

M'ARTHUR SERVED WITH TALK ONLY; DECLARES VETERAN

"It is inconceivable to me that C. N. McArthur should be returned to congress by the voters of Multnomah county," says J. C. Hannan, a returned soldier who volunteered long before he would have been called in the draft and who served 18 months overseas with the American expeditionary forces. "McArthur is making a valiant attempt to show how patriotic he is," Hannan continued. "He has had opportunity to serve his country in two wars but both times he failed. During the last war, from all I can learn, he served his country by 'lip service.'"

"When I enlisted I left my mother and some younger brothers dependent largely upon what I could send them. McArthur was in congress and never once raised his voice against the orgy of profiteering carried on during the war. By his silence he served the interests of profiteers and made it harder for my mother and brothers to live. He now says he favors a soldiers' bonus. The records show he was as slippery on the soldiers' bonus as he has been on prohibition. He said he favored it if 'a proper way could be devised of raising the money required.'"

FAVORED PENNY TAX

"He favored the penny tax—that is, that every person or thing alike should be taxed upon every purchase made. He would throw the burden upon those least able to bear it. Why didn't he favor paying a soldiers' bonus from war profits made by the bankers, the steel trust, the woolen trust, the shoe trust and from the gamblers in the products? He has secured leave to print many speeches in the Congressional Record (which I feel sure he never delivered) against the common working man, accusing the laborer of being a profiteer and attempting to destroy the government."

"Where are his speeches condemning the profiteer or the 23,000 war-made millionaires? He never raised his voice in protest against making one millionaires for every three boys killed in the war. His silence condemns him as a willing tool of special interests. Many Republicans and Democrats in the senate and house were not afraid to speak out, but McArthur remained silent. Surely he knows his true position."

"When we need food, clothing, fuel, houses and adequate transportation facilities in order to restore sanity to this country, all McArthur can say is, 'All who oppose me are traitors.' He includes in this statement all the ministers, the W. C. T. U. and the Prohibition party. What a dignified utterance to come from a man representing us in congress!"

"In contrast, Esther Pohl Lovejoy surrendered a lucrative practice, served as a volunteer worker during the war and many months after, paying all of her own expenses, and is now giving all royalties received from her writings to the American Women's Hospital association. She has made all sacrifices and done all within her power. McArthur has been wholly self-centered, serving special interests, content to render lip service. I think the advertisements which have recently appeared in the Portland papers designating him as a 'Maweh' (May as well stay home) congressman, have described him correctly."

Diogenes' Hunt Is Brought to an End in Portland

San Francisco, Oct. 26.—(U. P.)—Joseph Berges, former wholesale liquor dealer, respectfully refers to Diogenes as Joe Ehlinger, 418 Union avenue, Portland, Or.

Before the 1906 fire Ehlinger was part owner of a local restaurant. The fire wiped out his holdings and nothing was heard from him until two days ago.

Then came to Berges a letter from Ehlinger saying he and his partner owed Berges \$110 when they were burned out. A check for half of that amount and interest at 6 per cent was enclosed.

HARDING AGAIN WOULD STAY OUT

Marion, Ohio, Oct. 26.—(U. The men operated stores across the street from each other. Assistant United States Attorney Flegel told the court the grape juice tested 7 per cent alcohol.

Thornton Robinson, colored, pleaded guilty to selling narcotics in violation of the law and was sentenced to 90 days in the county jail. "The profits in this line are so great that a fine merely acts as a license fee," Flegel told the court, "therefore I recommend a jail sentence."

Diggs' Inheritance Is Shaky Fingers; City to Keep Him

ITALIAN CASE OF ALLEGED THEFT ATTRACTS CROWD

The trial of Vincenzo Mattio, charged with robbing the safe of Joe Lemma's general store at Linn-ton, which was begun in Judge Tucker's department of the circuit court last Thursday, was still in progress today. Daily the court room and corridors adjacent are filled with Italian spectators.

Lemna claims that thefts of money from his store had been going on for 16 months, that he had discharged several clerks, but the thefts still continued, and he engaged a detective to discover the thief, and it was then that Mattio was caught taking marked money from the safe.

Mattio's defense is that he had loaned Lemma money and had asked for its repayment several times and that at the time in question he had gone to the Lemma living rooms over the store and was told by Lemma to go down to the safe, which was open, and take out \$20 in payment of the loan, and that as he was doing this he was taken by the detective. He says he did not understand sufficient English to know what it was he was signing as an alleged confession, and that later, in the office of Italian Consul Ferrera, under duress, he was compelled to sign agreement to turn over his property to Lemma.

