

COSHOW IN RACE, AS DEMOCRAT, FOR ATTORNEY GENERAL

Roseburg, Attorney, Who Has Practiced Many Years in Oregon, Is Well Known in State.

O. P. Coshow of Roseburg, the only Democratic candidate for attorney general to fill the vacancy caused by the resignation of Attorney General George M. Brown, is in Portland in the interest of his candidacy and is making an energetic campaign throughout the state.

Coshow has been engaged in the practice of law at Roseburg for over 22 years and is a member of the bar of the supreme court of the United States, of the Oregon State Bar association and of the American Bar association. He served in the state senate during the sessions of 1905 and 1907, overcoming the large adverse majority of his district in his election.

Coshow was also a member of the Board of Higher Curricula from its organization in 1909 until 1918, and assisted in eliminating the duplication and friction that formerly existed between the University of Oregon and the Oregon Agricultural college. During the war he took an active part in every movement to make the war successful, and was a member of the Home Guards and a permanent member of the legal advisory board for Douglas county. At the request of the local defense league he conducted the first Salvation Army drive in Douglas county, securing more than 150 per cent of the county's allotment at an expense of less than \$20. He conducted the United War Works campaign, securing the amount allotted to Douglas county in cash, notwithstanding that the armistice was signed before the campaign was over.

Senator Coshow has an extensive acquaintance over the state, and his friends and supporters are confident that he will be elected to the position he is seeking.

DIVIDED SESSION OF LEGISLATURE ESPOUSED

Declaring that he was for the divided session amendment because it would give an opportunity for people living in remote sections of the state to confer with their own members of the legislature, D. V. Kuykendall, circuit judge of Klamath county, expressed his belief that the measure would pass with overwhelming majorities, if the people understood its provisions.

Judge Kuykendall pointed out that the proposed measure made no change in our legislative system except that the measures which were passed by the legislature at the regular 40-day period did not finally become laws until the members of the legislature had taken a two-months vacation and then returned to the state capital and again passed on these measures. He avers that during this 60-day interim not only the members of the legislature, but the people generally will have an opportunity of carefully considering these measures which have been tentatively passed by the legislature, advising with their own legislators as to their merit. The judge describes it as a referendum of these measures without the expense of a special election, because the vote is taken by the members of the legislature themselves after they have conferred with their constituency, but it is an improvement over any other form of referendum because the legislature, by a three-fourths majority, can make amendments to these bills after they have once been passed.

If, after the measures are re-passed, the people feel that their wishes have not been carried out they still have recourse to our present system of referendum. In his opinion the members of the legislature will very generally carry out the wishes of the people, if the people are given an opportunity to express themselves, and he believes that the referendum will be invoked upon very few measures and that the cost of special

referendum elections will be largely done away with if this measure becomes a law. He declares that his experience on the bench has taught him the necessity for greater deliberation in the passing of laws and is confident that the slowing down of legislative machinery through the provisions of this bill will eliminate a great deal of the congestion in our courts which is caused by construing the constitutionality of improperly considered legislation and the conflicting provisions of measures which comes from our present chaotic sessions.

PERKINS FAVORS REVISED TRAFFIC LAW

Declaring that the streets of Portland must be made safe for the children, Dr. T. L. Perkins, candidate for city commissioner, announced Saturday that in the event he is elected he will set immediately to work to procure a revision of the traffic ordinances in order that youngsters may be given protection while playing in specially designated streets during the early evening hours of summer months.

"In many of the congested residential districts far situated from public parks the street is the only playground which many children of the apartments and tenements have," he said. "I believe that along certain streets during the early evening hours of the summer months these children should be permitted to play without fear of being crushed to death beneath the wheels of motor vehicles."

"Such a plan has been adopted in many cities larger than Portland without interference of traffic. Traffic is comparatively light in residential sections after working hours, and it is no more than right that the automobile should give way to the children for an hour or two in the evenings when the weather is favorable."

A pledge that he will work for this end has already been given to residents of South Portland, and other communities have sent word to Dr. Perkins that they are in hearty accord with his plan.

Lebb Brothers Are Admitted to Bail In Car Theft Case

J. S. Lebb, 33, and D. G. Lebb, 40, 578 East Twenty-second street North, are out of jail under \$4000 bail each, following their arrest on a warrant sworn by Frank L. Waller of the Northwestern National Bank building, who claims the stole a machine belonging to him. The machine was recovered by Patrolman Drennen in the Broadway garage.

April 3, D. G. Lebb is said to have bought the machine in question from the Graham Motors Co., at Tenth and Stark streets. Shortly afterward he sold the machine to John B. Welsh, who sold it to Frank Waller September 2.

The Lebbis contend that the machine has not been paid for by Welsh, and that they were starting civil action to collect from him.
