

# Mayor Baker to Give "Kick-Off" Address Before Montavilla Welfare League Tuesday

## COMMUNITY SPIRIT FOSTERED BY NEW ORDER; AIM GIVEN

An address by Mayor Baker will feature the "kick-off" meeting of the Montavilla Welfare League next Tuesday evening, October 26, at 7:30 o'clock in the auditorium of the Montavilla school. Assisting in the evening entertainment will be Chief Jenkins' popular police quartet, consisting of Sergeant R. L. Crane and Officers George Johnson, L. E. Cullins and Ralph Gowanlock, with Ray Steadman accompanying.

The league, which was organized last June, is a civic organization, created for the purpose of furthering social welfare activity along a variety of lines in which all residents in and near Montavilla are participating.

WORK CLASSIFIED

The work has been divided into four divisions, with committees in charge, and classification as follows: Moral, educational, recreational and financial. The chairmen of the committees are Miss Vida Hammond, moral; Agnes Mallock, educational; L. L. Giles, recreational, and Frank Baringer, financial.

A large program of activity during the winter has been organized, chief of which is the installation of a playground in Montavilla, while other improvement of a public nature will follow in rapid succession, according to the league's president, I. C. Cunningham. Other officers of the league are H. E. Giles, vice-president; J. E. Springer, secretary, and Fred Robbins, treasurer.

All of Montavilla and a large representation from the surrounding communities are expected to attend the Tuesday evening meeting. This attendance will be due to the work of the publicity committee, which distributed 1500 posters this week and which instructed all school children to notify their parents of the meeting.

## EAST THIRTEENTH SEWER IS OPENED

Opening of outlets to the East Thirteenth street sewer, one of the main connecting arteries to the mammoth sewage system of the Peninsula district, was announced by the public works department.

Coincidental with the announcement a statement was issued to the effect that the Columbia slough plan of draining sewage of the Peninsula district had proven an absolute success. With low water a strong current has been developed into the Willamette river.

No system of drainage in Portland has caused as much comment as the Columbia slough plan, it was pointed out. Originally it was thought necessary that a system of main sewers, with connecting laterals, would have to be constructed at an approximate cost of \$1,500,000. Instead, use of the Columbia slough was made as a connecting link between the Columbia and Willamette rivers and a current developed to drain the sewage.

Forty thousand lots in the Peninsula district are being made to bear the assessment. From an original plan of assessing these lots \$45 each, the assessment under the new plan has fallen to \$9.

In the original specifications, it was proposed that two concrete sewers be constructed along the city lines for a distance of some two miles, emptying into the Willamette.

The first ditches creating a current were recently opened, and with the opening of the East Thirteenth street sewer this week, the current developed was declared of unquestionable strength to forecast the utmost success of the plan.

## ST. JOHNS NEEDS FIRE PROTECTION

First of district surveys to be submitted to Commissioner John M. Mann, outlining adequate fire protection, was made by Engineer F. M. Mandette, of the water works.

The survey was for St. Johns and calls for the immediate expenditure in that district of \$10,325.

Extension of a 12-inch main on Salem street, from Edison to Bradford streets, is recommended. Its estimated cost is set at \$4600. Extension of a 12-inch main on Richmond street, in the same boundaries, is placed at \$4825.

This layout would make possible the delivery of about 6000 gallons per minute at the intersection of Bradford and Salem streets, declares the report.

A slightly smaller amount would be delivered along Bradford street in the vicinity of LeVitt and St. John streets.

"There is, of course, no additional revenue to be obtained by the laying of these mains," the letter points out. "The protection would serve the manufacturing center of St. Johns."
