Edna Thiesen, her sister, are the daughters of the deceased and the heirs. She avers that Mrs. Harvey was 76 years of age and that for a long time before her death her memory was substantially gone and she was in no proper mental condition to dispose of her property. The contestant asks that the action of the court on February 2, admitting the will to probate, be set aside and that the property be adjudged as the lawful inheritance of the daughters.

Mrs. Harvey had made numerous bequests, and the devices are ordered to appear before Judge Tazewell November 1, when the contest will be heard.

LONG WILL ADMITTED TO PROBATE, TOTAL NOT GIVEN

Presiding Judge Tazewell admitted to probate Monday the will of Alexander Gotwald Long, who died the day previously. The young man was originally sentenced for forgery, but was released on parole. He was paroled on recommendation of the grand jury.

LIQUOR INVESTIGATION STIRS SAN FRANCISCO, SAYS LUSK

Chief Assistant United States Attorney Hall S. Lusk has returned from San Francisco, where he argued the Oregon Lumber company case before the circuit court of appeals. Lusk said the liquor investigation is "the big thing" at the Bay city now. The outcome of the grand jury investigation is anxiously awaited by a large number of people, especially those who have had a bottle or two in their possession recently.

MRS. ETTIE PORTER JONES' ESTATE VALUED AT \$15,500

The will of Mrs. Ettie Porter Jones, who died in Portland October 14 at the age of 63, was filed for probate Monday. The will, which was dated July 11, 1915, names Clarence James Young and Hazel Morton Young, son and daughter, as executor and executrix, and the estate is to be divided equally between them. The estate consists of personal property of the approximate value of \$5500 and real estate valued at \$10,000.

Hazelwood Case Postponed

Trial of the Hazelwood Butter company case in the federal court, originally set for Wednesday, has been postponed until November 26. In the complaint, the company charges the Hazelwood company with manufacturing adulterated butter.

Mayor Baker Gets Medal for Aiding Belgian Children

Mayor Baker was today presented with Belgium's Special Medal of Recognition in recognition of his work in aiding Belgian children.

The medal was conferred through Her Royal Highness Henriette, Duchess de Vendome, "for all that you have done and did do to aid and preserve the commission of Mrs. Adolph B. Spreckels who assisted Her Royal Highness in her gentle work of mercy for the suffering little children, the refugees and the wounded."

While the honor is conferred by the Duchess de Vendome, it is transmitted through Lady Morel de Veinence, lady in waiting to Mrs. Spreckels' commission referred to was the work carried out through funds raised in the "milk bottle" campaign.

The letter, in part, follows: "Mrs. Adolph B. Spreckels is here in Paris and she has told us of the efficient aid rendered by you for this work and I am charged to specially thank you and to tell you that this commission has served to keep alive many thousands of little children and that without this aid many thousands would have perished."

Vampish Attire in Lure to Mashers, Says Police Chief

Short skirts, plus lace stockings, plus drugstore complexion equal—a vamp. This problem of moral mathematics was worked out by Police Chief Jenkins in discussing the cause and effect of the flitting nuisance.

The chief maintained that if there were no vampires there would be no mashers, and that every woman who dresses immodestly comes within the category of a vamp, regardless of how high her morals may be.

"So long as women continue to appear on Washington street in costumes which, to say the least, should be reserved for the boudoir, they will be regarded by men as walking invitations to start flirtations," Jenkins said.

"I do not believe that a modestly dressed woman has anything to fear anywhere. I never have been able to figure out why women and girls dress—or rather, undress—and paint themselves the way they do. Assuredly, most of them are entirely innocent of any wrong motive. But as long as they have the outward appearance of welcoming flirtations, they will more than likely be accommodated."

Bell Boy Is Fined And Jailed for Sale Of Liquor to Indian

John George Brest, former bellboy at the Hotel Oregon, was fined \$100 and sentenced to 60 days in jail this morning by Federal Judge Wolverson, after he had pleaded guilty to selling moonshine whiskey to two Indians who were in Portland last week from the Klamath reservation to testify before the grand jury. Brest's wife and small baby were in the courtroom when he was sentenced.

Federal officials say an additional state charge may be filed against Brest, as he is alleged to have sent a woman to the room of the Indians, after they became intoxicated. The unidentified woman is said to have robbed the Indians of \$40.

Cox-Roosevelt Club To Be Reorganized

Bend, Oct. 19.—Reorganization of the Cox-Roosevelt club in this city will be accomplished at a meeting of Democrats Wednesday evening, according to E. J. Catlow, chairman, who expects that a campaign speaker will arrive Saturday and that a regular Cox-Roosevelt rally will be held.

