Simplify the problem of street traffic regulations;
Render possible great economies in the paving of city streets through a decrease in the width of roadways where sizes and number of buildings are limited;
Insure the permanence of character of districts once established, encourage orderly enlargement of business, apartment or industrial zones, while preventing the scattering and intrusion of inappropriate uses of buildings, which deteriorate property; and, finally,
We are satisfied that this Zone Ordinance was fairly drawn up by representatives of all parts of the city after a year's study. And it provides a method for promptly amending zone boundaries where growth of the city requires it, or changes are advisable, after consultation with property owners within 200 feet.
