

WARREN ORDERED TO PAY \$70,000; LAND ATTACHED

Federal Judge Charles Wolverton this morning ordered George W. Warren of Warrenton to pay \$70,000 due on notes to the Crocker National bank of San Francisco, together with interest which is said to total \$1283. To satisfy these claims the court ordered Warren's property sold.

Warren borrowed \$50,000 and \$20,000 from the bank on property at Warrenton. Recently the United States marshal served attachment proceedings on the county clerks in Lane, Crook, Marion and Clatsop counties covering Warren's holdings. His interests in Portland and Astoria business and banking houses were also garnished, as the marshal was ordered to attach enough property to satisfy the payment of \$70,000.

Nearly all the property attached lies within the city of Warrenton. In today's hearing Justin M. Masten, assistant cashier of the Crocker National bank, was the only person to testify. He stated that his bank owned the notes held against Warren.

ELECTION JUDGES ARE HARD TO FIND, SAYS BEVERIDGE

County Clerk Beveridge today submitted to the county commissioners the lists of boards of judges and clerks for the forthcoming general election, and stated that owing to the inadequate amount of compensation allowed it has been very difficult and discouraging undertaking to make up the full lists.

"I would suggest," says Beveridge, "that some steps be taken with the legislators to the end that the laws be changed and an increase in compensation be granted said members of boards of election. Or, better still, a reasonable amount be set aside each year for the purchase of voting machines. Otherwise next year you will find it a very much more difficult task to secure the requisite number of voters to serve on the election boards."

FOUR SECRET INDICTMENTS RETURNED BY GRAND JURY

Four secret indictments were returned by the Multnomah county grand jury Wednesday morning, and a not true bill was found in the case of Dan Lenon, accused of mayhem by the cutting and amputing of the ear of Peter Sarandopoulos September 15. There were also true bills presented against N. R. Long, charging him with engaging in the real estate brokerage business without a license; Martina Gilbert, charged with larceny, in the stealing of dress October 6, the property of Josephine Teague.

REED GETS DAMAGES; WYNN LOSES SUIT

Elmer L. Reed, who sued the National Hospital association for non-performance of contract, was given verdict for \$711 by a jury in Circuit Judge Gatens' court Tuesday. A verdict for the defendant was given by a jury in the court of Circuit Judge Morrow in the personal injury suit of E. Wynn against the Portland Railway, Light and Power company.

Perry Smith on Trial

The trial of Perry Smith, charged with having committed a statutory offense against a 11-year-old girl in the Kenton district September 10, was begun Tuesday afternoon before a jury and Circuit Judge Wilson of The Dailies, sitting in Portland.

Cahalin Estate \$40,000

The will of Mrs. Annie C. Cahalin, who died in Portland July 26, was filed for probate Tuesday. She left an estate valued at \$40,000. The heirs are Edward H. Joseph, J. Catherine E. and John F. Cahalin, her children, and the first two are named as the executors. Mrs. Cahalin was 77 years old at the time of her death.

Miller Sues Lumber Company

John A. Miller wants \$1250 for the loss of the middle finger of his right hand and for loss of time while laid up with this injury. He filed suit Tuesday against the Bede Lumber company.

Her daughter, Fay, relayed the attorney's questions and the mother's testimony, as Mrs. Welch is a mute. Welch alleges that his wife has a violent temper. Custody of three children and a demand for \$100 alimony a month are at issue.

Provide Wife With Home, If You Would Keep Her, Is Advice

The man who invades the sanctity of another's domestic circle and the man who neglects giving his wife a home of her own with attractive surroundings, each came in for a reprimand in municipal judge Roseman's court this morning. The "intruder," Jack Devereaux, was fined \$50 for trespass and sentenced to 10 days in jail. The husband was told to "wise up" on marital obligations.

Devereaux was arrested Tuesday night with Mrs. Margaret Silver at 328 Main street, where Mrs. Silver is living with her husband. Silver has been working nights, he told Judge Roseman, and during his absence Devereaux has been paying attention to Mrs. Silver.

"If you want to keep your wife, get her a home of her own, a yard with a fence around it, where she can grow flowers and can enjoy herself without accepting the attentions of other men," Roseman advised Silver. "Do not expect to take your wife into a furnished room, where she will come into contact with such people as this fellow."

