

G. O. P. SATISFIED TO HOLD FAST TO WHAT THEY HAVE

New York, Oct. 28.—Republican national headquarters here, in this last week of the campaign, is busy trying to hold what it has already got rather than attempting a grab for more.

The Republican state of mind at national headquarters may be described as confident but cautious. They are absolutely sure that they are going to win, but at the same time not absolutely free of fright that they may lose.

A Republican leader today at headquarters reminds one of a big winner in a poker game on which a time limit has been set.

WATCHES HANDS MOVE

The winner surreptitiously estimates his stack and realizes that he has more in front of him than he ever had before in all his life. He looks at the clock and discovers that the game has but 30 minutes to go. Thirty minutes more and if he can only hold his own he will be on velvet softer and thicker than any in his experience; but the game is a table stakes affair and the game is after him.

He knows that if he really gets out on a limb before the draw with a splendid hand that is not quite good enough he may lose the one stack on one big call. He hopes that the game will be dull and the hands uneventful for the remaining few minutes of play. He watches the clock and wishes the end were at hand.

FIVE MINUTES TO GO

The money before him is his and he is confident of his ability to keep it for the remaining few minutes of play, but at the same time he knows that his chips are not acceptable as currency until they have been translated into currency by the banker, and he knows—if he has played much poker—that he is not certain of having his chips to present for translation into currency until after the final hand of the evening is played.

The Republican leaders at national headquarters are quite certain in their own minds that they are sitting behind a large stack of political blue chips. They are sure that if they can hold on to the chips they think they have before them that they will be big winners when the time comes to cash in. The only thing that worries them is that the time to cash in is not now. The game still has five days to run, and they are watching the clock anxiously.

DON'T WANT OPENERS

They do not care about being tangled up in any more big hands; they are not pining for further winnings; another big pot is not their main ambition. The big idea now is just to sit it out until the clock strikes Tuesday, November 2, without getting involved in any plays that might by any possibility entail a big loss.

Up to a short time ago, for example, the powers that be at headquarters were looking for publicity, but it is no longer desired. Publicity just at this stage might be enough to open a pot that would grow to enormous proportions and that would not necessarily be ultimately added to the Republican stack.

HOLDS PAIR AND FILLS

Will Hays still emerges from the inner office in the mornings and talks affably to "the boys," but as far as giving out anything for quotation goes he might as well be suffering from paralysis of the lips and tongue. Hays these days has much to say to the newspaper men "for your information" and nothing at all for the information of anyone else.

In short, the Republican leaders at national headquarters here are sure that they have won the election and reasonably sure that they can keep it won until election day, but just the same the actual returns in Harding's favor are going to take a lot of worry off their minds.

Colonel Crossley spoke against the League of Nations pact as at present constituted, for a Republican tariff, denounced the Wilson administration as extravagant, wasteful and inefficient, and uttered a plea to the Republican voters to stand by Stanfield for senator.
