GERMANY'S LEAD IN AIR AT AN END;

Berlin, Nov. 1 .- Thirty-six years of aerial .. avigation experiments and developments which put Germany in the world lead militarily and commerciall; in airship construction has come to a sudden end with the dissolution of all military airship oranizations as contained in the "good bye" decree of General von Seeckt, head of the present miniature German army, to the air detachments of the old army.

With the exception of one or two, too small to be of any practical use, all the big Zeppelin sheds and harbors in Germany will be razed within a few weeks. Aerially, Germany will then be completely "disarmed."

Smallpox Scare at Stephens School

It is not surprising that parents and guardians are becoming disgusted with the frequency of so-called smallpox scares and the consequent disruption of school and

The recent "scare" at Stephens School is a fair example of the methods followed by the Board of Health.

On October 6th, the small son of Mr. L. J. Dungam, 432 East Seventh street, developed a mild case of eczema, but continued in school until October 15th, when his teacher sent him home, saying that he had smallpox. Dr. J. K. Locke, a prominent physician, was called in and pronounced it eczema; the health authorities called the following day and insisted that the boy had smallpox and quarantined the Dungam home. Not being satisfied, Mr. Dungam later called Dr. H. R. Dewey. He found conditions as stated by Dr. Locke, and diagnosed the case as a mild form of eczema.

On October 19th (4 days after the boy was sent home) the entire school was ordered vaccinated during the morning session and told to report for lessons for the afternoon session.

No action was taken by the Board of Health to fumigate or in any way to kill such disease germs as might be lurking on the premises. Evidently vaccination is supposed to have killed them; anyway, it is more remunerating than fumigating.