Because of Devereaux's parents, Silver asked Judge Roseman not to be stringent in his judgment, but the judge replied: "I don't feel the same way about such a man."

Mrs. Silver was released on the promise of her husband that he would try harder to make a better home for her.

Seattle Bank Sues Local Airplane Co. For Cost of Plane

Suit to recover \$10,200 was filed in the federal court this morning by attorneys for the United States bank of Seattle against the Oregon, Washington & Idaho Airplane company. On July 1, Julius M. Meier, president of the local airplane company, it is alleged, guaranteed that J. C. Sullivan, or his successor, the Western Airplane company of Seattle, would return the money to the bank within 60 days. The money is said to have been paid to the O. W. I. company, "The Oregon, Washington & Idaho Airplane company is said to have shipped a Curtiss seagull plane to Sullivan at Seattle when the bank agreed to furnish the money. As Sullivan has not paid the money in keeping with the guarantee, the Seattle bank has brought suit to collect the principal and interest.

Bridges Threatens To Jail Those Who Would Curb Speech

Olympia, Wash., Oct. 20.—Before an audience of 2000 persons, which had been transported six miles out of town to St. Martins college, Robert Bridges, nominee of the third party for governor, announced that after next January, "when I shall be governor," as he stated, he would put behind the bars at the penitentiary any man who interferes with the free exercise of the constitutional rights of free speech, free press and peaceable assembly.

"It is a peculiar situation when an audience has to be brought to a speaker who is a candidate for governor of Washington, instead of the speaker coming to the audience," he said.

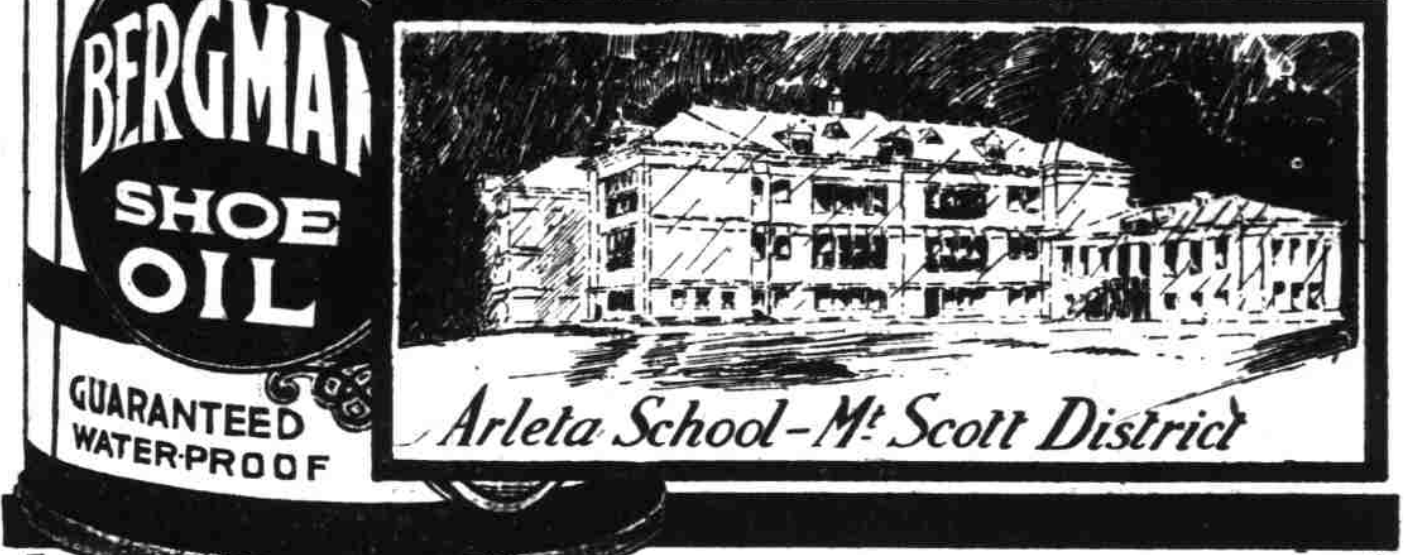
