NURSE FOR RURAL PUBLIC KEPT BUSY DURING OCTOBER

A scanning of the report for the month of October of the work performed in Multnomah county by Miss Ruth B. Young, rural public health nurse, causes one to wonder where this energetic young woman has found time to eat or sleep, although her expense account does contain an item of \$5.65 for meals. The towns visited in the month's work included Gresham, Troutdale, Carlton, West Portland, Multnomah, Maplewood, Park Rose and school districts Nos. 4, 7, 8, 10, 13, 20, 23, 38, 39, 45 and 52.

Some idea of the scope and extent of the work performed by the public health nurse may be gleaned from the following figures shown in the October report:

Number of nursing and instruction visits made, 140; medical cases cared for, 13; surgical, 2; communicable diseases, 47; contacts, 59, including cases of measles, whooping cough and scarlet fever; number of cases carried forward to November, 45.

In the nurse's visits to 11 schools 234 children were examined and 264 new defects were found. Children were referred to physicians as follows: For defective vision, 48; hearing, 5; breathing, 20; teeth, 101; diseases of eyes, 12; ears, 4; throat, 46; glands, 33; nerves, 19; lungs, 2; kidneys, 3; skin, 6; mentality, 6. Twelve children were excluded from the schools and 106 were reported to the health officer.

During the month the nurse gave 10 school talks, distributed 63 pieces of literature, made 12 home visits and gave 15 interviews, besides miscellaneous office work.

In addition to this she was in charge of a booth and health station at the Multnomah county fair, weighing and measuring infants and advising as to diet and nursing care, and gave public addresses before the Parkrose Public Health association, the county teachers' meeting, the Gresham high school assembly and the West Willamette Public Health association.

The work of the nurse also included visits and arrangements for examinations in several cases where the children were declared feeble minded and papers were filed for their commitment to the State School for the Feeble Minded.

HOOD-CRATER LAKE ROAD EASY, REPORT

Building of a road down the backbone of the Cascade mountains from Mount Hood to Crater lake—to be known as the Oregon-Cascade skyline road—is entirely feasible, according to a report made today by the forest service. The report is the result of a three months' intimate exploration trip over the proposed route by a party of forest service officials under instructions of George Cecil, district forester. The report finds that:

"Construction of the road will be comparatively easy as 90 per cent of the 200-mile route involves simple and economic construction.

"The remaining tenth will not involve such difficult construction that the project should be held back.

"It is absolutely safe that 99 per cent of the road can be made a
