

FOREST SERVICE LAUNCH OVERRIDES TERRIFIC STORM

One lifeboat was lost, everything loose on deck was swept into the ocean, the anchor was broken, the engine nearly stopped with only one cylinder running out of four, and every one of the seven persons on board was made violently ill on the forest service launch. The Tahn, in one of the worst gales that ever blew off the coast of Alaska, says District Engineer P. H. Dater, who was on board the vessel. The storm blew away some of the light-house signals, destroyed four hall-bulb boats and did other damage.

SEA TEMPESTUOUS

"It was a thrilling experience," said Dater. "We had tied to a dolphin at the end of an island for the night. The wind came up and the captain feared the vessel would be washed ashore. He tried to anchor, but without success. So he struck a course for Ketchikan in the night with the boat tossing and pitching, many times going under the waves. For five hours we tossed over the roughest sea the captain had ever known. Everything loose on deck was swept off and much that was nailed down. No one could stand on deck. The men crept about on all fours. Everything on the boat was soaked with the waves continually sweeping over the vessel. The man at the wheel was just out of the hospital and we didn't know when he would give out. Everyone was seasick."

SCENIC ROAD BUILT

About 35 miles of road in the Tongass and Chugach national forests have been built or are in process of construction, says Dater. For the most part these are for the use of local residents out of the towns, but many are of scenic importance. Especially is the one leading from Juneau to the Mendenhall glacier, 12 miles away, important from the tourist standpoint. This road the forest service is completing from its beginning by the war department, and it plans to circle Auk lake, thus making a complete loop. Dater made a preliminary survey of power site possibilities in the vicinity of Ketchikan, with the principal idea of the development of the paper pulp industry. This territory within 35 miles from Ketchikan is suitable for a 100 ton capacity plant, he says. The Alaska Pulp & Paper company, which is building a plant in the Port Snettishan region, will be ready to commence operations within a few months.

Federal Court Is Asked to Dismiss C. D. Bowles' Suit

Federal Judge Wolverton was urged Monday to dismiss the suit brought by C. D. Bowles against J. R. Bowles, W. B. Beebe, A. F. Smith, Dan Dpdon, Elmer Dodson, Edward McConnell, John Keelin, J. A. Martin, Stewart, Albert Cooper and Otto Jendish. Bowles seeks to have the defendants enjoined from trespassing on his hunting grounds on Sauvier island. Counsel for the defendants asked the court to dismiss the suit on the grounds that the plaintiff was endeavoring to use the government and its agents as a guard for the land. Bowles claimed in his complaint that watchmen recently employed were unable to keep game poachers off the place. The first three defendants are trustees of the property and are not charged with actually killing the fowl. Bowles alleges that the guards whom they employed were powerless to prevent trespassing. Judge Wolverton took the case under advisement.

Members Consider Adoption of Boiler Code for Future Use

To consider a boiler code for the state, members of the advisory committee, appointed by the State Industrial Accident commission, met Monday in the offices of the National Safety council. Recommendation for the adoption of the portion of the code of the American Society of Mechanical Engineers applying to boilers installed in the future was made at the meeting.

The committee will continue its work and later offer recommendations as to whether or not to operate. The next meeting will be November 8. Members of the committee are: C. B. Paddock, chairman; H. H. Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Doncaster of this city are suing the Tahn City Saw & Gravel company for damages amounting to \$14,000 and costs, charging that the company hauled sand and gravel from their property without consent, changing the course of the river and damaging their land.

Elusive Still Seized In Josephine County

Grants Pass, Or., Nov. 2.—Tucked away in the hills, 15 miles north of Grants Pass, Sheriff Lewis and three deputies raided and seized Josephine county's elusive moonshine still late Sunday night.

The posse also brought back Jack Casey, Jack Maloney and a man named Ray, all of Grants Pass, who have been under suspicion for a year. The posse caught the men red-handed, with about two gallons of the finished product and the still in operation, according to the sheriff. Casey, Maloney and Ray will be taken to Portland by the federal authorities.

Experts Are to Drill Warrenton Oil Well

Warrenton, Or., Nov. 2.—Two expert well drillers from the California oil fields have taken charge of the drilling for the Lower Columbia Gas & Oil company near here. The derrick is up and a standard rotary drill is to be unrolled at the port docks Wednesday. Plans to sink a well from 3000 to 3500 feet have been made. The first well is to be sunk about 1000 feet south of the city limits of Warrenton.

Still Operative Fined

Roseburg, Nov. 2.—Two moonshine stills were discovered near Drain by Deputy Sheriff Sterling, and Steve Combs and a companion whose name was not given were arrested. Each pleaded guilty and was fined \$55. They were turned over to the federal authorities.

