Guard Company of 120 Men Organized in Aberdeen, Wash.

Aberdeen, Wash., Nov. 6.—A National Guard infantry company of 120 men, composed of members from Aberdeen, Montesano and Satsop, has been formed here and will be ready for mustering in by November 21, thus assuring the building of the state army for which an appropriation of \$125,000 was made by the last legislature. Forty-five members of the proposed organization are American Legion men and will compose the first platoon of the unit. Zella Becker to Be Tried for Perjury January 24 Next

The Zella Becker homestead perjury case, which also involves as defendants Fred Graham, Robert Logan and Albert Glascock, was set Friday for trial on January 24 by Federal Judge Wolverton. Logan, a convict at Salem, was sentenced a few days ago to serve 12 months at McNeil's island for his part in the transaction, to which he pleaded guilty. The defendants are said to have falsely sworn in a homestead contest case that Zella Becker resided on her homestead the time required by law.

Trial of Louis Erven, charged with violation of the Harrison narcotic act, was set for January 28.

A "clearing house" committee will be instituted by a representative of each of the charitable agencies, and frequent meetings will be held.

The exchange is supported by contributions from the county of Multnomah and the larger relief agencies. Most of the important organizations aiding the needy were represented at the Friday meeting.

IRREGULARITIES AT POLLS WILL BE INVESTIGATED

Alleged election irregularities in some of the Multnomah county precincts will be investigated by the present grand jury. This was indicated Friday when District Attorney Evans said he believed the best interests of the community would be served by having all the allegations regarding drunkenness of members of the night board of precinct No. 108 laid before the grand jury, and any other matters that may seem to require their investigation.

In some instances, it is said, the election boards closed the polling places at 5 o'clock for an hour for supper, although voters were waiting to cast their ballots. In various cases night boards refused to serve, and the counting of ballots had to be done by the day boards, who simply looked up the ballots over night and then proceeded with the count next day.

County Clerk Beveridge stated today that he will at once recommend to the county commissioners that they either undertake to secure state legislation at the next session of the legislature that will provide adequate compensation for election boards, or that they put an item in the 1921 budget for the purchase of at least 50 voting machines, as the primary step toward equipping all of the precincts of Multnomah county.

"With the experience we have just had with the blanket ballot of the general election," said Beveridge today, "I am sure we will have extreme difficulty at the next election in getting qualified persons to serve on election boards, unless the rate of compensation is put at a reasonable figure. The use of voting machines is a practical solution of our problem, and I believe it would be a wise investment to provide for the purchase of at least 50 voting machines during 1921 and at least 100 more the following year."