Motorist Steps on Gas After Machine Runs Down Woman

Another motorist sought safety in flight Sunday afternoon after knocking down and painfully injuring a woman pedestrian. No one saw the accident and no report was made to the police until the victim was taken to Good Samaritan hospital Monday night for treatment.

Denunciation of the anti-vaccination measure on the November ballot was voiced by F. B. Layman in a report submitted at the Rotary club luncheon this afternoon.

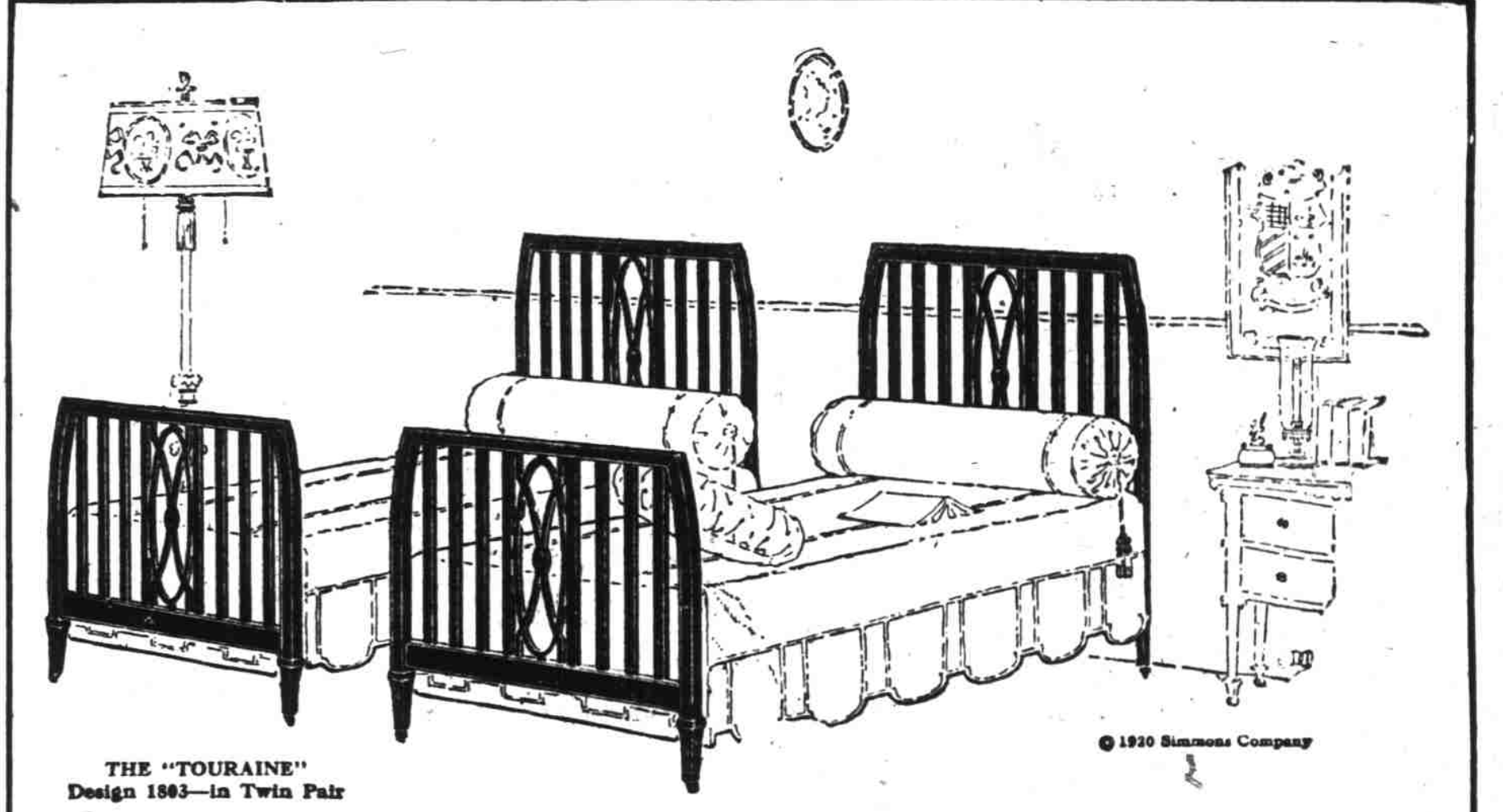
The bill is against all medication, declared Layman, who said that with its enactment public control of epidemics would be abolished in Oregon.