TWO SEIZED, THEN PAROLED BY JUDGE TAZWELL

Charles J. Powers, indicted by the county grand jury on the charge of larceny by bailer of an automobile owned by Ada E. Powers, appeared before Presiding Judge Tazwell Monday and pleaded not guilty. He was released on his own recognizance pending the trial.

Arthur Mealey, aged 19, pleaded guilty to larceny, was sentenced to one year in the county jail and then paroled by Judge Tazwell.

John Dewey Smith, who is now but 20 and who was married when he was less than 18 and has a wife and two children, pleaded guilty to having sold furniture valued at \$25 which he was purchasing on installments. He was given a sentence of five years in the state penitentiary, but because of his wife and children he was paroled and a job has been provided for him.

ACCUSED YOUTH'S CASE IS TAKEN UNDER ADVISEMENT

John Hazelwood, barely 18, is in trouble again. The youth appeared Monday before Presiding Judge Tazwell for arraignment on a grand jury indictment charging him with larceny of personal property of George S. Cole to the value of \$69.60 September 22. District Attorney Evans told the court he had known the boy from childhood and that despite good home training by a foster father and mother who had done all in their power for him, the boy would persist in taking things that did not belong to him. He said the lad had been examined by his mental condition by psychologists who had declared him normal. Judge Tazwell has taken the case under advisement until Thursday afternoon.

ELI PUTTS SUES PARTNER IN RESTAURANT BUSINESS

The roseate dreams of Eli Putts and Dan Baker when they purchased the Portland restaurant, 93 1/2 North Third street, faded to dull gray and then came the awakening of Putts to the grim reality. He filed a suit Monday in which he asks for an accounting from Baker, a dissolution of the partnership and appointment of a receiver for the restaurant, the receiver to be authorized to sell the concern. Putts says Baker won't let him have any hand or voice in running the place.

War Time Transaction in Court

Grim-visaged war is indirectly responsible for a suit now on trial before a jury in Circuit Judge Stapleton's court. It is the action of Butler Bros. against the Utility Garment company of Portland, in which it seeks to recover \$195.67 as balance due on the purchase of \$733.51 worth of gingham. The Utility company has a counterclaim for \$1888 actual damages and \$1000 damages for its reputation. It avers that the gingham was cut up for garments, and after many dozen garments had been sold to the trade, it was discovered that the colors were not fast and orders were returned. The plaintiff contends that no colors were guaranteed during the war. The gingham purchase was made in 1918.

Estate War Echo

An echo of war conditions was heard in Presiding Judge Tazwell's court Monday when Mrs. Elizabeth Freisinger was appointed administratrix of the estate of Lorenz Freisinger Sr. in Multnomah county. He died June 7, 1917, in Glacawatz, Austria-Hungary, whence he had been deported by the United States government. He was left with eight children, all grown, were left in America. The estate consists of real estate in Portland valued at approximately \$1200.

Mose Christensen's Funeral Conducted By Masonic Lodge

The funeral of Mose Christensen was held at 2 p. m. today at the old Masonic temple, Park and Yamhill streets, and the body was placed in the mausoleum at the Portland crematorium. The funeral was in charge of the Knights Templar and other Masonic orders and a feeling eulogy was pronounced by Dr. W. B. Hinson.

Music at the Masonic temple was furnished by 50 pieces of the Portland Symphony orchestra, of which Christensen was one of the founders, and a stringed quartet. The funeral cortege was accompanied by a band from the Municipal union and members of various fraternal orders. The service at the grave was conducted by Portland lodge of Elks.

Christensen died Saturday morning at Good Samaritan hospital. He was 49 years old and had been a resident of Portland for 11 years. Christensen was organizer of the Portland Symphony orchestra and was well known throughout the country as a dancing master.

The funeral of John A. Scott, originally set for Wednesday, has been postponed until 2 o'clock Thursday afternoon. It will be held at the East Side Funeral Directors' chapel, under the auspices of the Masonic lodge. Besides the widow, two children survive, Mrs. Jeanette Scott Fry and William Scott, both of Los Angeles.