Pile Driving and Track Completed on East End of Bridge

Pile driving and streetcar track laying have been completed on the east approach of the Morrison street bridge, so cars are now running across to the west approach. Passengers are transferred around the west approach. The walking distance is about one third as far as it was while the east end was obstructed. The huge pile driver has been moved across the river and workmen are putting it together. While the east side piling is being placed, additional workmen on the east side are laying the roadway. As soon as the west approach is finished so streetcars can be routed across the bridge, the structure will be thrown open to all traffic. It will be probably another two weeks before the west approach is finished.

J. A. Drake, Pioneer Of Umatilla County, Dies at Pendleton

Pendleton, Oct. 19.—James Adelbert Drake, aged 76, Umatilla county pioneer and veteran of the Civil war, died Sunday evening after falling several months of poor health. He came West in 1876 and settled in this county, when Pendleton was village of 50 inhabitants. During the Indian war of 1878 he moved his family into the Byers mill and took an active part in the fight with the Indians. At the age of 17 he enlisted in Company B, First regiment, United States sharpshooters. He was wounded while in action May 27, 1862, carrying a bullet in his right hip for the remainder of his life. He marched with Sherman to the sea and served as a messenger and in the military railroad service during the latter part of the war and until its close.

Fall Enrollment at U. of O. Reaches 1669

University of Oregon, Eugene, Oct. 19.—Fall enrollment figures given out today by Carlton Spencer, registrar, place the total enrollment at 1669. Of these, 393 are men and 776 are women. The senior class has 216 members, junior 314, sophomore 458, freshmen 523. Special students number 112. Seventeen students are taking law only and 29 graduate students are signed up. Registration will continue through the term and will probably reach 1700, according to Spencer.

Santee Resigns From Board

J. R. Santee has resigned as cashier of the Portland school board to join the Edelsen Fuel company. Miss Anna Kucera, hitherto secretary to Clerk R. H. Thomas, has been promoted to cashier and Mrs. Phila Sheedy has been appointed secretary.

SUPREME COURT REVERSES ITSELF IN HOCHFELD CASE

Salem, Oct. 19.—That the supreme court of the land is always open to conviction and does not hesitate to reverse itself on occasions is shown in an opinion Tuesday in which Justice Bean, acting on a petition for a rehearing in the case of S. and Rebecca Hochfeld vs. the City of Portland, reverses a former opinion written by himself and affirms the judgment of the Multnomah county circuit court in which Judge Robert Tucker had dismissed a writ of review obtained by the Hochfelds in an effort to have annulled certain city assessments on property in Portland.

The former opinion, it is set out, was based on briefs submitted referring to the cases of Brown vs. Portland and Cook vs. Portland, both of which cases had been decided upon the question of the statute of limitations. In the petition for a rehearing in the Hochfeld case, Justice Bean points out, the attention of the court is directed for the first time to the fact that the statute of limitations had not run in his case, which necessitates reversal of the former opinion.

Other opinions handed down were: Clara Hamilton vs. Baggage & Omnibus Transfer company, appellant, vs. George S. Smith; appeal from Multnomah county; action to collect an assessment under provisions of fire insurance policy. Opinion by Justice Harris. Judge C. U. Gantenbein affirmed.

