

PAROCHIALS MAY ENTER 2 PUBLIC SCHOOL SECTIONS

Children from parochial schools will be permitted to attend the nearest public school from their respective homes for domestic science and manual training only, providing their parents make application to the principal of the school who shall refer it with his recommendations to both the superintendent and to the school board for final action. This is the gist of an amended minority recommendation of Director A. C. Newill of the educational affairs committee, adopted by the board Thursday afternoon with a vote of three to two.

WOODWARD REPORTS

Report of Director W. F. Woodward, chairman of the committee, which was supported by Director George E. Thomas, provided for practically the same thing, but was longer, went into the history of the subject from the time the board in 1913 granted parochial schools the privilege of sending domestic science and manual training classes to the public schools to the recent protest by certain parents that their children were being denied opportunity of taking work because of crowded conditions created by the outside children, said that any arrangement whereby the board entered into a "partnership" with parochial schools was wrong and could only become increasingly embarrassing, that discipline was hard to maintain between two classes of students, and that there was bound to be class distinction.

NEWILL PLAN ADOPTED

Newill objected to such a lengthy report and the sectarian references in it. His own original report left authority in the hands of the superintendent, but this he was willing to amend if the board wanted final action to rest in its own hands. His objection was that so much detail would prove irksome to the board. He was willing to compromise if certain clauses might be stricken out of Woodward's report. Woodward refused to compromise. Newill then moved his own report be adopted, and the motion carried with affirmative votes from Shull and Orton.

"Our support of Newill does not mean that we favor parochial schools," said Shull, "but that we wish to avoid all sectarianism."

DIFFERENCE SHOWN

The difference between the new arrangement and that now in vogue is that negotiations for the parochial child's enrollment in public school domestic science and manual training must come between the parent and the school authorities, who can consent or reject as the individual circumstances may warrant, instead of the parochial school authorities and the public schools. Also, that instead of parochial students attending a few public schools in a body, those schools being nearest to the parochial institution, each parochial student must attend that particular public school nearest his home, thus coming under the same regulations as the regular public school children.

Grand Jury Hears Jacksonville Bank Wreck Testimony

Medford, Oct. 22.—The grand jury began consideration Friday of the cases growing out of the wrecking of the Jacksonville bank, the first of which is that against President William Johnson.

An indictment was returned, charging assault to kill against David C. Connell of Astoria, former deputy sheriff of Clatsop and Umatilla counties and defeated Republican candidate for sheriff in the Clatsop county primaries, for the alleged choking of Mrs. Calire E. Houghton, an Astoria widow, while they were en route from Astoria by automobile to San Francisco with the intention of getting married and locating. A few miles south of Ashland their car ran into a ditch, which caused a quarrel. Connell pleaded not guilty when arraigned and was released on \$250 bail.

Medford post, American Legion, has wired United States Senator Chamberlain for an expression of his attitude on the proposed bonus for ex-service men. The action was taken after Adjutant Elmer E. Wilson had informed the legionnaires that R. N. Stanfield, opponent of Chamberlain, had declared for a "four plan bonus." When the plan was first brought to Chamberlain's attention it was in his favor.

Movie Puts Boy to Sleep While Police Try to Find Him

While the police and his parents were wildly searching the city for him, Wilfred Duke, 8, of 46 1/2 East Burnside street, was calmly sleeping in a picture show.

Early Thursday evening his parents notified the police that the lad had not returned home and a search for him was started. No clue was found and he did not come.

At 2:30 o'clock Friday morning the janitor of the Casino photoplay theatre on Burnside street telephoned for the police. When they arrived at the theatre the boy was found sleeping innocently in the seat. He was roused and taken to police headquarters and later sent home. He told the police he did not know how long he had been asleep, but seemed sorry he missed part of the picture.

