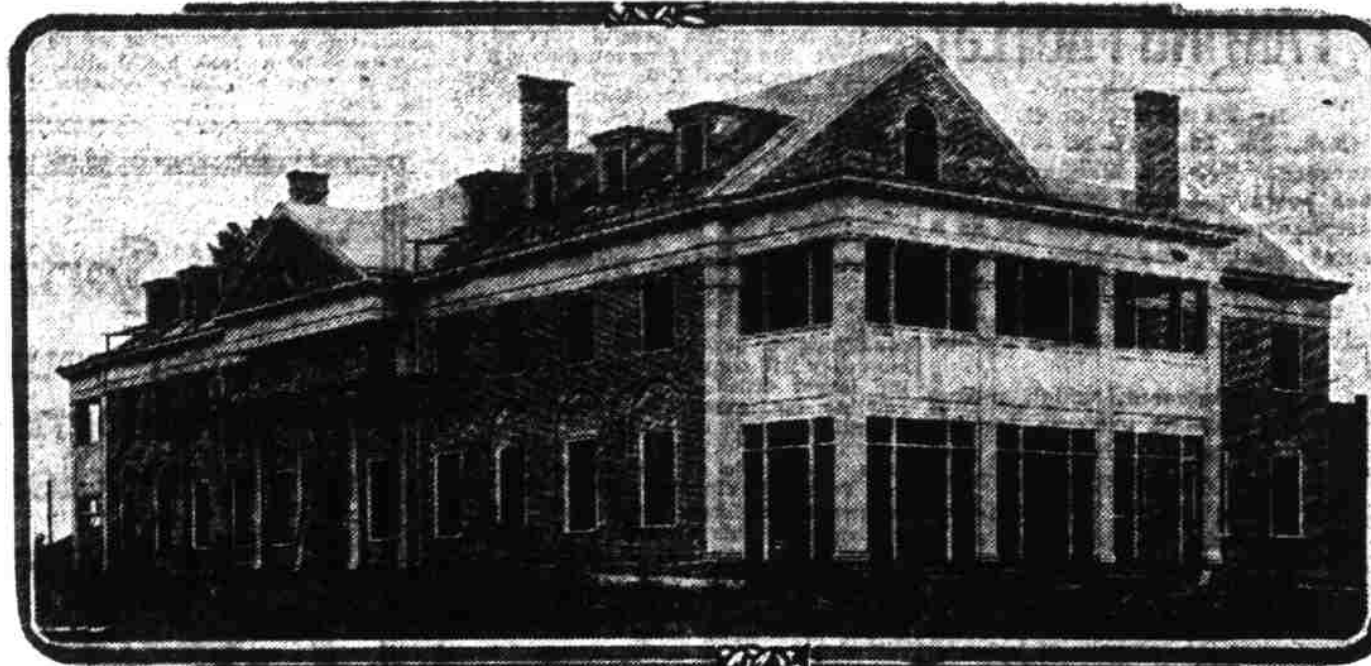

In its effort to secure \$25,000 by public subscription before the end of the drive, November 6, the campaign management is hampered by an inadequate field force.

"We need more solicitors at once," said Mr. Hilton, "and we also need volunteers for tag day, November 6, when we will attempt to complete our task by street subscriptions."

In testimony to their cooperation a photograph will be taken of the youngsters, and subsequently enlarged, to hang in an honored place in the new home at East Twenty-second street and Sandy boulevard.

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CITY OUTFIT CUTS OWN LOW BID ON JOB BY \$1099.77

Figures announced today for the recently completed improvement of Jersey street, in St. Johns, show that this main thoroughfare improvement was completed at a cost exceeding \$5000 under bids of private contractors.

The initial bid for the paving, between Richmond and Baltimore streets, was \$12,548.07, made by a private contracting company. When the bid was opened the council refused to let the contract and ordered that the municipal plant should make a bid in competition. The latter's bid was \$3625.46, or nearly \$4000 under. The municipal plant, then given the work, completed the project for \$7825.05, or \$1099.77 less than its own bid. This saving, combined with the saving made initially in comparison with the private bid, brings the saving to the city to more than \$5000.

Commissioner of Public Works Barber declared today that this record of the municipal plant is being carried out in all its work.

The street is an important one to St. Johns residents, being the main thoroughfare through the heart of the district.

Two Night Schools Will Open Tuesday; Will Aid Foreigner

Two new night schools are to be opened Tuesday night, one at Arleta school, in addition to the one already at the Arleta branch library, and one at Shaver school.

These schools are opened to meet the growing demand from foreigners to learn the English language. Shaver will be devoted entirely to this form of instruction, while Arleta will care for a few part-time students in addition.

Any community in which a class of at least 15 foreigners is guaranteed, which will furnish a classroom, will be supplied with a teacher. Principal A. M. Gray says. The classroom may be in a workshop, church, lodgeroom, private home or any place else large enough to hold the class.

There are now 400 foreigners in

Portland, actually attending night schools, says Gray. There are 5000 foreigners in the city.

"There is a scarcity of good teachers for the night schools," says Gray, "and we are calling upon married women who have been teachers, before their marriage to help us out. We find that married women are especially adapted to teaching the foreigner—much better than single women. At present we are so short of teachers we have had to turn classes over to our secretaries. We do not want to have to call upon the day teachers to help us out."

HIBERNIAN BAZAAR TO PAY HALL DEBT

A three-day bazaar will be held jointly by the Ladies' Auxiliary, A. O. H. and the Hibernian Building association at Hibernian hall, 340 Russell street, on November 11, 12 and 13. Proceeds will be devoted to liquidation of the remaining debt on the hall.

A washing machine valued at \$150 will be the grand prize of the bazaar. Another interesting prize is a unique baby buggy, built by a member of the Hibernians, which is equipped to take care of twins or triplets. Other prizes include fancy work which has engaged the attention of the ladies' auxiliary for months.

A large sign reading "Lead Me Salutation" (a hundred thousand welcomes) will grace the entrance to the hall. The Knights of Columbus will assist at the bazaar. John Farrell is chairman and Edward Curtin secretary of the committee in charge of the affair. The bazaar will be open during the day and in full swing in the evening. The public is invited.