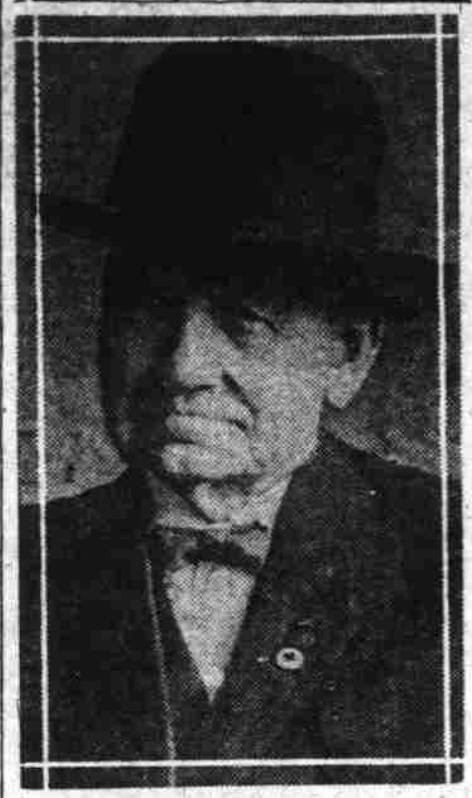
Mrs. Mary Baird

Three Light Frosts In October; Highest Temperature of 73

Three light frosts were recorded during October by the Portland weather bureau, those being on the twenty-second, thirtieth and thirty-first, according to the monthly review made public by Forecaster E. L. Wells today. The record shows one storm in which hail fell, October 12, and there were dense fogs on the twenty-fifth, twenty-sixth and twenty-ninth.

The highest temperature recorded was 73 degrees, October 4, and the lowest 38 degrees, October 21. The greatest daily range was 19 degrees, this being on the last day of the month, while the least daily range was four degrees on October 1.

Relatives Seeking Information About Killed Timber Man

Relatives of Ed Richardson, a timber faller, reported to have been killed October 26 while in the employ of the Dodson Lumber company at Burley, are endeavoring to get in touch with officials of the company or with the foreman of the crew which Richardson was working at the time of the accident. There is no postoffice at Burley, and the state accident commission at Seaside could give no information concerning the death of Richardson, who is described as being 45 years old, 5 feet 8 inches in height, with dark brown hair and brown eyes. He was a veteran of the Philippine war. Mrs. Wesley Downs, a daughter, lives at Leve.

John M. Lewis Votes Despite His Illness

County Treasurer John M. Lewis, who has been confined to his home for more than a week with a severe attack of pleurisy, is greatly improved and insisted today on being taken to the polls to cast his vote. He will be unable to return to his official duties for a week or ten days. Wade V. Lewis, his son, who is a student at the State Agricultural college, was called home on account of his father's illness, but returns to Corvallis tonight.

Eugene Prepared to Flash Vote Returns

Eugene, Nov. 2.—Elaborate preparations have been made to have election returns Tuesday night at public places in Eugene. The Chamber of Commerce will stage a big public function, to which everyone in Eugene and rural districts has been invited. The Elks lodge will keep open house and display bulletins along with entertainment, while the Y. M. C. A. and various fraternal orders will have special service.

FATHER ADELHELM NEAR DEATH FROM APOPLEXY STROKE

Rev. Father Adelhelm, abbot of Mt. Angel college, lies in a critical condition today at St. Vincent's hospital. He suffered a stroke of apoplexy a few moments prior to officiating at mass in the cathedral Monday morning.

Attending physicians today held out little hope for his recovery. Father Adelhelm's full title is Titular Abbot Adelhelm Odermatt. He founded the monastery and convent at Mount Angel and Mount Angel college in 1882. He also named the town of Mount Angel and had resided there since coming to Oregon at that time. Prior to that time he had been in Missouri, after originally coming from Switzerland. Father Adelhelm is one of the best known prelates in Oregon. The stroke of apoplexy came but a few moments prior to the celebration of his second mass Monday morning. He had said an early mass and was resting in the sanctuary of the chapel when the attack came. He was immediately removed to St. Vincent's hospital.

Father Adelhelm is 76 years of age.

grand total would show more nearly a 100 per cent vote than at any time in the history of the precinct.

In precinct No. 50, across the street from 57, in the First Methodist church, 14 had voted at 8:30 o'clock. The registration is 273.

Precinct No. 49, at Yamhill and Seventeenth, had 12 voters at 8:45 o'clock this morning. Only two or three were men, the balance newly enfranchised women. There is a total of 152 voters registered for the precinct.

In the firehouse at Sixteenth and Washington, precinct No. 45, with a registration of 145, nine had voted at 8:30 o'clock.

Precinct No. 55 was in difficulties at 8 o'clock.

Only two of the personnel had appeared, and when 9 o'clock arrived, E. H. Squire, judge, and Mrs. Mae Lehr, the only two there, were frantically endeavoring to impress passersby in duty. Those absent were Frank Savage, Besse Davis and Susan D. Jones.

Early morning voters were plentiful at East Side residential precincts this morning. The vote on the east side for the first hour was much heavier than in the primaries last May.

An idea of the voting up to 1 o'clock may be gleaned by reports from the following scattered precincts:

Precinct No. 2, Twenty-eighth and Thurman streets—164 registered, 34 voted.

