

FOUR MORE PUT IN HOSPITALS BY AUTO ACCIDENTS

Industrial and traffic accidents put four more people in the hospitals Tuesday afternoon. Clifford McQueen, 20, of 373 East Clay street, an employee of the Northwest Bridge & Iron company, was the most seriously injured. A drill press fell on him at the plant and crushed his head and shoulders. He is reported to be in a serious condition at Good Samaritan hospital. McQueen is married.

Jack Habner, 28, residing at the Jackson apartments, was slightly injured at the same plant when his clothes became entangled in a reamer. His injuries are not considered serious by Good Samaritan hospital attendants.

Six-year-old Victor Lindberg, 821 Rodney avenue, was knocked down by an automobile at Williams avenue and Milling street and slightly injured. He was taken to Emanuel hospital.

Police say they have received no report from the driver of an automobile that knocked down J. Ono, a Japanese, at East Eleventh and Grant streets Tuesday evening and severely injured him. Ono is at St. Vincent's hospital suffering from internal injuries and cuts about the head. The police learned that Ono works at the Inman-Poulsen mill, but did not learn his house address.

A Japanese laborer by the name of Ono was struck by an automobile driven by Joe Reithel, 908 East Sixteenth street, at East Eleventh and Grant streets, at 8:30 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. He was injured internally and received a cut on his head. He was taken to St. Vincent's hospital.

Reithel said that he was driving about 15 miles an hour. He stated that he saw Ono, but had no idea that he intended to step off the curb. Ono was carrying two sticks of wood, which he is believed to have brought from the Inman-Poulsen mill, where it is believed he worked.

He stepped off the curb into the side of the car and was knocked down, according to Reithel's report.

Ono was unconscious when he was taken to the hospital. The seriousness of his injuries has not been ascertained.

Reithel was not arrested, but Patrolman Mobley of the traffic bureau is making an investigation of the case.

Lark Evans Given New Trial; Opinion On Technicalities

Salem, Oct. 20.—Lark Evans, convicted of assault and robbery on W. G. White by the circuit court of Jackson county and sentenced to a term in the state prison, is granted a new trial by the supreme court in an opinion written by Justice Burnett and handed down Tuesday. The reversal of the decree of Judge Calkins of the lower court is based purely on technicalities.

"Unquestionably, there was sufficient evidence to justify the verdict, for the prosecuting witness was very positive in his identification of the defendant as the man who robbed him," the opinion reads.

"Sundry assignments of error are presented by the abstract, but the one principally relied upon is that of the court in refusing to grant a new trial on the ground of newly discovered evidence."

Miss Gavin to Talk Before Democrats

The Dalles, Oct. 20.—Wasco county Democrats will have their first big rally of the campaign next Saturday night when Judge William Smith of Baker is to give an address on the national issues. There will also be a number of local speakers. A number of meetings are to be held in Wasco county during the week following, in the course of which Miss Celia L. Gavin, city attorney, will make her debut as a political orator. Miss Gavin declares she will confine her political remarks only to consideration of the League of Nations issues.

Portland Broker Pleads Not Guilty

Tillamook, Oct. 20.—Thad Robinson, formerly cashier of the Tillamook County bank, and now a bond broker of Portland, pleaded not guilty to obtaining money under false pretences. Upon the application of Robinson's attorney the bail which had been fixed at \$10,000 was reduced to \$6000 and a bond for that amount was furnished. The trial has been set for February 9. It is alleged that a mortgage on which he secured \$5000 from Godfred Maroff does not exist.

Robber Holds Up Bank; Gets \$200

Spokane, Wash., Oct. 20.—After ordering Cashier E. R. Anderson and a bookkeeper into the vault, a lone gunman Tuesday afternoon robbed the Union Park bank here of \$200 in cash and escaped. Covering the three employees of the bank with an automatic pistol the robber forced them into the vault while he took the money on the counter. He was evidently frightened away before he had completed his work, as he overlooked several thousand dollars in bills of large denominations.

Struble's Charges Of Bad Faith Denied By State Fire Head

Salem, Oct. 20.—Charges by Mayor Struble of Klamath Falls that the investigation by Deputy Fire Marshal Pomeroy and Allen into the responsibility for the recent Houston hotel fire was an "unfair and biased meddling in local politics," are emphatically denied by A. C. Barber, state fire marshal, in a reply to Struble.

The investigation of the Houston hotel fire was conducted in the same manner as are all similar investigations, Barber declares.

"There are still serious menaces to life and property existing in your city which could be remedied by proper fire prevention methods and the elimination of such hazards," Barber points out.

In a letter to Governor Olcott, following publication of the report by Deputy Pomeroy and Allen on the Houston hotel fire, Mayor Struble insisted on an investigation by the executive office of the fire marshal's conduct of the investigation to determine the motives which moved the deputies in making "such an unfair report."

"The hearing was strictly secret and behind closed doors," Struble stated. Struble said that about the same time that the report was given, Wilson S. Wiley, deputy district attorney, who had assisted in the investigation, announced himself as a candidate for mayor of Klamath Falls in opposition to Struble.

McNary Inspects Benham Falls Site; Will Make Report

Bend, Oct. 20.—Senator Charles L. McNary spoke at a Harding rally here Tuesday evening. He is the first speaker on national campaign issues to come to Bend this year.

The senator's interest during the day was centered chiefly on the Benham Falls irrigation project and, in company with Clyde M. McKay, he drove to the proposed reservoir site south of Bend.

"I promised United States Reclamation Director Davis that I would make a personal inspection of the reservoir site," he said, "and I shall report to the senate on my findings when I return to Washington."

One Million Gallons Of Fuel Oil Used Yearly for Logging

One million gallons of fuel oil are used annually in logging, locomotives and donkey engines in the logging industry of Oregon and Washington, the canvass conducted by the forest service in cooperation with the various lumber associations shows.

Fuel oil aids forest conservation, says foresters, in keeping down fires. The lumbermen are experiencing difficulty in getting oil. In 1919, 844,864 barrels were used, while the estimated amount during six months of 1920 amounted to 692,312 barrels. Ninety per cent of this amount was used in the Douglas fir belt west of the Cascades.

Lula May Tegard, Pioneer of County, Dies at Fairview

Mrs. Lula May Tegard, pioneer resident of Eastern Multnomah county, died at her home in Fairview Tuesday morning. Mrs. Tegard was 54 years of age and came to Oregon 53 years ago. She resided in Fairview for 40 years.

Mrs. Tegard's health failed for two years, and for six months she was quite ill. She was born in New York and came to Oregon by way of the Isthmus of

Panama when three years old. Her father was Loren Dyer. Funeral services will be Thursday at 2 o'clock in the chapel of the East Side funeral directors, the Rev. Ward W. MacHenry officiating. Interment will be at the Columbia Masonic cemetery. William Tegard, her husband, and Mrs. Berger Tonseth and William E. Tegard, children, survive.
