

IRVINE AND MULKEY DEBATE LEAGUE AT PRESS LUNCHEON

The cost of the war with Germany to the people of Oregon will amount to over \$39,000,000, or more than \$50 per capita, for the population of the state for the year 1920, according to statistics quoted by B. F. Irvine in debate on the League of Nations at a meeting of the Portland Press club at noon today. Irvine spoke in favor of the league and was opposed by B. F. Mulkey. "The leaders of the opposition to the League of Nations are followers of Prussian philosophy, which taught that war is necessary and desirable and that the idea of universal peace is a nebulous dream," said Irvine, "while the opposite school of thought, composed of the leading constructive minds of the age, endorse the league as a preventive of war."

B. A. GREEN SPEAKS FOR DR. LOVEJOY

"Congressman McArthur's record is so bad that even a mere statement of it by the Oregon Popular Government league caused him to say it was 'libelous,'" said B. A. Green, secretary of the league, addressing a community meeting of voters at Linnton Wednesday night, in the interests of Dr. Eather Paul Lovejoy. "McArthur himself says a card sent to 40,000 union members in Portland and vicinity is libelous," said Green. "Now, friends, that card against which he rails and which has made him so angry of late, was simply telling the story of his own record as a congressman. It is pretty bad, I admit, when one's record is so bad that the mere statement of it is called by himself 'libelous.'"

Hays and White in Debate How Issue Appears to Them

Below are two articles on what two disagreeing writers believe to be the main issue or issues of the presidential campaign. One is by George White, chairman of the Democratic national committee, and the other was written for Will Hays, chairman of the Republican national committee.

Chairman of the Democratic National Committee. (Written Expressly for the International News Service.)
Chicago, Oct. 21.—If I may be permitted to speak personally I feel that I am as good an American as any boy. As a father of boys, I am quite interested in saving them from future warfare as any father can be. And so, when I heard of the view that the attack made on Article X of the covenant of the League of Nations is built on misapprehension or fraud, I speak as one having responsibility.

When the covenant was first published the line of attack was made on the cry of "Shantung." The peace conference had permitted the Japanese to continue to hold for a while, on definite promise of renunciation of the territory of the Republic of Kaio Chow, which the Japanese had taken from the Germans during the war. China had not enjoyed possession of these territories for years. The facts soon developed that the Japanese argument against the treaty and so the line of attack was reformed on Article X which had been in print for months before it was held up by the president before it was made the subject of a unanimous council vote.

Article X only provides for advice from a unanimous council before the president is to apply the economic boycott against an outlaw. I, for one, have no fear of any such action representative on the council responsive to the president and to congress will join in any advice by the council without first receiving instructions from congress. And the Cox reservations remove any possibility of such action.

vation to Article X, mentioning specifically the Hitchcock reservation which declares the United States agrees that the league council can only advise and not order the employment of our troops and that at all times the right to declare a war must be retained in congress alone.

IN CASE OF DISPUTE
In case of a serious dispute between two nations, Cox said, the council of the league would endeavor to have the dispute presented to the permanent court of international justice, the parties to the dispute agreeing to abide by its decision. If the matter were urgent they would attempt to settle the question by conciliation, the council acting as mediator. Failing this, all members of the council except the disputants would attempt to reach a unanimous agreement as to the course of action to be recommended. A recommendation would be possible, however, without unanimous vote.

LEFT TO CONGRESS
In case of such a crisis as that of 1914, he said, the council would sit in special conference, and if the council were unanimously agreed that drastic action was necessary, it would be empowered to make such a recommendation. The facts and recommendations would then be cabled to the president of the United States, who would lay them before congress. Congress, he said, would thereupon determine the course of action, "just as it does now."