Precinct No. 27, Broadway and Flanders—138 registered, 40 voted.

Precinct No. 30, Broadway and Davis—163 registered, 39 voted.

Precinct No. 28, St. Johns—347 registered, 92 voted.

Precinct No. 28, 920 Portland boulevard—162 registered, 53 voted.

Precinct No. 202, Laurelhurst—175 registered, 125 voted.

SALEM VOTE MAY BE 80 PER CENT OF REGISTRATION

Salem, Or., Nov. 2.—A vote of fully 80 per cent of the registration in Salem is indicated here Tuesday morning. An unusually heavy women's vote is indicated. Interest in the election here, outside of the presidential and senatorial candidates, centers about the fight for chief of police. There is no contest for any county offices, for which the Republicans have a complete ticket.

Many Vote in The Dalles

The Dalles, Or., Nov. 2.—Voting here had been consistently heavy up to 3 o'clock Tuesday afternoon. A poll of some of the precincts showing that more than half of those registered had balloted at that hour. In seven city precincts 2145 votes had been cast, or nearly half of the entire registered voters.

Heavy Vote in McMinnville

McMinnville, Nov. 2.—An 80 per cent vote is being cast here. Indications are that the presidential and senatorial votes will be close in this city.

Old Scotia Votes Today on Going Dry; Johnson Is Confident

London, Nov. 2.—(U. N. S.)—The "dry" forces in Scotland, led by William (Pussyfoot) Johnson, the American prohibition worker, wound up their long and spectacular campaign Monday preparatory to the local option elections throughout Scotland today.

Scotland will vote by parties on the question of closing up saloons, or public houses, as they are known in Britain.

"I am certain that a great part of the country will go dry," said Johnson today. "We have met with vigorous opposition from the wet forces, but I am certain of victory."

The dry fight was engineered by the National Citizens' council, a strategical amalgamation of about a dozen Scottish temperance societies.

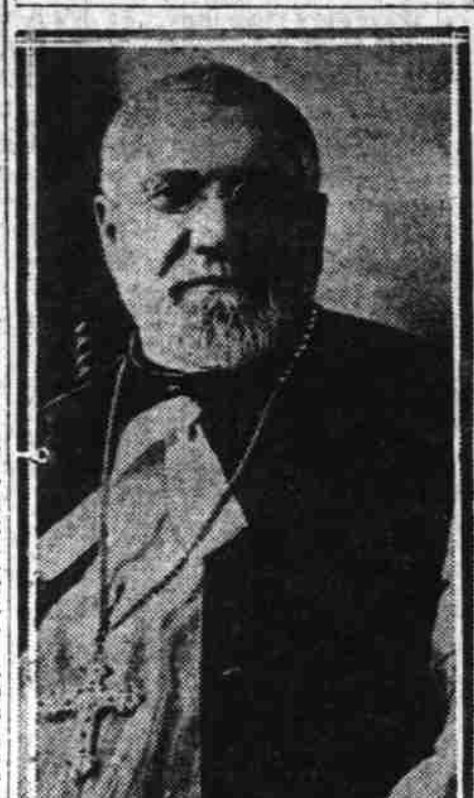

EASTERN BELLE, IN LUMBER, ASHORE IN DUNGENESS BAY

Seattle, Nov. 2.—The freighter Eastern Belle, with a lumber cargo for Cuba from Seattle, went ashore in the fog in Dungeness bay at 7:30 a. m. today, according to word received by the Merchants Exchange here.

It was thought there would be no difficulty in floating the ship as her bow was three feet out of water two hours before high tide and only a foot and a half at 10:30 a. m.

The government tug Spohomish is believed to have gone to the Eastern Belle's rescue and may attempt to tow her back to deep waters. The vessel is not believed to have been damaged and there were no passengers aboard.

Judge Landis Jolts Chicago Booze Ring By Stiff Sentences

Chicago, Nov. 2.—(U. P.)—Hundreds of bootleggers awaiting trial here trembled in their shoes today.

Belief that the prohibition law was a "joke" was shattered when Judge Landis plastered a two and a half year sentence on a hotel proprietor who sold whiskey. Another man was given 30 days. Fines assessed against the two totaled \$20,000. As a result of the sentences the booze lid was on tight here today.

\$40,000 in Liquors Stolen at Chicago

Chicago, Nov. 2.—(U. N. S.)—Eight burglars crawled through a rear transom today, bound and gagged the watchman and stole \$40,000 worth of whiskey, gin and brandy from the liquor warehouse of Manny Blance & Co. More than two hours were used by the burglars in hauling away the plunder in two trucks.
