Gorman Will Meet J. Davis At Milwaukie

JOE GORMAN, the crack featherweight battler, will make his first appearance before the Portland fans in five months at Milwaukie next Wednesday night against Jack Davis, the sensational California boy. Davis is the only boy who has been able to upset Gorman since the little fellow started his remarkable winning streak.

This contest is one of the three 10 round features of the all-star card that is arranged. Matchmaker Frank Kendall has not completed the other two contests. "Wild Bill" Reed will likely tangle with Ole Anderson and Leo Cross will be pitted against "Goat" Lavin. Steve Dalton of Los Angeles is also being considered as one of the participants in a 10 round bout.

Davis is due to reach Portland Sunday night or Monday morning to complete his training. The complete card will be arranged Friday afternoon.

Albany College Is Seeking Grid Games

Albany, Or., Oct. 23.—Difficulty in scheduling games is reported by Coach McNeal of the Albany college football team, who has thus far been able to secure but one date. Armistice day, when the collegians will play an American Legion team from Oregon City. The college team averages 150 pounds and is fast. High schools are unwilling to meet the Albany eleven, and college teams are too heavy to afford equal contests. Practice games between the college and the local high school eleven are being held frequently, and negotiations for games between the collegians and Chemawa and the O. A. C. rocks are being made.

Coach McNeal's predicament is caused by the failure of Albany college to sustain teams for the last two years, as a consequence of which no schedules had been outlined.

Heyden and Dewey starred for the winners.

CHANGES MAY BE MADE IN LASKER BASEBALL PLAN

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—(I. N. S.)—Directors of the American league assembled here today at the call of Ban Johnson to discuss reorganization of organized baseball. It is believed that the directors will vote to meet with the National league club owners and the three American league magnates who are opposed to President Johnson when they assemble on November 8.

The meeting on November 8 has been called to consider the so-called Lasker plan for a high tribunal to have complete control of baseball. The American league directors, it is believed, will not oppose a reorganization of baseball's governing body, but will insist upon several changes in the Lasker plan.

Although the magnates will meet here on November 8, the session probably will be a perfunctory one and adjournment will be taken to Kansas City, where the National Association of Minor League will meet on November 9.

The real plan of reorganization, it is expected, will be evolved in the meetings at Kansas City. Minor league already are showing signs of hostility toward the Lasker plan.

Albany Plans Busy Winter Sport Season

Albany, Or., Oct. 23.—Athletic activities for the Albany Chamber of Commerce have been assured by a committee in charge of an athletic program for the winter.

G. A. Flood, chairman of the committee, has announced that a bi-weekly series of classes will be held in the Community house gymnasium, and that handball, volleyball and indoor baseball contests will be staged. The gymnasium is being equipped with paraphernalia, and shower baths have been restored. The athletic committee has engaged Seth French and Hiram Torbet to direct the gymnasium classes and the reorganization of a Willamette valley handball league is being planned.

BAN JOHNSON TO PRESENT FACTS OF B. B. SCANDAL

CHICAGO, Oct. 23.—(U. P.)—Reopening of the probe of crooked baseball by the Cook county grand jury which was scheduled to return indictments of ball players and gamblers in connection with the fixed 1919 world series today is threatened by reported discovery by President Ban Johnson of the American league of alleged crookedness in the National league.

Johnson was said to have new evidence in connection with the August 31 game between the Cubs and Philadelphia. This was the game on which gamblers were said to have wagered heavy pools. Charges were made at the time that the game was fixed.

The new evidence, it was said, will show through files of a telegraph company that a Cub player wired a friend to bet on the Phillies for that game.

Notre Dame To Play Army On Saturday

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.—(I. N. S.)—Notre Dame versus Army. Here is the real piece de resistance of Saturday's football menu.

In the East this game will draw attention away from the big three. In the West it will be watched with keen interest.

The annual clash between the Army and the "Fighting Irish" from Hoosierland has become an intercollegiate fixture of real class. Notre Dame, one of the pluckiest in the use of the aerial game, generally turns out a strong, versatile eleven and the annual game with the Army points the cadets each fall for their one big contest—the clash with the Midgies.

IN REAL TEST

Coach Daly's cadets have not tasted defeat this season, but tomorrow's game with Notre Dame will be the first real test of Army's strength.

Coach Rockne's eleven, having defeated the Nebraska Cornhuskers by a score of 14 to 0, will not doubt keep up the precedent established in past years by fighting the Cadets to a standstill.

Two other games in the East stand out in this week's schedule. The battle between Penn State and Pennsylvania at Philadelphia and the clash between Princeton and West Virginia rank next to the game at West Point.

PENN TO MEET RIVALS
Penn State, strong eleven so far undefeated and with a victory over Dartmouth as its outstanding achievement, is expected to defeat Coach Holsman's Red and Blue machine. West Virginia's efforts against Princeton will give football followers a line on the Tigers as compared with Yale, which defeated the Mountaineers 24 to 0 last Saturday.

Harvard and Yale will have easy games. The Crimson meets Virginia. Yale takes on Colgate.

At Annapolis the Midgies will play an intercollegiate game when they line up against Western Reserve from Cleveland.

Georgia Tech. versus Center college at Atlanta will hold the sports fans South. In the big ten the clashes be-

tween Chicago and Ohio State, Illinois and Minnesota and Indiana and Northwestern will narrow down the race for the title.

While other teams are resting up for scheduled games the Nebraska Cornhuskers will take a final workout at Lincoln today prior to starting for New York tomorrow for their clash with Rutgers at the polo grounds on Tuesday, November 2. Following the Rutgers game Nebraska will remain in the East to play Penn State and State college, Pennsylvania, a week from tomorrow.
