Sinnott Says Bird Bill Would Give County to Bureau

Burns, Oct. 22.—Congressman Nick J. Sinnott spent the day in Burns Wednesday and addressed a political meeting Wednesday evening. He was emphatic in his objection to the bird refuge measure now on the ballot, saying in part: "The bird refuge bill is all wrong and was conceived and is supported by dreamers of the Finley type. Unless you wish the affairs of this county largely handled by a \$100 clerk in one of the departments, you should kill the measure for all time. I am speaking from the experience I have had with the bird refuge in Klamath county and with a 1,000,000-acre refuge the same class of people are trying to create for the sage hen and antelope in Lake county and in Northern Nevada."

Police Find Fuse; Plot to Set Fire To Warehouse Seen

Police action probably saved the city a bad river front fire Thursday night. Patrolmen Ripley and Travis, while making the rounds of their beat early Thursday night, discovered a piece of fuse sticking from a hole in the wall of a stairway in a building at 128 1/2 Front street. In investigating they discovered that the fuse was connected with a wad of paper filled with white smokeless powder. On top of the paper was a little pile of dry kieselguhr.

That someone had intended to return and light the fuse with the idea of burning the building is the opinion of the police. The building is used as a grain and feed store house, operated by Bellam & Co.

Students Prepare For Agricultural Fair on Saturday

Oregon Agricultural College, Corvallis, Oct. 22.—Wallace E. Niles, senior in agriculture from Grants Pass, is manager of the college agricultural fair, scheduled at the college armory Saturday, and with him on the committee are Frank Brown, Walla Walla, Wash.; Robert Warren, Portland; Leo Spitzbart, Salem, and Harry Weilman, Umpqua, all seniors in agriculture.

A silver loving cup, presented by Dean A. B. Cordley of the school of agriculture, will be awarded to the department having the best exhibits. The cup is held by the animal husbandry department, which won it last year.

O. M. Plummer, manager of the Pacific International Livestock exposition; A. H. Lea, secretary, and W. H. Savage, president of the state fair board, will be official judges of displays. Student judging will be featured, for which prizes of \$10 and \$5 have been offered. Professor O. M. Nelson and Professor C. V. Rusek are acting as faculty advisors.

H. A. Lindgren, assistant editor of the Western Farm Livestock, Denver, has reported for duty as animal husbandman at the college experiment station. He was graduated from the college in 1911.

Address Deals With Conditions in Russia On the Jewish Race

Conditions in Russia as they affect the Jewish people will be the subject of a lecture by Rabbi Joseph Goldman next Sunday night at the Multnomah hotel. He will speak on the inner life of Russia and Bolshevism, dwelling on the persecution of the Jewish race.

"I am the last of 75 generations," he said today. "My mother and father fell victims to the mob and six years ago my wife and six children were brutally murdered."

"With his only remaining son, Goldman escaped to Siberia from his home in Kishinoff, Bessarabia, and thence made his way to the United States. In Seattle the son joined the American army, being attached to the Ninety-first division. He was killed in France at the battle of Belleau Wood by a German shell a few days before the armistice was signed."

"My heart is bitter against those who robbed me of my loved ones in Russia, but I have no regret for the loss of that boy who gave up his life for America. A man cannot die for America."

There are no Jews among the Bolsheviks, according to Rabbi Goldman. "Some may be serving in the ranks, but it is because they have been impressed. Their hearts are not in the movement. He adds. Goldman will also speak of the Zionist movement. He professes himself to be a firm believer in the old prophecy that the Jews are to return to Jerusalem and become once more a nation."

Gile Going to Scotland
Salem, Oct. 22.—H. S. Gile, president of the Salem Rotary club, has been named to represent the club as delegate to the international convention of the organization in Edinburgh, Scotland, next year. Gile has announced his intention of attending the convention, accompanied by Mrs. Gile.

ASTORIA BOY DIES; CRUELTY CHARGED

Astoria, Oct. 22.—According to a cablegram received here Thursday, Christian Andreas Johnsen, the 22-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Jens Johnsen of this city, died in an asylum in Callao, Peru, September 21.

The case of Christian Johnsen has attracted a great amount of attention. On January 17, last year, he was forcibly removed from the steamship Centaurus at Callao while seriously ill and demented and was abandoned on a wharf at the South American port by Captain Jorgensen and First Officer Wiley of that craft. It is claimed.

SIGNED ON CENTAURUS
Johnsen served 13 months in the American navy during the war and then joined the crew of the steamship Centaurus at Astoria, December 23, 1915, as an oiler. While at sea, worrying from

the fact that his passport was not in order, Johnsen became very ill and his mind gave way. Instead of having his case given prompt medical attention, it is alleged, Johnsen was thrown in irons and no investigation whatever made of the cause of his illness.

The vessel arriving at Callao, Peru, the quarantine and other officers came aboard to make their inspections. Johnsen was not included in the list of the crew furnished the officers by the skipper. It is said, but was listed as a stow-away. He was kept below decks until the officers completed their inspection and left the vessel.

CAPTAIN NOT PROSECUTED
On January 17 of this year, as the steamship Centaurus was casting off her lines preparatory to continuing her voyage from Callao, according to sworn testimony now in the hands of District Attorney Barrett of this city and given by Dewey E. Dobson and B. A. Avery of the Centaurus' crew, Captain Jorgensen and First Officer Wiley of the Centaurus forcibly took Johnsen from the vessel, placed him on the dock at Callao, stuffed 5 pounds of Peruvian money into his pocket and deserted him. When the Centaurus reached the United States one of the members of the crew told the parents of the young man here in Astoria the facts.

District Attorney Barrett, after months of cabling and writing of letters, located young Johnsen in a Callao hospital where he was being treated for insanity. Thus far the master of the Centaurus has not been prosecuted. His whereabouts cannot be learned.