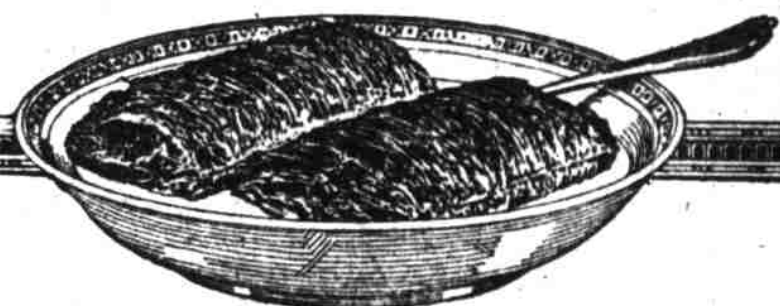

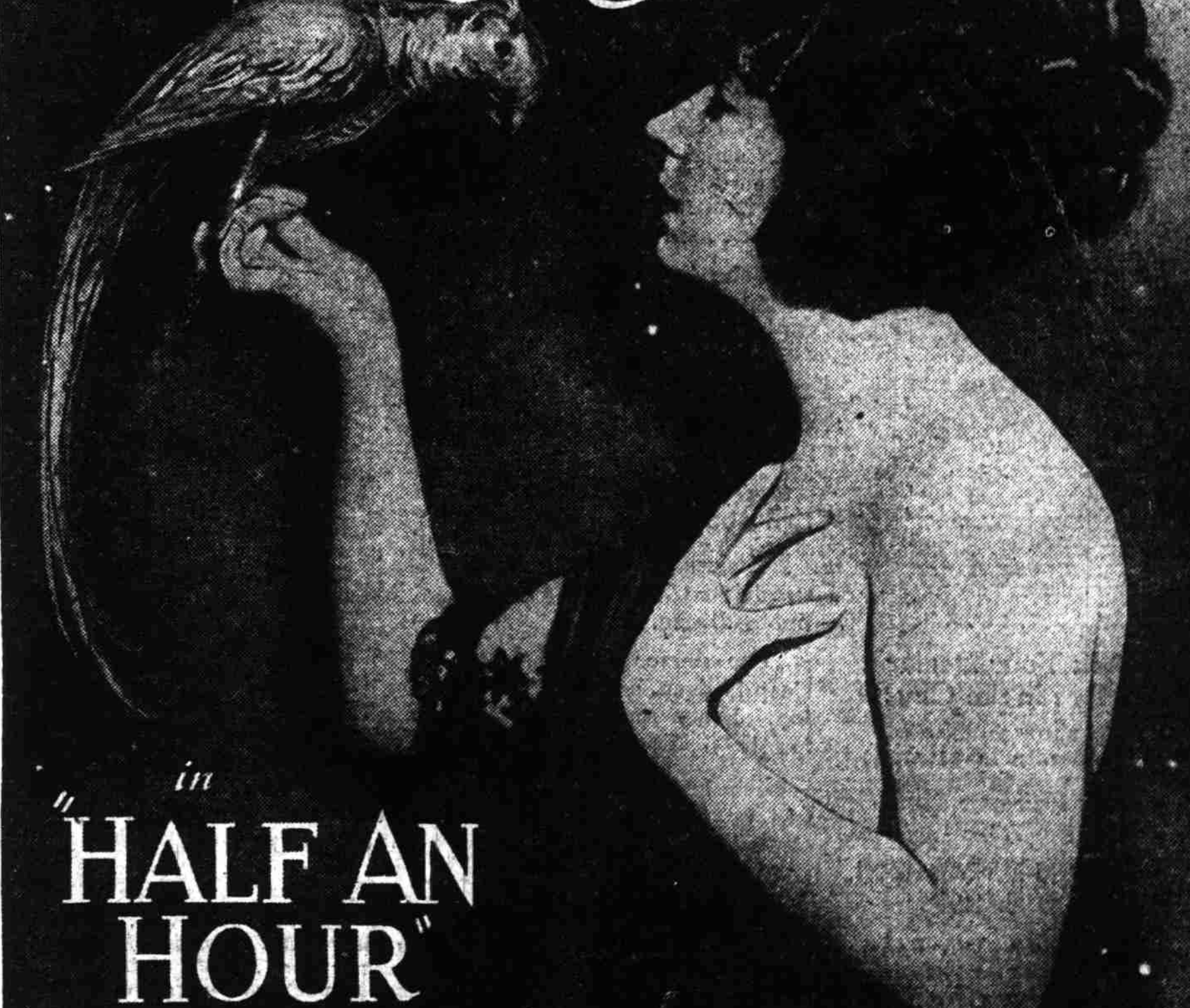

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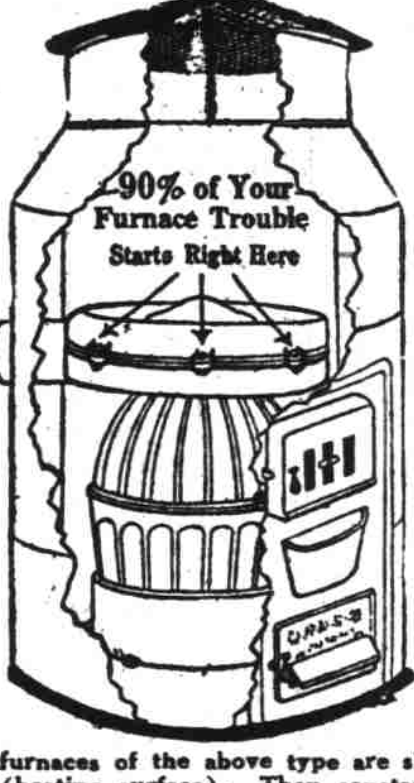