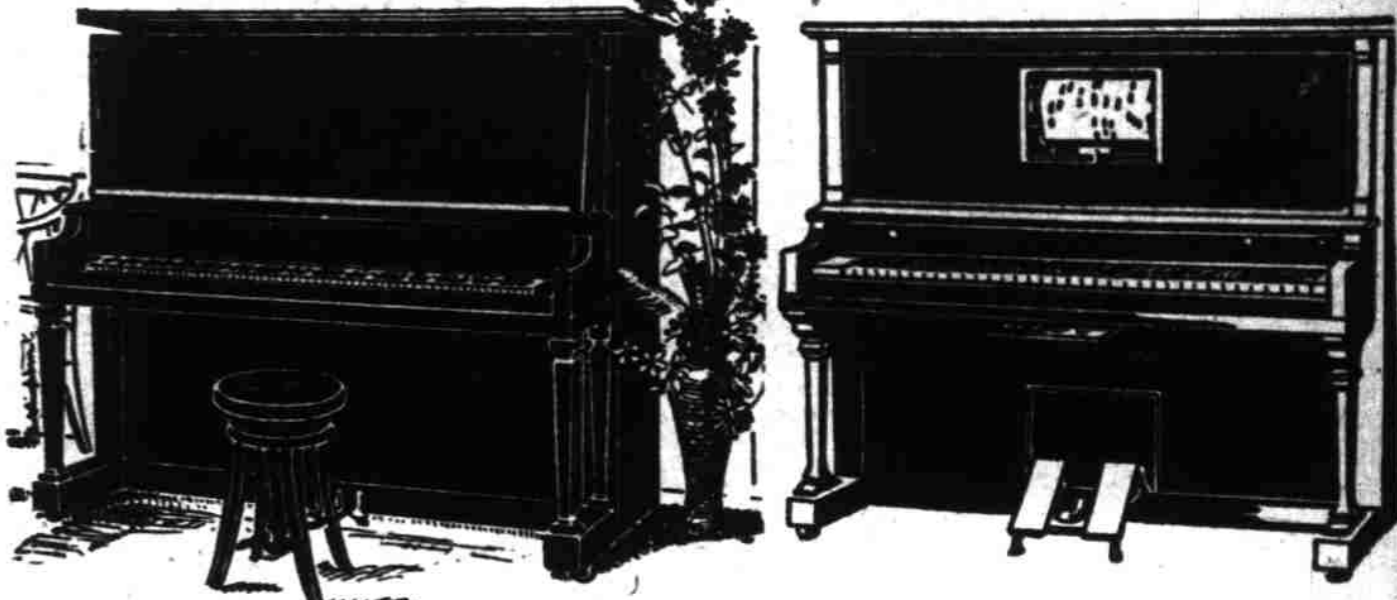

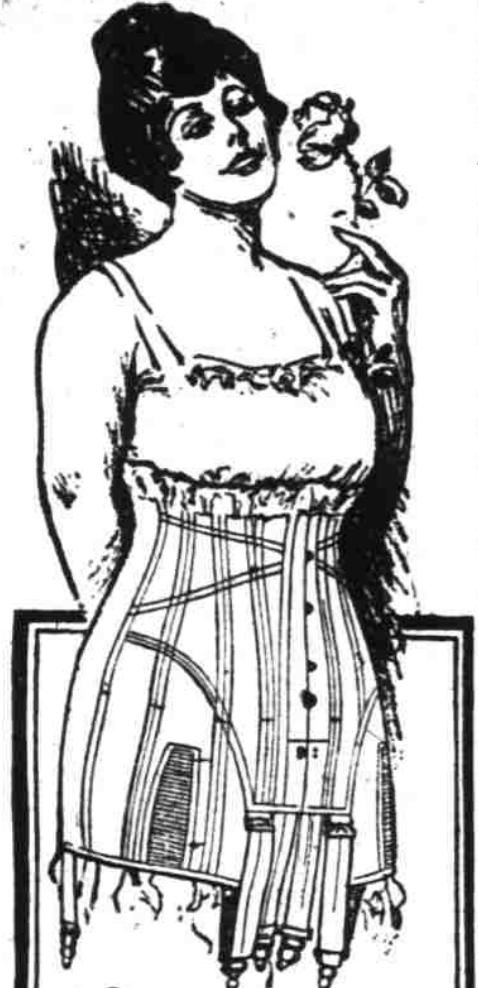
