

3 MEN LEAGUED IN STAMP THEFT, TESTIMONY SHOWS

Testimony in the War Savings Stamp theft prosecution in the federal court today tended to show that former City Police Inspector Robert LaSalle, Angelo Rossi and Fred Peterson were in league in the theft, mutilation and sale of stamps stolen from the bank of Scio.

This testimony was presented by J. M. Reilly, head of the Pinkerton Detective agency here, and by G. H. Marsh, clerk of the federal court. Reilly declared he had identified stamps found in Rossi's place as bearing the same registry numbers as those found in George Randolph's store. Previous witnesses had testified to a connection between Randolph and LaSalle. Marsh read court testimony on the basis of which Peterson was sent to the penitentiary for stamp thefts.

LaSalle kept all the records of stolen property in the Portland police department for a time last spring and thus was able to know if any reports unfavorable to him came into the police department, according to testimony given Thursday afternoon by Captain H. A. Circle.

The captain stated that all records of stolen property were turned over to LaSalle for entry, and that his office never received a report during March concerning the alleged stolen and altered War Savings stamps, which are said to have been sold by LaSalle to George Randolph.

Circle contradicted statements made by Inspector Bill Hyde when he stated that his office had received reports on Willamette valley bank robberies last spring. Circle also stated that he never instructed Hyde to allow pawnbrokers to keep purchases of War Savings stamps off their daily reports.

When LaSalle found he could no longer conceal from his superior officer the predicament he was in, Circle said he offered the excuse that he "didn't want to be made the laughing stock of fellow officers," when asked the reason for his actions.

Inspector Tip Schuplius also testified under oath that he knew LaSalle had "got hold of some bump stamps," and that he failed to report the matter to Captain Circle.

Miss Phyllis Rogers, clerk in Randolph's office, told of many visits by LaSalle to the office.

"One time he got there before I did in the morning and waited in the hall," she said, "and several times I called Mr.

Randolph on the phone and told him to come down as Mr. LaSalle was waiting."

Some of LaSalle's and Randolph's conversations are said to have been heard in the hall of the office building. DOESN'T GET PEEP

The most exciting time during the entire afternoon session was when one of the counsel for the defense endeavored to get his eyes on a secret file of the department of justice from which Tom Word was testifying. Word insisted the attorney be allowed to read only the paragraphs from which he had testified. The attorney objected and tried to force the government officer to surrender the docket. The court held the officer right in his position, so the attorney refused to cross examine. Word testified that W. E. Brenner, one of the defendants in the case, paid Angelo Rossi, another defendant, the following amounts for different lots of War Savings Stamps: \$227.50, \$300, \$35 and \$17.50.

Auto Theft Brings Two-Year Sentence

For stealing an automobile in Colton, Wash., and bringing it into Oregon in violation of the interstate commerce laws, Gordon N. Tisher, alias George N. Fisher, was sentenced this morning to two years at McNeil's island prison by Federal Judge Wolverton. He pleaded guilty. Tisher was arrested while attempting to sell the stolen auto in Cottage Grove. A woman whom Tisher is said to have brought into the state at the same time has not been found by government agents.

FARMER CHARGES HE IS FORCED TO TRANSPORT LIQUOR

The weird tale of a Canby farmer that he had been forced, with a revolver to bring to Portland in his automobile a load of moonshine liquor from a car that had broken down near his place, led to the arrest about noon Friday of Frank Robbins at the home of his mother on Clay street, between Fourth and Fifth streets. Robbins was found hidden behind a door, and some empty "moonshine" bottles and two dressed fowls were found with him.

According to the statement of John Kraft, who lives on a farm about five miles east of Canby, two men known to him as Chris Hostutter and Frank Robbins were in the car, which broke down with a load of illicit liquor, which they said was "dressed chickens," close to his place about 5 o'clock

Thursday morning. He says they went to his home, and, flourishing a gun, forced him to load the stuff into his own machine and haul it and them into Portland to the house on Clay street. Kraft said that after the load was delivered the two men offered him a drink and warned him not to tell anyone. He says he did not tell anyone of the occurrence until Thursday night, when he notified Sheriff Wilson of Clackamas county. The arrest was made by Wilson and Deputy Sheriffs Christoffersen and Schirmer of Portland.

In searching the house on Clay street they found a revolver that corresponded with the description of the gun which Kraft says was used to force him to bring the men into Portland. Kraft has identified the man arrested as the one known to him as Robbins.
