Smallpox Scare at Stephens School

It is not surprising that parents and guardians are becoming disgusted with the frequency of so-called smallpox scares, and the consequent disruption of school and household routine.

The recent "scare" at Stephens School is a fair example of the methods followed by the Board of Health.

On October 6th, the small son of Mr. L. J. Dugam, 432 East Seventh street, developed a mild case of eczema, but continued in school until October 15th, when his teacher sent him home, saying that he had smallpox.

On October 19th (4 days after the boy was sent home) the entire school was ordered vaccinated during the morning session and told to report for lessons for the afternoon session.

No action was taken by the Board of Health to fumigate or in any way to kill such disease germs as might be lurking on the premises.
